Hugh McDowell was born Aug. 23, 1911, at Willman, Iowa. He came to Kendrick with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. E. McDowell, when a lad of six (1917). He grew to young manhood here, attending the Kendrick schools and graduating from Kendrick High School.

He entered the Military Service in 1942, during World War II, and was stationed in England for three years. There he met and married Lillian Mae Essen, September 20, 1945.

At the close of the war he brought his English bride to Kendrick, and they established a home here. Their three children, Bobbie, Raymond and Patricia were born here.

In 1952 the family moved to Avery where they resided at the time of the fatal accident.

POST MASTER URGES TO SHOP, MAIL EARLY

Postmaster Fred Sterman asked all persons who are sending packages through the mail this year to have them in the post office early and avoid the last minute rush.

Early mailing of all Christmas cards and gifts is the largest single factor in getting all of the mail delivered before Christmas. Post office facilities have been expanded, extra help will be available, and everything is geared up to handle a record Yule season mail in Kendrick this year.

Stedman suggested that persons take special care in preparing gift packages for the mails. Make sure that all addresses are legible and complete.

"When wrapping gifts for mailing, it is always better to use corrugated cartons, especially where there are a number of various sized objects in the shipment," he said.

The postmaster also suggested to use plenty of wadded tissue or newspaper for extra protection against shock, and securely wrap each package or carton in heavy paper, and tie it with strong cord. Be sure to include an extra label with your return address and the recipient's address inside the carton or package before it is wrapped.

Another good idea is to place a piece of transparent cellophane tape over the address portion of the label on your package to prevent defacing in transit, and always make sure to include the recipients full name, street address, city, zone and state.

"Postmaster Stedman says that if these simple rules are followed, you are certain to have your gifts delivered before Christmas Day. Wrap them securely; address them correctly and mail them early."

The postmaster requested that all Christmas cards be sent first class mail. By mailing first class, you are assured of having the card delivered. If a person sends their cards by second class mail, and the recipient no longer lives at the address or the address is not exactly correct, the card will not be forwarded or returned, only discarded and destroyed as millions are each year throughout the United States.

Christmas cards and packages for out-of-town destinations should be mailed well before December 10, and your Christmas mail for local delivery should be sent at least a week before Christmas.

WEATHER MILD

The weather this past week has been just about as fine as anyone could wish for the last of November and early part of December.

True, there has been some frost, some rain, and some wind — but no snow — all of which worked out perfectly for those taking holiday trips, and having one last fling at big game hunting.

Temperatures just before Thanksgiving dipped into the upper 20's, then it warmed up, and only once since that time, (Sunday night) has it been below freezing, with the mercury column showing a most pleasant rise.

Today (Wednesday) as we go to press the thermometer reads 50 degrees above zero.

The warmth and rain has effectively put a stop to logging operations, all woods roads and even the woods themselves being a sea of mud.

The Potlatch river, which under the impact of below freezing temperatures, dropped sharply, is again on the rise — but is about "standard" for this time of year.

ALCOHOLISM RATES

Wash., D. C. — Hard drinking states still have the largest number of alcoholics and states with low consumption figures show lower rates of alcoholism.

These facts are illustrated by figures developed by the Yale University Center of Alcohol Studies. Among the top ten states in per capita consumption are seven which rank in the top ten in rates of alcoholism.

For instance, Nevada ranks first on a per capita consumption basis and has 4,850 alcoholics per 100,000 population — ranking ninth in alcoholism.

New Jersey ranks fourth in consumption and second in number of alcoholics. Connecticut holds second place in per capita consumption and sixth in alcoholism. New Hampshire and New York rank seventh and

eighth respectively in consumption with alcoholism rates of third and fourth.

Of the ten states having the lowest rates of alcoholism, seven also rank lowest on a per capita consumption basis. The only state ranking the same in both per capita consumption and rates of alcoholism is Kansas — holding 39th place.

Alabama ranks 46th among the states on a basis of consumption, numbers 45th in the alcoholism column. North Carolina, with a 44th consumption rating, ranks 46th in alcoholism. Dry states, Oklahoma and Mississippi, which number 47 and 48 respectively on the basis of per capita consumption, hold 43rd and 41st place in number of alcoholics.

