Mrs. Jennie Hund, 74-year-old Lewiston housewife, died at 10:40 Thursday morning at the St. Joseph's Hospital, Lewiston, where she had been a patient for four days.

She entered the hospital Monday suffering from several ailments none of which the doctor considered serious.

Jennie J. McKenny was born Mar. 1, 1884, at Warrenton, Va., and lived in that state until 1890, when the family moved to Saginaw, Mich. She was married there March 9, 1902, to William F. Hund.

In 1910 the family moved west and settled in Cavendish, Idaho. A year later they moved to the Leland area where they farmed for several years. Her husband passed away at Leland in August of 1919. However, she continued to live there until 1942, when she moved to Lewiston. Her home was at 122 1/2 Street.

Mrs. Hund was a member of the Leland Methodist Church. She was a member of the Leland W. S. C. S. for nearly a half century and contributed to many community activities, being a Sunday School teacher for many years. She was also a practical nurse and did a great deal of this work before moving to Lewiston.

Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. Katherine Parks, Juliaetta; Mrs. Frances Crawford, Kendrick; and Mrs. Elizabeth Anders, Lewiston; a son, Kenneth Hund, Mattawa Station, Washington; nine grandchildren; two grandsons-in-law and 16 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held in the Brower-Wann Chapel in Lewiston at 1:00 o'clock Saturday afternoon with the Rev. Peter Shebley pastor of the Apostolic United Pentecostal Church officiating.

Funeral services were held Monday morning at 10:00 o'clock in the Brower-Wann Chapel, with the Rev. Harold Gillim of Juliaetta officiating. Interment was in the Southwick Cemetery.

TIGERS LOSE TO LIBBY

Kendrick sank 30 field goals, but just couldn't connect from the foul line and lost a close, hard-fought basketball game to the Libby High School (Libby, Mont.) 71 to 68.

With Libby leading 69 to 68 in the final minute, the Tigers missed free throws which would have tied it. Libby then sank a clinching basket in the final five seconds.

The Tigers had two players far out in front in scoring — Duane Meske with 23 and Robin Magnuson with 22. But five Libby men hit in double figures.

Outscored from the floor, Libby sank 17 of 22 gift tosses to Kendrick's 8 for 15. It was the Tigers' first loss, they having won their first three games.

The home-and-home series between the Racicot cousins, Bill of Libby and Dennis of Kendrick now stands at 3 to 1 in Libby's favor. All four games have been decided by four points or less.

KENDRICK-DEARY ROAD ON '59 SLATE

Boise, Dec. 17 — Some \$40 million in road construction work has been allocated for Idaho highways during the coming year, the State Highway Dept. announced.

Of the projects north central Idaho has six for the coming calendar year. Of the total estimated cost of \$39,790,000, the interstate highway system will take \$27,925,000; the primary system \$9,175,000 and secondary roads \$2,687,000. The board listed 51 projects for construction. However, some of these may be held over should work be hampered by a shortage of funds, engineering delays or right of way problems.

Scheduled for construction in 1959 is a \$1,000,000 bridge to span the Clearwater river just west of Spalding. This bridge, we understand, will have its south end near the present Spalding (Pataha) mill. Eventually a complete remodeling of the Lapwai-Spalding junction road will take place.

The planning announcement was made by Roscoe Rich, Bureau, State Highway Dept. chairman. Under the program the federal government will provide all but \$2,150,000 of the money needed for the interstate projects, and it would provide \$5,668,000 for the primary system and \$1,662,000 for the secondary roads.

The program is pictured in the state report, would include these projects in north central Idaho.

Oiling and laying plant-mix treatment on the Winchester grade cutoff between Culesac and the Camas Prairie on U. S. Highway 95 and construction of a spur road between Winchester and the top of the 13.2-mile cutoff. (The cost of this project is estimated at \$1,074,000. S. S. Mullen, Seattle contractor building a sub-grade through the Lapwai canyon, has about 80 percent of the work completed on the cutoff. Oiling, if done next year, would have to come in the months of July to September.)

Reconstruction of 4.1 miles of U. S. Highway 85 between Pollock and the Cox ranch in the Riggs area. This project is part of a long-range improvement plan on the North-South highway in the Salmon river canyon. Its estimated cost is \$98,000.00.

Another project is the installation of an automatic signal at a railroad crossing on State Highway 8, at Moscow, at an estimated cost of \$10,000.00.

Of course, the project of greatest interest to local residents is the completion of a paving project to provide a surfaced highway between Deary and Kendrick by completion of 1.9 miles from the end of present construction to Deary at an estimated cost of \$597,000.

Yet another project of real area interest, carried over from the 1958 program, but not contracted during the surfacing and graveling of Highway No. 7 between Yale and Harvard.

The north central Idaho district, with headquarters in Lewiston, received the most funds from the state for primary projects. The district has no interstate system but will receive some \$1,544,000 in state money and \$2,156,000 in federal money for some \$3,500,000 in highway construction work under the proposed program.

So far as we can determine from information sent us, the Kendrick-Deary project will include both of the "missing links." That is, from the K. D. Ingle home to the present oiled section, and from Deary to the present oiled section.

