STATE POSITION

Answering criticism and questions the Nez Perce County Fair Board has come out with a brochure for the purpose of explaining its position and aims. It says:

The Nez Perce County Fair Board was created for the purpose of organizing and operating a county fair. The members of the board are appointed by the Commissioners of Nez Perce county.

Funds are derived from taxes levied by the County Commissioners, from rentals of space for commercial exhibits and from admission fees.

The Commissioners of Nez Perce County acquired a tract of 12 1/2 acres this year and have an option on an adjoining 12 1/2 acres that will be

acquired next year for a total of 25 acres. This site is bounded on the east and west by 13th and 14th Streets, on the north and south by Airway and Burrell Avenues in the Lewiston Orchards.

The building projected for this area has an inside floor space of 140 feet in width, 220 feet in length, and a minimum height of 18 feet. It is a laminated arch-type building with no pillars or posts on the floor area. The building, complete with rest rooms, heat and light will cost approximately \$150,000. It can seat about 7,000. It will afford sufficient space to properly display the usual fair exhibits, agriculture and home economics exhibits, 4-H Clubs, etc. It is large enough for rental to home show organizations, automobile and boat show groups, etc.

Notes will be issued bearing 4 percent annual interest rate and retireable within 10 years. When all indebtedness has been paid for the construction and equipping of the buildings, they then may be conveyed to Nez Perce County and the corporation may be abolished.

Hugh Parks, Juliaetta, has been named as a member of this board and was elected president of Nez Perce County Fair Buildings, Inc.

Nez Perce county residents interested may obtain copies of this prospectus from Mr. Parks, as well as any information they may desire.

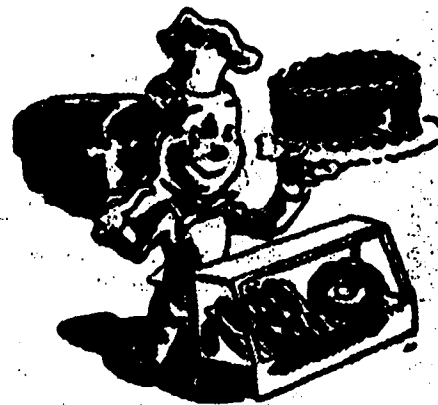

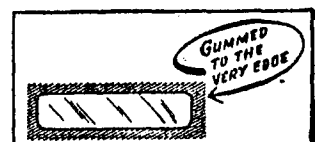

All youngsters enjoy desks of their own, where they can do their homework and club projects and keep some of their personal items. Yet their bedrooms frequently lack the space for a full-size child's desk.

Here's a plan for an economical, easy-to-make wall desk designed with a fold-up work surface, so that the desk projects less than a foot from the wall when closed. We'll guarantee the do-it-yourself handyman who makes one or more of these desks for his 4-H'ers, Future Farmers, Boy or Girl Scouts, or other youngsters in his family will be king of the household!



Economical, easy-to-make wall desk ideal for crowded bedrooms. Children will like it.

A few cuts with the portable electric saw, drilling for a few screw holes, a bit of sanding, and you're ready for assembly of the wall desk, which has a recommended width of 2 feet and height of 1 1/2 feet. Top, bottom, and sides of the desk are 1-inch lumber. The back is perforated hardboard attached to a 1/2 by 1-inch framework, which is fastened to the 1-inch lumber with glue and brads.

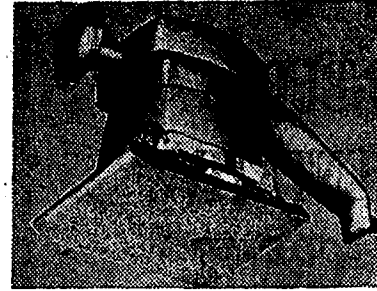
The desk is held to the wall with long screws used with corner braces, attached to stud locations. The desk work surface or lid is made of hardboard framed with molding. A unique feature of the desk is that the front face of the desk lid can be made into a chalkboard by finishing it with a slating or blackboard paint. Under the inside top of the desk a fluorescent lighting fixture is mounted as a finishing touch.

Several readers have asked our opinion of the new metal sanding sheets now available to do-it-yourselfers, either for use with a portable electric sander or sanding pad.

The idea of a metal sanding sheet, providing a permanent abrasive surface, definitely is catching on and one of the newest, called Carbitrit, is available with different surfaces for heavy or light sanding. These sanding sheets consist of tungsten carbide grits—almost as hard as diamonds—permanently bonded to metal and they do an excellent job of sanding. Use the right sheet for the work you're doing and you'll get as smooth a finish as you could desire.

To make sure permanent abrasive sheets maintain their original sanding capacity, it is well to soak or dip them occasionally in turpentine or paint thinner, being certain to dry them thoroughly before again using, to keep the sanding surface clean.

Another reader sends us a novel suggestion we'd like to pass along. Says he, "I replaced a shoe bag that was a little worn and was about to throw it out when it occurred to me it would be a good way to 'file' my hand tools at the end of my small workbench. I lacked clear wall space above the bench and tools always were a jumble in the drawer.

"So I hung the old shoe bag from the end of the bench and put my pliers, screwdrivers, files, tin snips, flat wrenches, and so on into the pockets. Most tools stick out the top enough to be identified. What's more, the tools are easy to get in and out—and always are within handy reach."

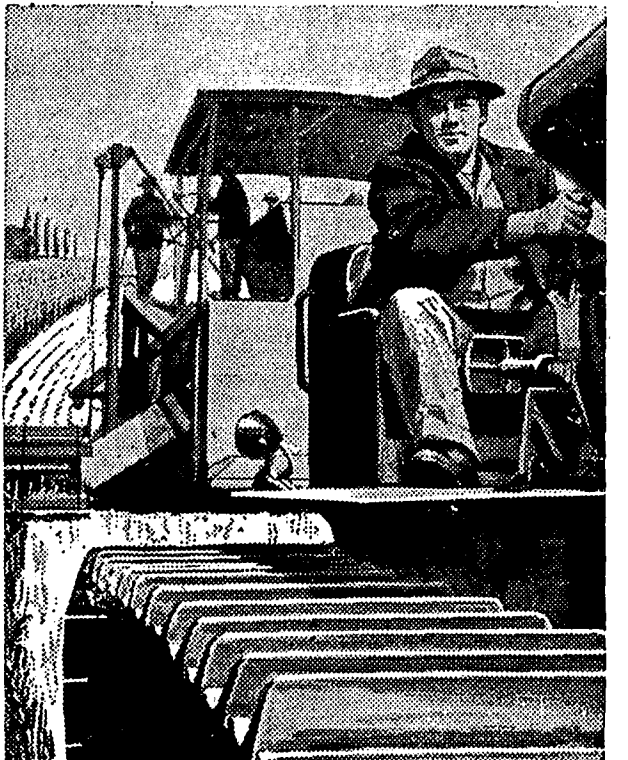
