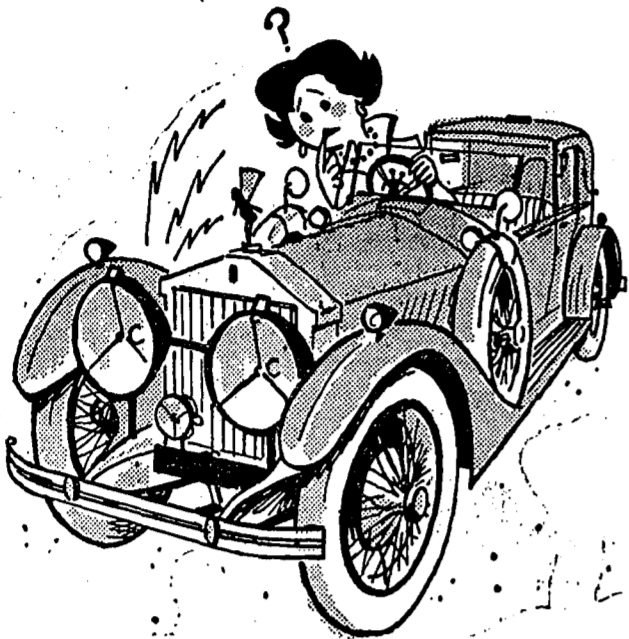

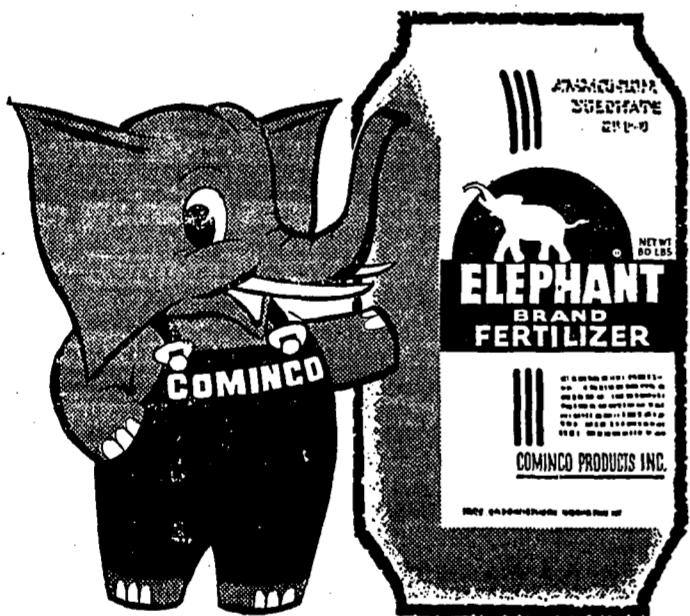

**SCIENCE GRANT FOR
SPECIAL TRAINING**

University of Oregon, Eugene, (Special) Science teachers in high schools of Kendrick and area will

have an opportunity to receive special science training under a new science teacher education program announced recently by the National Science Foundation.

The University of Oregon has been selected by the NSF to administer the program, which will send special-

ly trained personnel into high schools throughout the six northwestern states to work with science teachers in developing improved teaching methods. The university has received a \$382,000.00 grant from the Foundation to finance the program.

The aim of the program, as set out by NSF, is to stimulate the interest and spread the influence of competent teachers of science; to encourage the building of simple laboratory apparatus to smaller and poorly equipped high school, and to provide secondary school students a deeper appreciation of science and to help motivate competent young people into suitable scientific careers.

The program, undertaken by the graduate school of the university, is termed the Traveling Science Demonstration Lecture program. It will involve the intensive training and services of 20 carefully selected high school teachers in biology, chemistry, physics and geology. These teachers in turn, will help train high school teachers throughout the six-state area which includes Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Utah and Wyoming.

The 20 teachers chosen will spend

the summer of 1959 on the university campus where they will be trained to lecture in the general fields they represent. Training on the campus will be by members of the university's science department. During the training period, the teachers will also build and assemble their demonstration apparatus.

The demonstration materials constructed and assembled on the campus will be installed in 20 station wagons, to be used by the teachers in visiting the high schools of the northwest states.

The traveling teachers will remain for approximately one week at each school.

A Declaration of Independence
 Today is a special one in the lives of Americans, for we reflect upon the struggle our forefathers made nearly 200 years ago to give us the freedom we now enjoy. And we have zealously protected this freedom at all costs, and we shall always do so with determined hearts. But there is another story of a "declaration of independence" that we often forget. I would like to share it with you now.

