Scientists who developed the rotpreventing material say it can also be used with certain fabric-coloring pigments to make cottons more resistant to deterioration by sunshine. Technically, the material is a water soluable acid colloid of methylolmelamine, a chemical that forms resins. The resin used on the cottons penetrates the fibers to become an actual part of the threads.

ORDINANCE NO. 113

An Ordinance prohibiting dogs from running at large within the incorporated limits of the Village of Juliaetta. Providing for a penalty for the violation of any of the terms of this Ordinance and repealing Ordinance No. 111 of the Village of Juliaetta, Idaho.