Idaho, which ranks 30th in per capita consumption of alcohol, is in 35th place in number of alcoholics.

ARTHRITIS PROGRAM

Boise — President Eisenhower this week sent his regards to the Idaho Arthritis and Rheumatism Foundation in Boise on the observance of the tenth anniversary of the national organization. He said, "It is a pleasure to join in the observance of the tenth anniversary of the Arthritis and Rheumatism Foundation. During the past decade this organization has contributed significantly to the gains against arthritis and other rheumatic diseases with vigorous leadership in furthering comprehensive programs of research, education and treatment. I am sure you will continue to strengthen the health of the American people. Best wishes for the success of your campaign against these crippling diseases."

Mrs. Eisenhower, too, joined in the wishes for success by receiving four-year-old Barbara Ann Phillips of Ohio at the White House. For several years Mrs. Eisenhower has been the honorary campaign chairman of the Arthritis and Rheumatism Fund drive.

The Idaho Chapter was organized just three years ago in Boise by a group of local lay and medical persons. Since that time it has continued to grow and expand until now information and help are available to any of the 40,000 arthritis sufferers in Idaho. Information concerning home care or clinics may be obtained from local chairmen or the state office at 2213 Heights Drive, Boise.

This month the Idaho Arthritis Chapter is campaigning in the state for \$25,000 to support its program of research, education for public and professional people, and better diagnostic and rehabilitation centers for patients.

The Idaho Chapter, only voluntary health agency devoting its entire time to arthritis and related disease, receives its money from United Funds in Plummer, Moscow, Grangeville, Boise and Pocatello; local fund drives, contributions, bequests, memorials and interested organizations.

DENTAL CLINIC

Boise — The first local dental health program to utilize the State Department of Public Health's new mobile dental health unit has just been completed, according to Dr. Wesley O. Young, chief of the department's dental health section. The program was conducted at Kooskia, Kamiah and Stites.

Personnel from the dental health section examined the teeth of some 500 children aged three to nine years, during the three-week program. Dr. Young said. The parents accompanied each child to the mobile unit and received a report on the conditions conditions found.

"Parent conferences, where practical, are one of the most effective mechanisms for helping families to

achieve better dental health for their children," Dr. Young stated.

In addition to the dental inspection a decay reducing chemical, stannous fluoride was applied to the teeth of each child. Since no fluorides appear naturally in the water supplies of

that area in northern Idaho, the decay rates among children are very high. The use of the fluoride chemical application will help to cut down on the amount of tooth decay and the resulting loss of teeth.



AN ORDINANCE VACATING A PORTION OF THE PARK LAND OF THE VILLAGE OF KENDRICK, LATAH COUNTY, IDAHO, SITUATED IN THE SOUTHEAST QUARTER OF SECTION 25, TOWNSHIP 38 NORTH, RANGE 3 W. E. M., AND PROVIDING FOR THE SALE OF SAID PARK LAND AS VACATED TO THE KENDRICK JOINT CLASS "B" SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 283, AND AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF A PROPER DEED OF CONVEYANCE, AND PROVIDING FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

Section 1. That portion of the park land of the Village of Kendrick, situated in Latah County, Idaho, to-wit: That part of the SE 1/4 of Section 24, Township 38 North, Range 3 W. E. M. described as follows: Beginning at the point of intersection of the North boundary line of "G" Street and the center line extended of Park Street of Original Town of Kendrick, Idaho, according to the recorded plat thereof (said point of intersection being 2110 feet North and 260 feet West of the Southeast corner of the Southeast quarter of said Section 24); thence West 240 feet along the North boundary line of said "G" Street; thence North at right angle a distance of 330 feet; thence East at right angle a distance of 175 feet; thence South 25 degrees 52 minutes East 366.8 feet, more or less, to the North boundary line of said "G" Street; thence West along said North boundary line of "G" Street a distance of 95 feet, more or less, to the point of beginning.