Here is a letter full of rich enthusiasm that only Paul could put forth. Here is an inspiring message for Christians everywhere, a message of Christian freedom. "By faith, not works," exclaimed Paul. I urge you to read this epistle in the New Testament when you have an opportunity. As Christians, we should be aware of such a key message as this "Declaration of Independence." — Rev. Consumption Of Paper Huge
 A good index of any country's standard of living is its per capita consumption of paper and paperboard, a prominent forest industry official said last week.

"Latest figures show the U. S. leads all other nations in the world with 421 pounds per capita," said Grant

B. Potter, spokesman for Idaho forest industries, and an official of The Ohio Match Co., Coeur d'Alene.

"This is more than 150 times the amount consumed per capita in many Asiatic and Near East countries, and is equal to the per capita consumption of Italy, France and the United Kingdom," he added.

Idaho, one of the nation's foremost timber states, produces more than 4 percent of the country's total annual supply of pulp, paper and paperboard products.

The need for a permanent and adequate supply of wood to meet future needs has led this segment of the forest industry to finance some of the most intensive and effective forestry programs in the country today, Potter said.

Included among these programs is the American Tree Farm System, the forest industries' program of encouraging private landowners to grow trees as a crop on Tree Farms, and the Keep America Green campaign, both sponsored nationally by American Forest Products Industries. The Tree Farm system is administered in Idaho by the Western Pine Association.

