





HEPATITIS CASES UP 66 PERCENT IN 1958

Nearly 66 percent more cases of infectious hepatitus have been re-ported in Idaho so far this year than were reported in all of 1957, according to the State Department of Health's

to the State Department of Health's Vital Statistics service.

Through November 15, a total of 171 cases of hepatitus were reported. The total during 1957 was 103 cases.

Infectious hepatitus, an inflamation of the liver caused by a virus, is easily transmitted. The virus causing the disease are often spread by personal contact. Cleanlieness and good sanitation practices are most good sanitation practices are most important in preventing this spread. The virus can get onto anything an infected person touches - food and

infected person touches food and milk in particular.

Water contaminated by sewage also can carry the virus, and flies or other vectors can pick up the virus from garbage and wastes to spread the disease. Proper disposal of sewage and garbage is essential, as is proper protection of drinking water.

Serious Illnesses
Infectius hepatitis, while rarely
fatal, is a serious illness. Some people with the disease feel weak and run down for a year or longer. Propper medical care is essential to prevent complications.

Usually a person with the illnes has a slight fever and feels weak and tired. Sometimes he gets a slight yellow color (jaundice) in the eyes or on the skin. Not all hepatitis victims have yellowing, however, so the disease can sometimes be mistaken for influenza.

Personal cleanliness and proper sanitation in and around the home, business place or community is the best way to prevent and control in-fectious hepatitis. Be sure your drinking water is safe, have proper garbage and waste disposal, and be sure to wash your hands often with soap and water, especially before handling


