

#### **GHOST TOWN**

(By C. Y. Groseclose)

It was early spring of 1996 when an ambulance sped out of the inland seaport of Lewiston and headed east toward the ghost village of Kendrick, to pick up one of the few remaining residents of the once prosperous village, who had become desperately ill.

No longer could the village boast of a country doctor. When the last one had retired, no other could be persuaded to come in.

Only one decrepit grocery store remained. An unpainted service station served anyone who chanced to pass that way and found themselves in need of assistance to push their way to more imposing surroundings. The corner drug store still showed some of its old signs, but the door sagged on its hinges and a window was broken out. A couple of warehouses still clinging to the side of the railroad was the only remaining sign of prosperity.

Several, perhaps a dozen houses still showed signs of occupancy. These were mostly recently retired farmers who still wished to keep in contact with the farms they had so recently leased to younger men.

The once beautiful and smooth road up the valley was pitted and wash-boarded, and at a few places covered with rock where gully-washers had piled debris from the hillsides.

Ten years before a high school bond election had failed to pass for the fifth time called, and a few weeks later the residents had been deeply chagrined by a report out of Boise that the district had been divided into the several adjoining school districts. The old school was condemned as no longer safe nor adequate.

The school teachers, of course, had been the first to leave — scattering into various states surrounding they had given the best they had to build up the area as well as the village, but had failed. A few of the families with children, who were renters, had followed before the fol-

lowing school term. Before five years had passed even the most determined of the young families had given up and moved to greener pastures. Business had closed down for lack of patronage. Even the churches now held services only on Sunday morning once each month to encourage the oldsters in their

closing days. Thus another western town had ceased to exist except in memory as others had so often before when progress was stopped. — C. Y.

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



#### FISH FED BY NEW TECHNIQUE

Feeding the fish at Hagerman Hatchery is easy and fast these days now that this truck and new mechanical blower-type pellet and crumble feeder is in operation. Truck hopper is loaded automatically with enough dry fish food for 100,000 pounds of trout from new 14-ton capacity bin in only two minutes. Pellet blower has advantages over hand-feeding method used previously because labor time is cut to less than half, and pellets are released just a few inches from water level of ponds and raceways, thus preventing wastage along driveways. During past two years, the department has substituted pellets and meal as trout food rather than older, less satisfactory red meats and ground fish and ofal. The change-over has benefited Idaho anglers through lowered food costs and elimination of costly refrigeration systems previously needed to store meat foods.
