XMAS DECORATIONS HIT SNAG

Christmas street decorations about town will make their usual appearance — but a bit late this year.

At the Kendrick Community Lions Club meeting, held Wednesday evening of last week, it was agreed to cooperate with the village in putting up separate poles for this purpose — the village to buy the poles, and the Lions to install them — this latter requiring the digging of holes, which is no small job in itself.

E. M. White and Dick Benjamin drove to Bovill Saturday as per instructions from the Shaeffer-Hitchcock Pole Co., who said if Kendrick had a truck there by 10 a. m., they would be loaded out, right from the treating plant. Well, to make a long story short, the men were there with the truck, but not a finger was lifted to help them load.

So, forced to use the slow and painstaking method of rolling each pole up from the ground onto the truck, the job was finally accomplished.

Seven, 30-foot poles were finally loaded by the two men, while the jammer sat idly by. This treatment may well make one wonder what happened to the Christmas spirit of the pole company?

Anyhow, the poles are here, and the problem now, says Bill Rogers, chairman of this project, is to get them set and wired — this latter being in the department of Dean Holtenbeck.

The poles with their separate wiring system will be used to carry and illuminate the Christmas decorations, as well as forming a permanent unit for fair and community day banners and like advertising.

In years before poles of the Potlatch Telephone Co., and trees were used.

Kendrick felt the stigma of vandalism Friday evening — and it leaves a nasty taste in your mouth. One of very few acts of willful destruction in the past several years — it seems all the worse.

Antennas were broken from the cars belonging to Clarence Perryman and Leonard Olson, and two others, whom we understand were from Nezperce.

During the course of the Kendrick-Nezperce basketball game four car radio antennas were broken off and ruined. Bad as these acts were, they could not match the stretching of a wire across the gymnasium steps, and had it not been for the sharp eyes of Gordon Peters, who almost was caught and tripped by it, someone undoubtedly would have fallen — perhaps to serious injury or even death.

The steps to the gymnasium are rather steep, and of concrete. A tripping fall here, such as would result from the wire — and someone might well have faced a murder charge.

It is indeed regrettable that Kendrick should become the scene of acts of vandalism. Let's hope no more occur.


