

## HIGH SCHOOL FOUND INADEQUATE IN FIRE SAFETY, ESCAPE CHANCES SLIM

Kendrick High School dropped far behind state and national standards in fire safety when the local Fire Department and Leon Soodoff, Moscow fire chief completed their survey a few weeks ago, and classed the structure at "inadequate" for fire escape routes and safety measures.

In the unexpected fire drill shown in last week's paper, statistics were given that you might know how long it would take to evacuate the building. Should this be necessary during the time that all the students meet in the study hall, which is several times a year, it would take 11 minutes and 20 seconds to send all the students down the fire escape.

Using the fire escape alone was an example at this point, to show actually what could take place in case of fire. Should a fire start in the building, it, without a doubt, would block the stairway — the stairway forming a perfect draft for the blaze and bar it as an escape route for the students.

There is also one room in the front on the top floor that would leave occupants cut off without fire escape or hallway exit, if halls were blocked. Known as the "Old Science Room" it is now being used for English. Children in this room would not have a chance unless they jumped from windows.

Within 11 minutes and 20 seconds the entire structure could be enveloped in flames. Figures have shown that in five to six minutes a blaze is

usually out of control.

Another aid to any fire would be the ventilator shaft. A three-foot square ventilator shaft is now located in the present high school building and runs from the main floor to the attic — and it is made of wood! This shaft would provide a perfect funnel in sucking flames into the attic, should a blaze break out on the lower floor. If the fire were to reach the attic, it would have a perfect "tinder box" in which to burn. At the present time the attic carries 43 years accumulation of combustible materials. Being the only storage room it contains such items as extra desks, chairs, stage props, and many other things, piled high to save room, and they would burn!

Probably one of the most threatening fire hazards in the building is the "cubby hole" storage room for the custodian. This room is located beneath the steps on the first floor. Should fire break out in the furnace room, the materials stored in this "hole" would immediately turn into a raging inferno, setting the stairs on fire and cutting off the main route of exit for the children.

Should these facts and figures seem unreasonable, or incomprehensible, why not pay a visit to the building and "see for yourself." The building is open for inspection at any time during the school day, and anyone wishing to visit may do so — contact Supt. R. L. Meserve and see for yourself!



## STUDENTS EXPRESS OPINIONS ON SCHOOL

It's in the air everywhere you go, "talk of a new school" — and it isn't "top secret" anymore, especially at the High School. Students are hopeful and confident their parents and grandparents are going to provide them a new school. They say: "We're all for it, and we need it!"

In talking to them on their views on a new building — do they want one and where they think it should be, the three students above did not hesitate to express their point of view.

Judy Craig of Cedar Ridge, Junior class president, said: "Yes, I'd love to have a new school, 'cause we really need one. The present building is a fire trap, and we just don't have the facilities for an education that other kids do. Oh, it would be just great!" As to location she said: "I think it should be on the new site selected on Bear Creek. There is plenty of room and it is centrally located."

Gerald Batemas, High School Student Body President voiced his views in much the same manner when he said, "Sure I'd like to see a new school in this district. I won't get to use it, but it would be great for the kids coming on." He went on to say: "I think that a new school building should be placed so that the athletic field and gym would be in one unit and adjoining. The site selected by the Citizens Committee looks adequate to me." Gerald added: "The present building is so crowded students are deprived of receiving individual help from the teachers, and facilities are limited in shop and science."

Judy Cuddy, Juliaetta, a freshman, agreed with her classmates when she said: "Yes, we need a new school. After fire drill this morning, coming down those slippery steps, it made me think how awful it would be if there was a fire. A new school with a Home Ec department would be really wonderful." When asked where she thought a new school should be built she said: "I think that Juliaetta has the prettiest site, but the one in Kendrick is all right, and if I had a choice I think it should be built in Kendrick on the new proposed building site."

## STUDENTS WANT NEW SCHOOL

Supt. R. L. Meserve added to the above opinions: "It is apparent the present students want a new school, and since they will be paying a large part of the tax bill in the future, I think they should have a voice — it's too bad they can't vote!"

## BEN P. COOK SPEAKS

"It is quite often said, 'An adequate education can be obtained using present school facilities.' It might also be said, 'A living could be made by tilling the soil with horse power.' However, observation would indicate that few people are doing it. We have recognized change in all lines of endeavor and most of us are willing to admit that with this change has come progress.

"The attitude that the old scheme of things was good enough for me; it is good enough for my children and grandchildren — is not consistent with the practices of the individuals who have been heard to make such assertions. These same individuals have utilized every modern device at their command in order to meet the competition of the times. And, after maximum effort, still complain because they have been outdone by their competitors. When we do nothing in a progressive society, we rapidly lose ground. Social order moves ahead leaving us complacently sitting in our own little circle. If we look around at our former associates they are nowhere in sight.