Dee Magnuson, a Kendrick High school freshman, took second place in a North Idaho Forests Products Week essay contest for Junior and High School students.

Ray Howard of the Mead & Howard Lumber Co., and Harold Uglen, treasurer of the Forest Products Association, presented Dee with a check for \$25.00 and a plaque at the K. H. S. school assembly Friday morning of last week. While Dee placed second for northern Idaho she was actually first in this division.

The contest was sponsored by the Forest Products Ass'n, during the Oct. 19-25 observance. The essay subject was "What Forest Products Mean To Me."

Following is the essay Dee wrote: "What Forest Products Mean To Me" We see a tree standing straight and tall; to many it means little or nothing, but to me it symbolizes our country, its foundations, firmly rooted, its welcoming arms, eagerly accepting newcomers, and above all, its ability to produce bigger and better products for the security of a wholesome nation."

MARCH OF DIMES

BOISE MAN NAMED TO HEAD THE 1959 DRIVE

R.E. Gustavel, prominent Boise business and civic leader, has been appointed Idaho State Chairman for the 1959 March of Dimes, Basil O'Connor, President of the National

Foundation, announced today.

Gustavel, who served in the same capacity in the 1958 March of Dimes, will coordinate state fund raising activities during the traditional January Campaign, O'Connor said.

In accepting the re-appointment, Gustavel stated, "one of our major tasks this year will be to interpret to the public the scope and concept of the expanding program of the

National Foundation. This major assault on unmet health needs, with intensive research at the core, stands to improve the health and well being of every citizen. With continued public support and cooperation we are confident that our goals will be reached."

Initially, Gustavel said, in addition to continued polio and other virus research, the Foundation's target will be arthritis, birth defects, and disorders of the central nervous system. Wherever new leads arise they will be followed.

Arthritis, he said, cripples more than 11 million Americans annually, while defects present in children at birth affect 250,000 babies each year, or 1 in every 16.

Gustavel, father of three, is district sales manager for United Airlines. He is a former Ada County Campaign Director and is president of Rotary.

HEPATITIS CASES UP 66 PERCENT IN 1958

Nearly 66 percent more cases of infectious hepatitis have been reported in Idaho so far this year than were reported in all of 1957, according to the State Department of Health's Vital Statistics service.

Through November 15, a total of 171 cases of hepatitis were reported. The total during 1957 was 103 cases.

Infectious hepatitis, an inflammation of the liver caused by a virus, is easily transmitted. The virus causing the disease are often spread by personal contact. Cleanliness and good sanitation practices are most important in preventing this spread. The virus can get onto anything an infected person touches - food and milk in particular.

Water contaminated by sewage also can carry the virus, and flies or other vectors can pick up the virus from garbage and wastes to spread the disease. Proper disposal of sewage and garbage is essential, as is proper protection of drinking water.

Serious Illnesses

Infectious hepatitis, while rarely fatal, is a serious illness. Some people with the disease feel weak and run down for a year or longer. Proper medical care is essential to prevent complications.

Usually a person with the illness has a slight fever and feels weak and tired. Sometimes he gets a slight yellow color (jaundice) in the eyes or on the skin. Not all hepatitis victims have yellowing, however, so the disease can sometimes be mistaken for influenza.

Personal cleanliness and proper sanitation in and around the home, business place or community is the best way to prevent and control infectious hepatitis. Be sure your drinking water is safe, have proper garbage and waste disposal, and be sure to wash your hands often with soap and water, especially before handling food.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Each recipient must have successfully completed their 4-H or FFA project, must be in the upper 40 percent of their class scholastically, must have demonstrated leadership qualities in their school, and be in need of some financial help to continue their education.

Winners of the scholarships may attend any school of higher education of their choice. E. V. Holstad, regional manager for Standard in Spokane, stated, "We are most happy that our company has again this year approved these ten \$300.00 scholarships for worthy 4-H Club and FFA members in the state of Idaho. We feel that our farm youth should be especially encouraged to further their education. CHECK YOUR CAR

During the nationwide vehicle safety check campaign conducted last spring, investigators found that one out of every five vehicles checked was in need of maintenance attention, it was reported by Harold Davis, state traffic director.

"Car owners in this state who have not had their vehicles inspected for safe winter driving requirements should do so now," he advised.

In the 1958 spring check of more than 3,000,000 vehicles, the major faults were found to occur in the lighting systems, brakes, exhaust, tires steering and windshield wipers. Rear lights were found in more need of immediate service attention than any other item.

Davis urged all car owners to make sure of their vehicles for winter-time driving emergency. By so doing each motorist will make an important contribution to the statewide accident prevention program. He will make his own community safer and he will be taking definite steps to assure his personal safety and the well-being of his family.

Mr. Davis recommended that special attention be given to vital winter equipment — proper lights, adjusted brakes, strong battery, tires with good treads, a defroster that

works, windshield wiper blades capable of clearing rain or snow without smear or streak, and an exhaust system that is functioning efficiently. He also recommended carrying a set of reinforced tires chains in the car's trunk for use when needed in severe snow or ice conditions.

The motorist who stalls on a winter street or highway not only is in danger of being struck by another vehicle skidding into him, he also is

likely to cause a prolonged traffic tie up, causing inconvenience to many fellow motorists.






