Nearly 10,000 Canada Geese like these were counted wintering in Idaho during the recent state-wide waterfowl survey conducted by the State Fish and Game department in cooperation with the Federal Fish and Wildlife Service. Five airplanes were hired and game biologists made census flights in their districts and coordinated this work with land counts in adjacent areas. A total of more than 650,000 ducks were tallied, along with 258 of the rare trumpeter swans and about 230 whistling swans. At least 200,000 more waterfowl were observed than normally winter-over in Idaho, probably because of unusually moderate weather this year.

ing points want these species in saw log size with a price spread of \$26.00 to \$30.00 per m. b. f. A point near Moscow lists this item with a very good demand. Kendrick and Pottlatch have good demand whitt points at Princeton, Troy and Viola have fair to poor demand.
 Ponderosa pine is just holding about the same levels of price and demand attained last year. All buying points want this specie with prices varying from \$27.00 to \$40.00 per thousand board feet at good demand.
 White pine is still suffering from poor demand and in some cases the price for delivered sawlogs has declined. All points list this species except Viola. Demand is poor to good and prices vary from \$50.00 to \$65.00 per thousand board feet.
 Cedar is also in a relatively poor marketing position. All points want cedar except Viola and Moscow. The price varies from \$26.00 to \$35.00 per thousand board feet with demand good to poor.
 Stud logs are in fair demand at a point near Princeton. Prices vary from \$12.00 to \$13.00 per cord for the mixed species and Ponderosa Pine. This product should give an excellent opportunity for stand improvement work. These small logs should make it possible to do some thinning in the younger stands.
 Cedar poles and piling are in fair demand at Bovill, and prices vary 70c to \$47.50 per piece.
 Yellow pine peelers are in good demand at Pottlatch. This should provide an incentive for woodland owners to grade their logs and prune their young timber for future markets.

According to Russell Slade, extension farm forester, sawmill operators in Latah county are optimistic about their industry for 1959. The lumbermen of the county feel there will be a better market for their products this coming year.

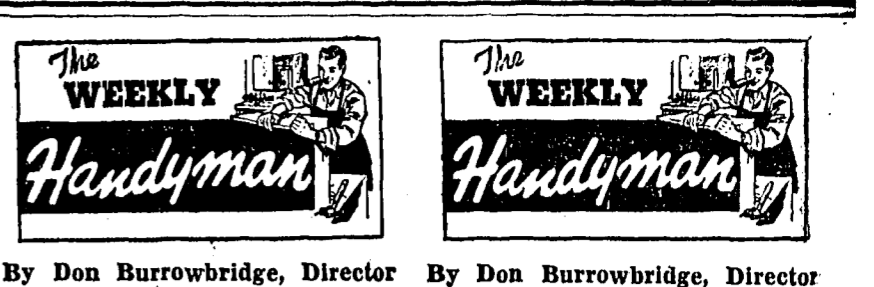

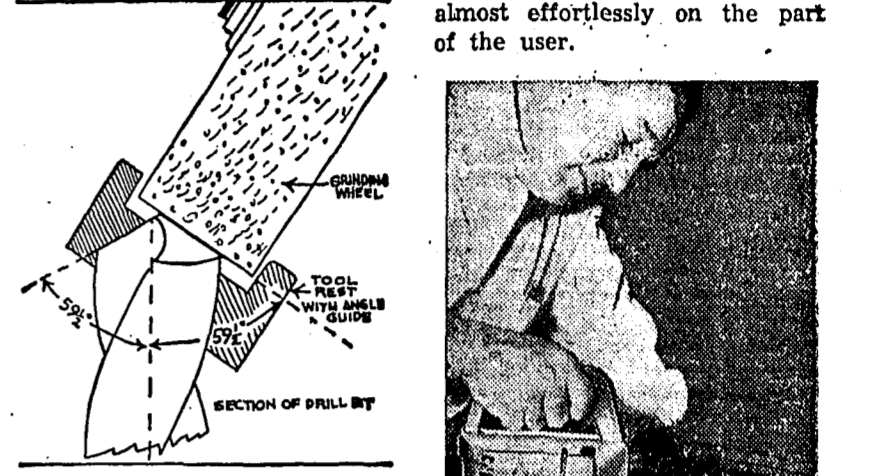

An important part of a well-equipped home and farm workshop is a bench grinder that keeps all the cutting implements sharp for the best results in repair and maintenance projects.
 A good example of the kind of tool we mean is an electric bench grinder that is portable and has milled-in angle guides for sharpening drills, chisels and planes. This SpeedGrinder has reinforced eyeshields that make every grinding job safe.



Use bench grinder to keep cutting implements sharp.

One of the advantages of these bench grinders is the fact that they are portable. This means that they can be set up on the workshop bench, on a service truck, in the basement, wherever there is electric power. Weight of various models range from 6 1/2 pounds to 19 1/2 pounds.

Here are just a few tool sharpening hints for the handyman using an electric bench grinder:

For putting a keen edge on chisels and drawknives, grind at an angle of 25 to 30 degrees. For plane blades and spokeshaves, grind the inside bevel on a round edge wheel at an angle of 25 to 30 degrees. The length of the bevel should be two times the thickness of the blade. Grind twist drills against the edge of the wheel at a 59 1/2 degree angle.

For that complete grinder scheme, you can utilize small electric hand grinders as well as grinder attachments on electric drills or impact wrenches such as the versatile FarmTool.

WINDBREAKS

Want a windbreak on your farm? There is still time to order little trees for planting this year. The county agent will accept orders until March 10. The trees will be delivered from the University of Idaho nursery in the spring.

The list of available species includes the finest types for several purposes, Homer Futter, Latah county agent, says. The busy hardwoods are Russian Olive, Siberian Pea, multifloral rose and lilac. Tall hardwoods are black locust, green ash, honey locust, Siberian elm, golden willow and hybrid poplar.

Tall evergreens are Ponderosa pine, lodgepole pine, Scotch pine and Austrian pine. The dense evergreens are Norway spruce, blue spruce, juniper and Douglas fir.

Trees may be obtained for forest planting, farm windbreaks, farm woodlots, Christmas trees, or in furtherance of the soil bank program.

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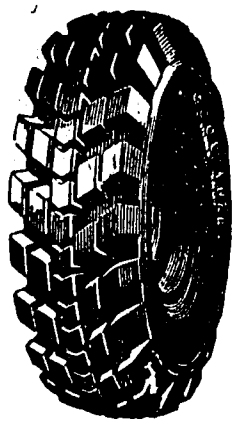
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