"We must give heavily of ourselves merely to hold our own. If we

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## ARCHITECT MEETS WITH LIONS WED.

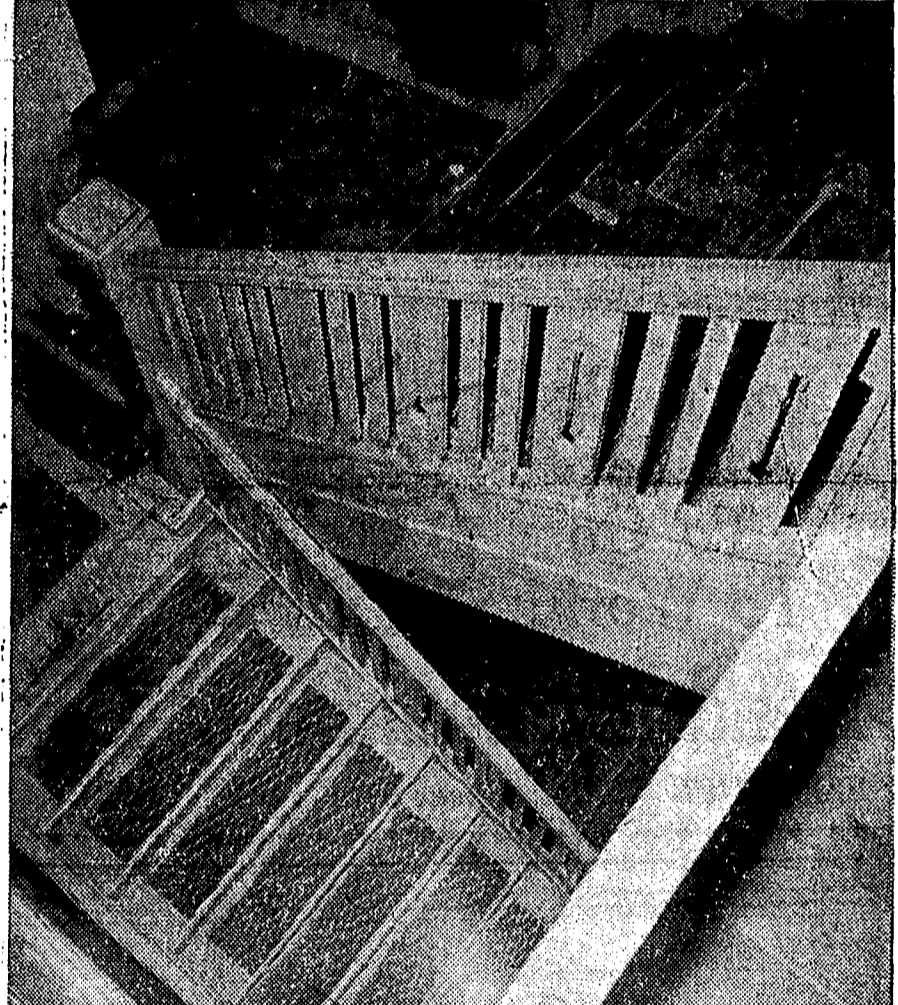

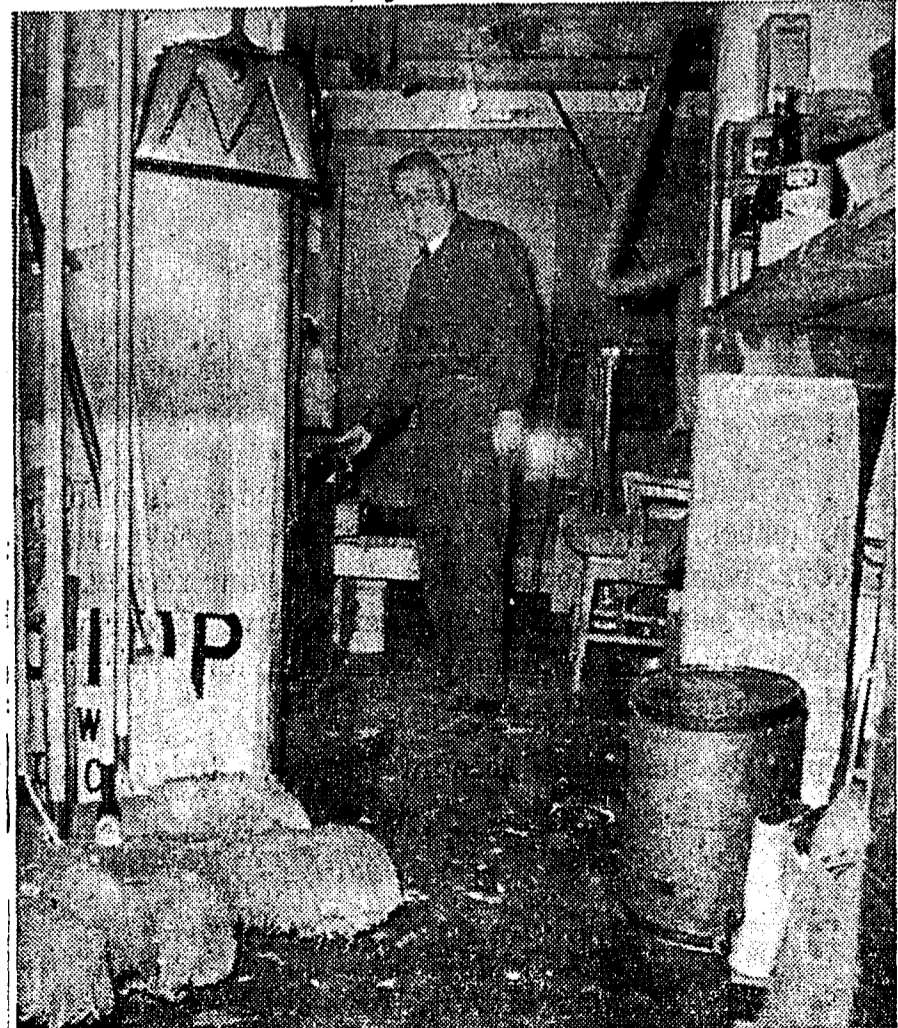
Time of both meetings (supper) is at 7:00 p. m.