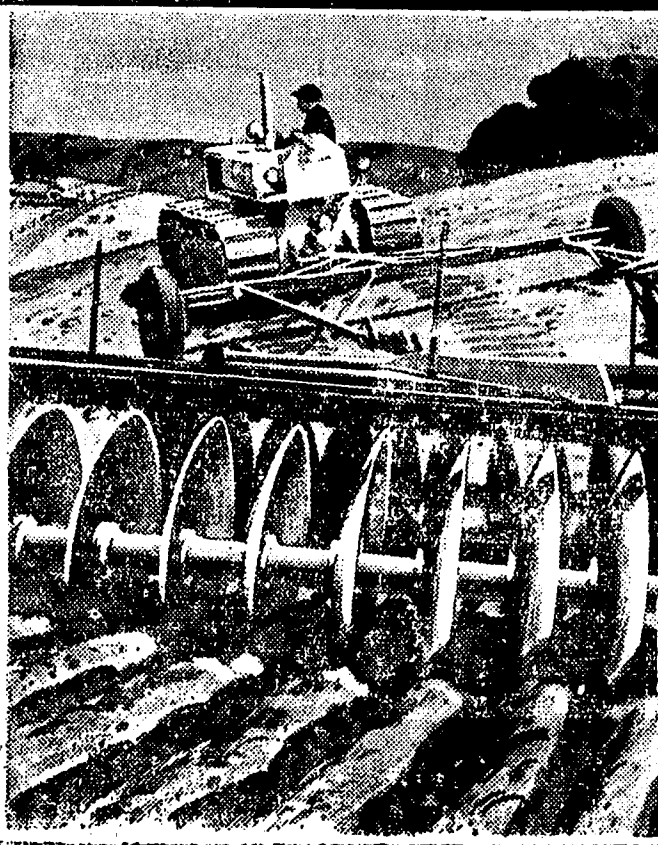

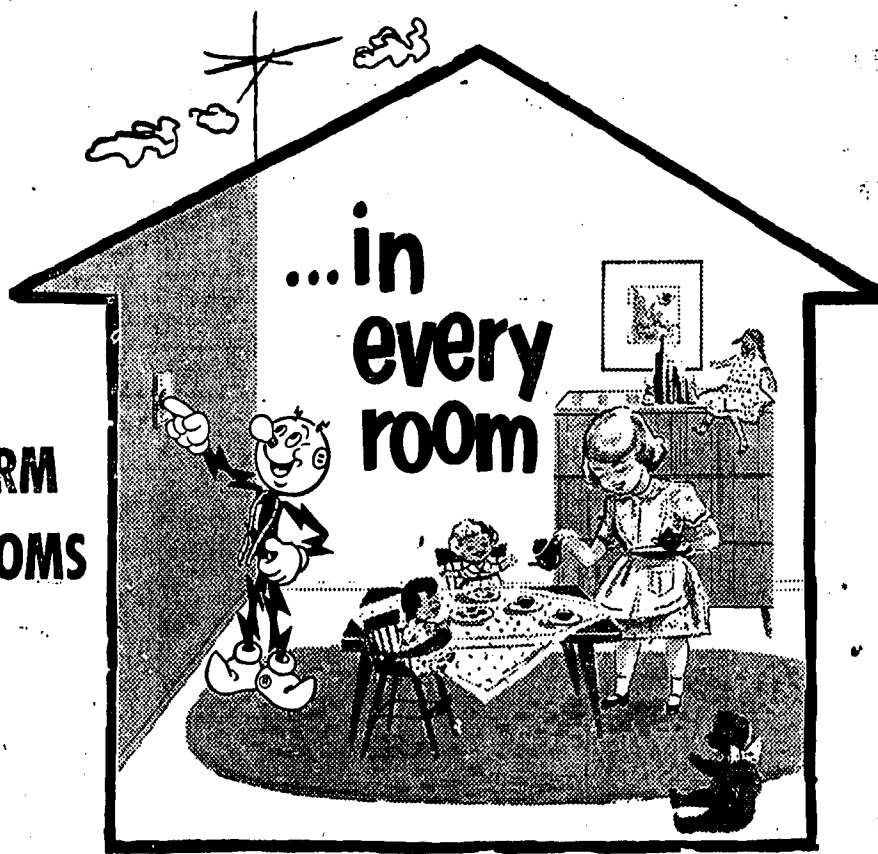

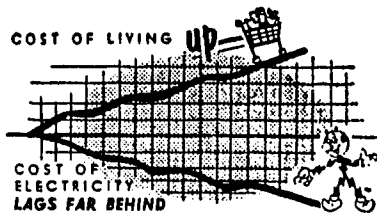

Abused Cigarette Was Once Held As Sacred Object

WASHINGTON—The now frequently condemned cigarettes were once sacred objects among Indian tribes of the Southwest.

They were placed by priests in caves as votive offerings. Thousands have been found in cave shrines throughout Arizona.

The once sacred nature of the cigarette—none of the present popular brands of radio advertising, of course—is established by the findings of several archeologists during the past half century, according to the Smithsonian Institution's Bureau of American Ethnology.

Practice of making cane cigarettes survived up to quite recently among the Pima Indians of Arizona. From a reed growing along the banks of the Rio Gila they made a smoking tube the length of the first two joints of the index finger. Around the middle of this was tied a miniature belt woven from cotton and agave fiber, with fringed ends.

These tubes were regarded as male or female, according to certain marks placed on them. Before departure of a war party these tubes were filled with tobacco and smoked toward the four points of the compass, to the tribal fetishes, and to all the objects that were to be used in the campaign. Each warrior smoked his own cigarette.

At the close of the ceremony the tubes were deposited in shrines dedicated to the war god. These generally were in caves. Hundreds of these tubes were found in fireplaces during excavation of the great Indian "apartment house" at Casa Grande, Arizona, in 1907. The surfaces were charred but the objects still were distinguishable. Large numbers of similar tubes have been found in caves through the Gila and Salt River Valleys.

New World Had Lost 'Golden' Age

WASHINGTON—There probably was a lost "golden age" in aboriginal New World culture. Art in aboriginal America may have reached its heights in the jade carvings of Mexico and Central America. This was an art which, by and large, has remained unknown to the rest of the world. The creations achieved by the Indian carvers rival and surpass those found elsewhere in the world.

Such is the conclusion of the late Dr. William Foshag, former Smithsonian Institution curator of geology, in a report on the mineralogy of jade articles recovered from Guatemalan archeological sites.

The artistry displayed in the Guatemalan jade figures, says Dr. Foshag, "presupposes a long and ancient artistic development during a civilization or culture of which we know very little. When the missing chapters in the history of Central American cultures are eventually revealed it will more than likely be found that the development of the art of jade carving will not only parallel that of China but be essentially contemporaneous with it."

Proper Diet Helps Teeth Resist Decay

CHICAGO—The best preventive for tooth decay is the development of teeth with a "high resistance" to decay, according to the American Medical Association Council on Foods and Nutrition.

The child's diet during the formation period should consist of a "generous selection of foods from all the basic food categories." They should be carefully cooked to preserve the original nutrient values.

An ample supply of vitamin D (obtained mainly from vitamin D fortified milk and sunshine) should be provided daily.

A highly desirable factor in overall diet planning for the development of caries-resistance is the growing availability of fluoridated water supplies. Small amounts of fluoride help prevent tooth decay.

