## YEARS, CRESTS SAT.

Last Wednesday evening, following several days of mild, but overweather, snow began falling about 8:15, and by morning four to five inches lay on the ground here,

with slightly more on top the ridges. Thursday morning the scrape of snow shovels could be heard all about town — and the state and highway and district snow plows were "at it full cow.

About the middle of the afternoon (Thursday) it warmed up a bit and rain began falling, packing down the somewhat powdery snow. Rain continued to fall all of Thursday night and most of Friday — and by Sat urday morning the Potlatch river (or creek, whichever you prefer), was approaching flood stage, reaching its nighest point for some years.

Water seeped through the railroad embankment in the northeast part of town and ran across the yard at the home of Mrs. Kathlyn Morey and sons. This drainage ditch passes the houses belonging to Chris Beyer, Mr. and Mrs. Gus Kruger, and then runs into a drainage ditch near the trailer homes of Mrs. Clarence Wilson and sons and Mr. and Mrs. Loyd Ware. It created rather a sloppy mess, but did not do any damage.

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
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