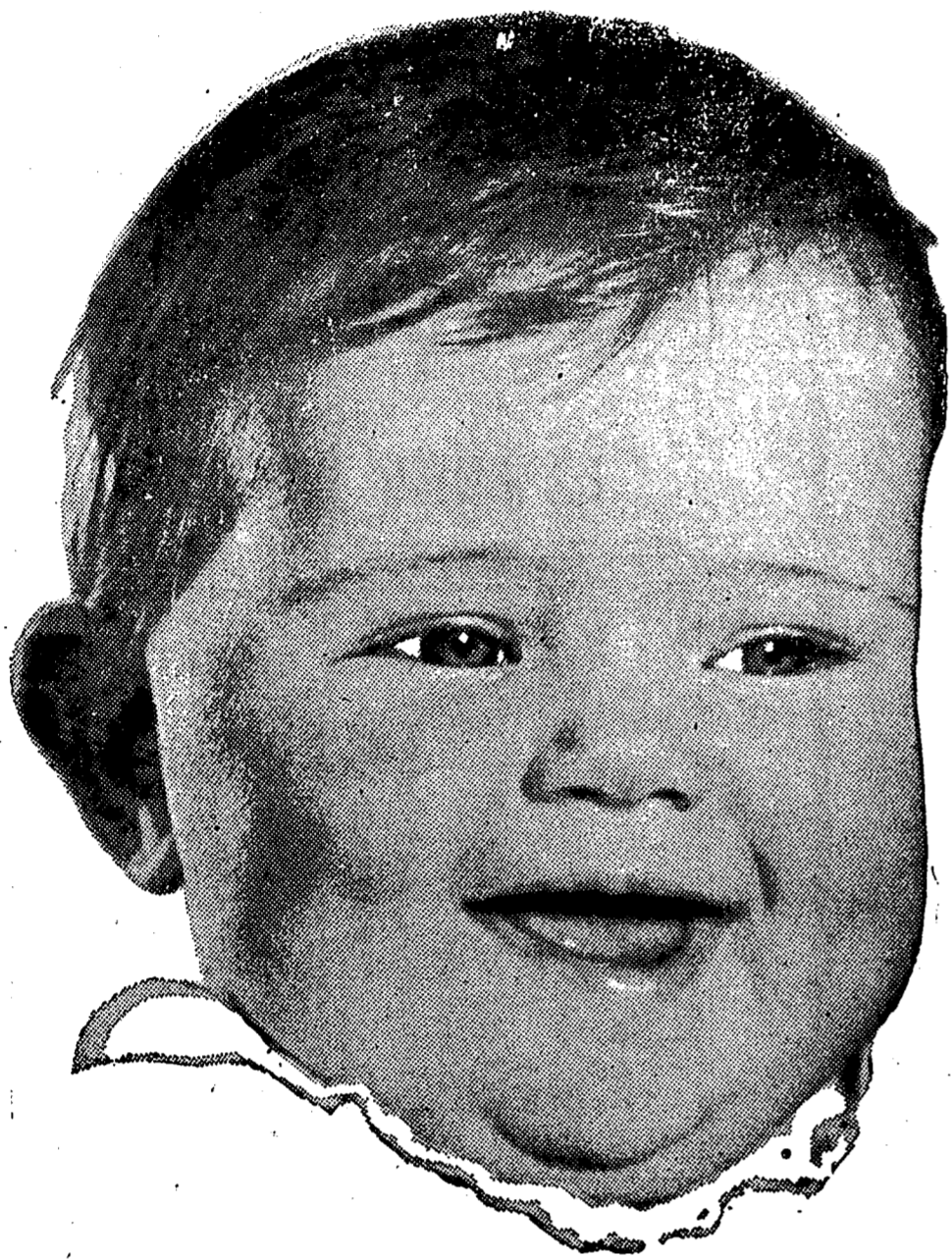

**AT WORK ON NEW DIAL SYSTEM FOR KENDRICK AND SOME FARMERS IN AREA**

**NEWEST TYPE EQUIPMENT GOING INTO PLACE**

Keeping abreast of ever-changing methods and progress are the Schupfer Brothers in their installation of the latest in dial telephones. The process of "changing over" from the "Number Please" system is now in progress, and here is shown the interior of the new building to house it — constructed late in 1957. The new equipment has been installed by Otto Schupfer, Bud Eichner and Jerry Brown. Beginning last November, as the materials started arriving, they have been at it almost constantly. Shown also in the picture with Mr. Schupfer, Bud Eichner and Jerry Brown, is Mr. Johnson from the Automatic Electric Company, going over the installation before giving his O. K.

This equipment is the very latest in design, and has been built to handle the Kendrick community area, Juliaetta having had dial phones for several years. There will still be operator service, for the benefit of farmer lines who will not at this time at least, be a part of the dial system.

The increase in telephone calls and service had become so great that a high standard of efficiency and service could not be maintained with the old phone set-up — hence this fine new equipment.