After the teeth are fully formed and have erupted in the mouth, the same attention must be paid to the diet. In addition, the eating of sticky, high-carbohydrate foods that adhere to the teeth should be restricted.

Fire Prevention Week Scores Hit In Ankara

NEW YORK—The U. S. Air Force in Europe reported that officials of the Turkish Government encouraged the observation of Fire Prevention Week in Ankara last October. It was the first observance ever held there and was so successful that Lieutenant Governor Baspri Ozpinar is planning to introduce a bill in the Turkish Grand National Assembly which will create a Turkish Fire Prevention Week, coinciding with the American campaign.

The Ankara observance was highlighted by a fire-fighting demonstration.

LOG GRADING SCHOOL SCHEDULED

U. of I. Moscow — To meet an increasing need for improved evaluation methods of determining log quality, a log grading conference has been scheduled at the University of Idaho College of Forestry on April 8, 9 and 10.

Aims of the three-day campus conference are technical, scientific and economic. Sessions will be held at the college of forestry and at a nearby lumber mill.

"Men attending will have an opportunity to learn the factors that determine log grades and to become acquainted with log grading principles," said John P. Howe of the Idaho wood technology staff.

In addition to learning how to grade logs, those attending will be shown basic factors which influence log quality. In many cases, these factors are not evaluated by present log grading techniques, but show up later to affect lumber, veneer and pulp quality. Economic objectives in log grading will also be covered, said Howe.

The program, open to anyone associated with the production, distribution, or use of logs.

