At the regular monthly meeting of the Village Council on June 2, it was found necessary by the members of the Board to again ration the present supply of city water. The rationing went into effect yesterday, Wednesday, June 10.
The new restrictions, as outlined

in last week's issue, are imposed each day, but only every other day to the individual resident users. As in the past, watering will be permitted on alternate sides of the street as follows: On the north side of Main Street and west side of the school house hill street — on even numbered days. On the south side of Main Street and east side of the schoolhouse hill street, on odd numbered

With the apparent shortage of water, which is becoming more severe each year, the members of the council felt that it was imperative to have another source of water. With all available springs presently in use, the only alternative left to the village officials was the drilling of another well. This also is the recommendation of the state engineer, who has completed a thorough

survey of the local water system. The June 24 proposal asks for sufficient funds, an amount not in excess of \$10,000.00, to drill a well, install a pump, construct a pump house and connect the well to the city water system.