At the present moment a new directory is in the process of preparation at the Gazette office, with preliminary proofs given the company last week-end. Every number in the book has to be changed, with the attendant job of testing each one before its final assignment — which is in itself a tremendous job.

If you do not now have a telephone, or are contemplating a move in the anywhere near future please notify the local telephone company immediately so that the proper arrangements can be made to accommodate you.

At the present time two lines in the Cameron area and several private lines in Kendrick are in use

as "testers." The others, of course, will not be put on dial until the directories have been printed and are in the hands of users — then the change-over will be a rapid one. Remember — get that new phone or change request in as soon as possible to assure your name and phone listing in the new directory.

In writing, state whom you represent, whether as a citizen, logging contractor, civic club, or other group. Letters should go to your State Representative (George F. Brocke, Sr.); your State Senator (George Lough); Gov. Robert E. Smylie or Secretary of State Arnold Williams.

Today in Idaho the United States Brewers Foundation works constantly throughout the beer business to assure the sale of beer and ale under pleasant, orderly conditions.

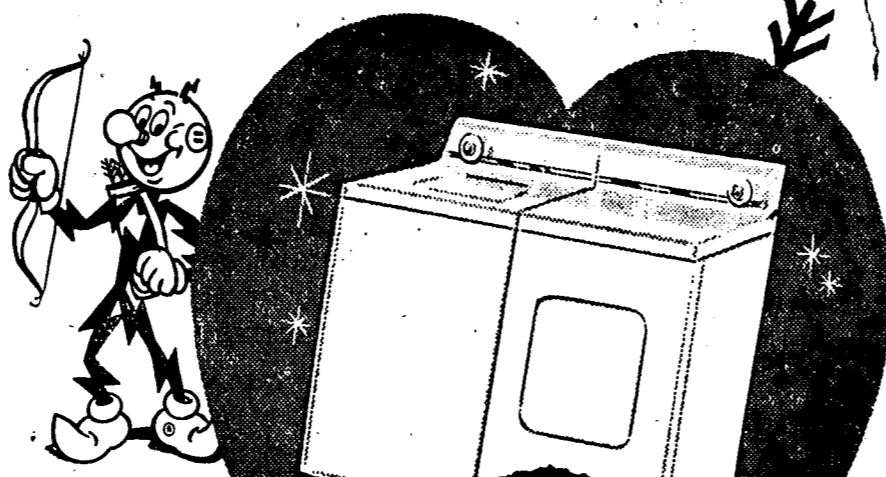

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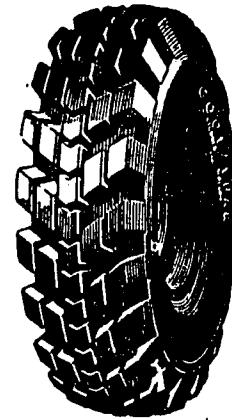
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