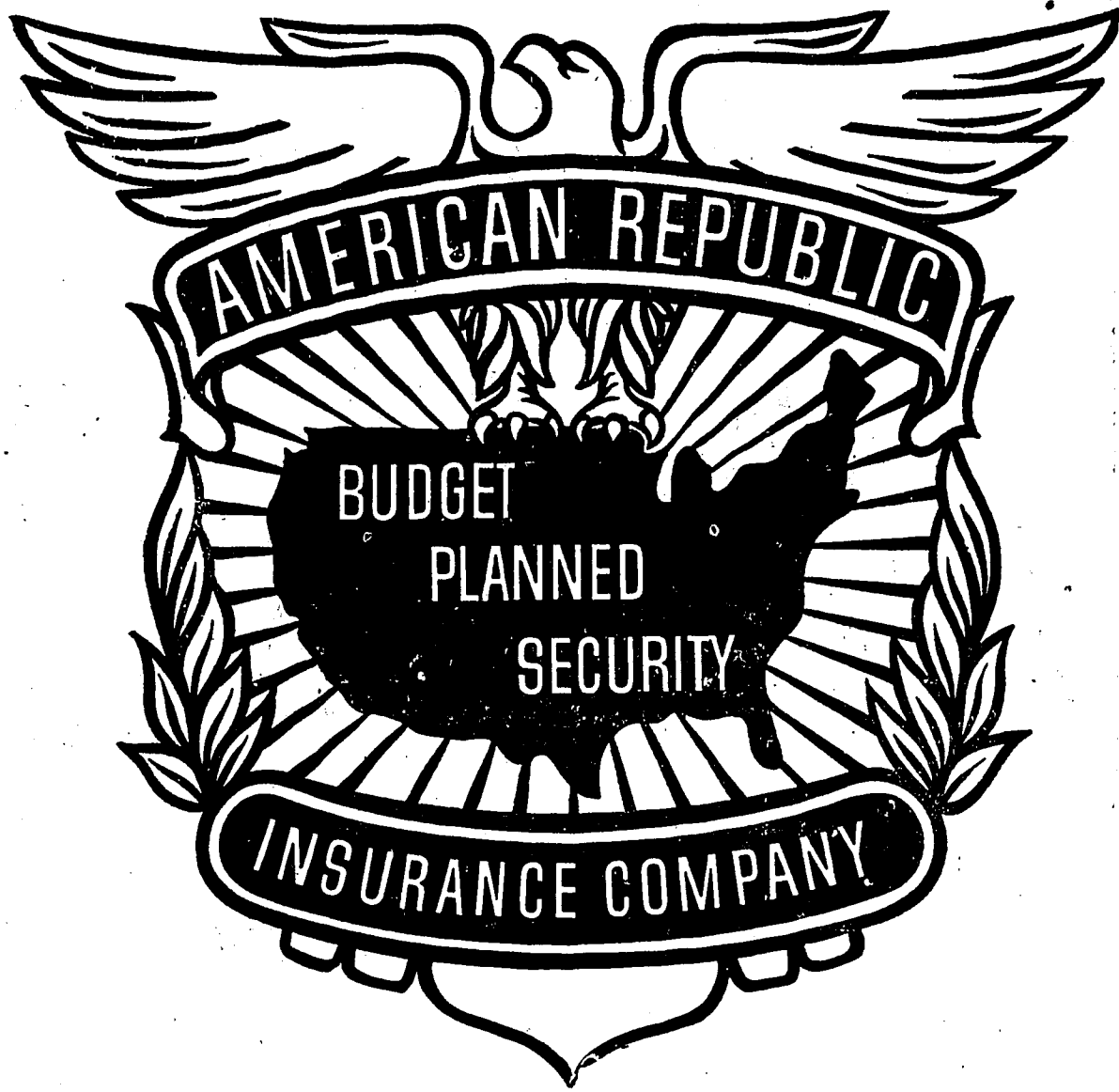

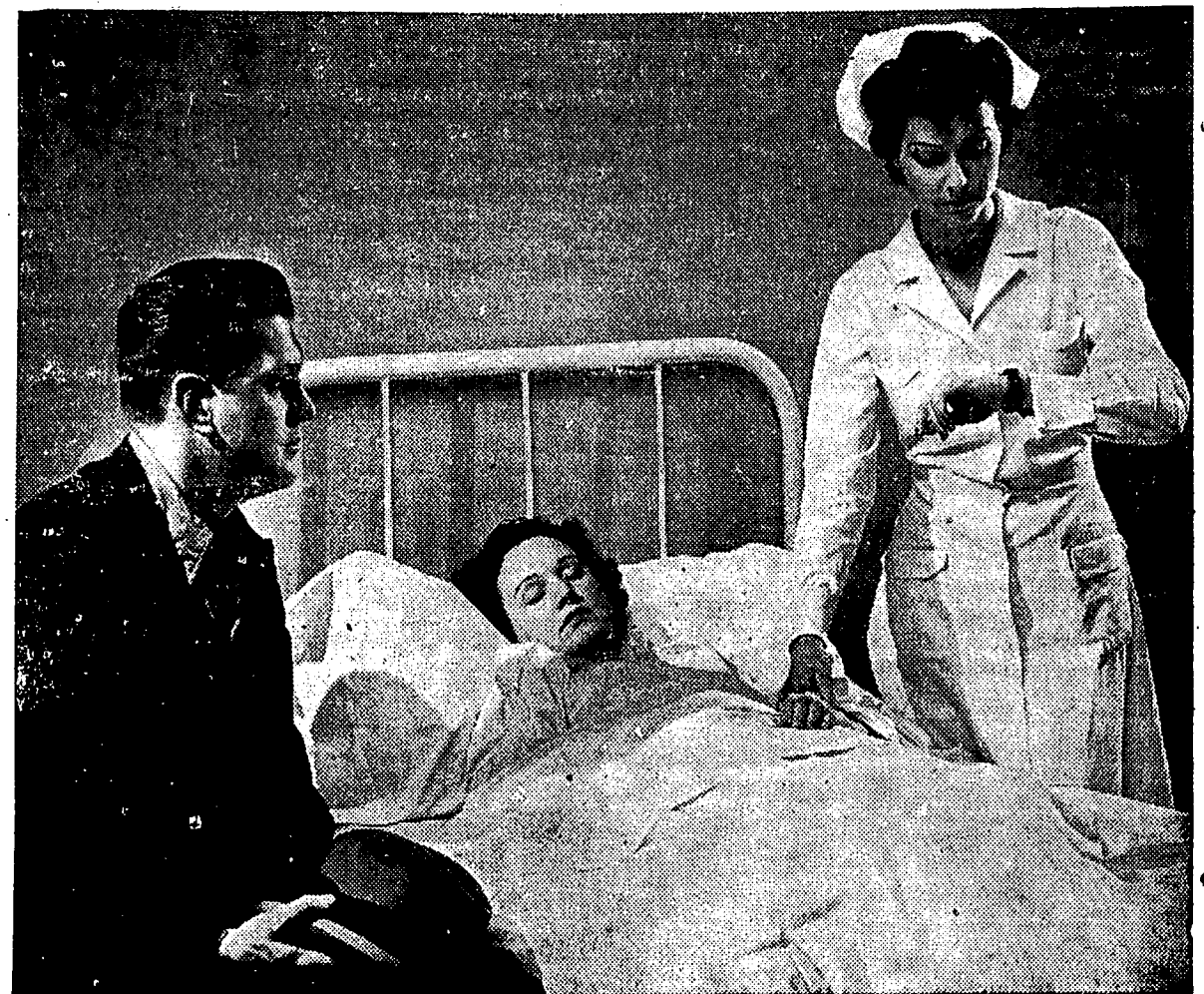

brothers, on Fix ridge, each had a phone, but could not call each other, as they were not on the same system. Each of the surrounding ridges were divided. Part of the lines had connections with the Interstate switchboard and part with the Potlatch board, with no connection between.

Also at this time the farmers operated switchboards at Leland and Southwick. The Leland board had connections with the Potlatch Company, while the Southwick board had connections with the Interstate and the Potlatch Company, both at the same time. There also were individual farm switches where the farmer would make connections between lines.

Early in 1915 Mr. Porter became ill and the Schupfer brothers purchased the Potlatch Telephone system from him. This consisted of the switchboard at Kendrick, lines and phones in Kendrick, Juliaetta and surrounding country, with connections to the

Pacific Telephone Co. for long distance service. Later in 1915 the Interstate company decided to go out of business and a deal was made and the Schupfer brothers took the Kendrick part of that system over and combined it with their system. The Fix Ridge company at Juliaetta also decided to discontinue their switchboard and have their lines connected to the Potlatch Telephone Company switchboard at Kendrick.

This change was a saving to the business firms, as it was no longer necessary to have two phones to have contact with all phone subscribers, also, farmers and others could phone to each other. This change was greatly appreciated by most everyone and since that time the switchboards at Leland and Southwick were discontinued and the lines run to Kendrick to be switched through the Potlatch Telephone Company's board.

The telephones were all of the crank type, with a compartment for batteries. (This compartment was also used by some business firms to hide the daily receipts). In 1937 a new switchboard was installed at Kendrick, and all, except the farmer phones at Kendrick and Juliaetta, were changed to the type where the battery was supplied from the switchboard and it was only necessary to lift the receiver to signal the operator. By 1950 the lines from Juliaetta to Kendrick, and the equipment at Kendrick were not able to take care of the increased demand for service, and a new dial system was installed at Juliaetta to relieve this situation.

Again, by 1957, it was decided that more switchboard equipment had to be added at Kendrick, so the latest type automatic electric dial switchboard was ordered. This arrived in the fall of 1958, and was installed through the winter and is now in service, and should give first class service.

This installation was made in its entirety by the Potlatch Telephone Company's own men, which kept the expense down and also helps to get acquainted with the operation of the equipment in case of trouble.

All of the phones owned by the company are now on dial, and also a number of farmer-owned lines and other farmer lines are rebuilding and making preparations to change to dial in the near future.

The operators are still on 24-hour duty at the manual switchboard to take care of the long distance calls, and switching farmer phones that are not yet equipped for dial service. Also, Juliaetta calls to Kendrick have to be dialed by the operator at the present — but Kendrick may dial Juliaetta direct.

Today nit many independent companies remain. There are only about a dozen in the state of Idaho — and only a few with more subscribers than the Potlatch Telephone Co.

In the 50 years that the Schupfer Brothers have been connected with the Potlatch Telephone Company there have been over eighty different operators employed. (A list is being gathered and they will appreciate anyone having worked there to send in their name and date worked).

The operation of the company has been more or less of a family affair. When it was first acquired it was managed and maintained by Herman Schupfer. During World War I and since that time, it has been managed and maintained by Otto Schupfer. From 1920 until her death in 1951, their sister, Ida, was chief operator and bookkeeper.

Donald Eichner has been an employee of the company for the past four years, and is lineman and helps Otto with the maintenance and operation of the system. Herman has been an employee of the Washington Water Power Co. since 1924, and was retired in 1957.

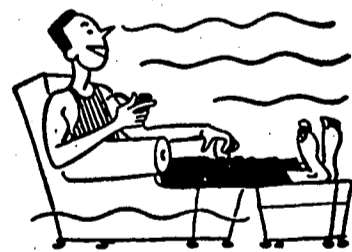

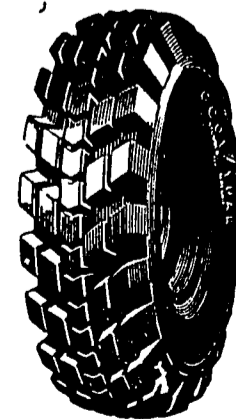
