



**KENDRICK, JULIAETTA LITTLE LEAGUERS OPEN PLAY AGAINST GENESEE TUESDAY**

The Kendrick-Juliaetta Little League team will start their 1959 eight-game schedule Tuesday evening at 8:00 o'clock, when they meet the Little Leaguers of Genesee on Armitage Field in Kendrick.

This year's Little League team is sponsored by the Kendrick Community Lions Club, has players from both Kendrick and Juliaetta, and will be playing in a five-team league with Genesee, Pottlatch, Deary and Bovill. Managers for the local aggregation are Herb Millard, Juliaetta, and Bob Magnuson and George Brocke, Jr., Kendrick.

The managers announced this week that all games will be played with a starting time of 8:00 p. m., whether at home or on the opponents field.

The Kendrick-Juliaetta team will follow all of the rules set up by the National Little League organization. The only exception is one rule, listed as Section "G" — Rule No. 6. Other rules that will be followed by the club include: Game length not to exceed five innings; home team to supply two umpires; no metal cleats allowed; batter's helmet only required.

M. for the purpose of voting upon the question and proposition of issuing Water Revenue Bonds in the principal amount of not more than \$10,000.00 for the purpose of acquiring funds to pay the cost of the following improvements and betterments to the water system: (a) Drilling a well; (b) Acquisition and installation of a pump; (c) Constructing a pump house; (d) Connecting the well to the city water system, pursuant to the provisions of Ordinance No. 491 of this Village, which is hereby referred to for further particulars, and which is made by reference a part of this Notice.

All electors of said Village having the qualifications to vote at general elections for the election of Village officers of said Village, are entitled to vote at the election herein noticed. Said electors are required to have and possess the qualifications of electors of the State of Idaho as required by the Constitution and laws thereof, and to have resided within the limits of said Village for three months preceding said election and to be registered as required by law. Those electors who have registered for the last preceding general election held in said Village are not required to register again for the election herein noticed so long as he or she shall continue to reside at the same address in which he or she is living and from which he or she shall have registered, but those who failed to register for said general election, or thereafter, or have failed or neglected heretofore to vote for two successive biennial Village Elections, are required to register in order to vote at the election herein noticed. If an elector has registered and has removed from the Village and has remained away for a period of one year, his name shall be stricken from the register, and if he shall again reside in the Village for at least thirty days, he shall again register.

Said election shall be conducted in other particulars as other municipal elections.

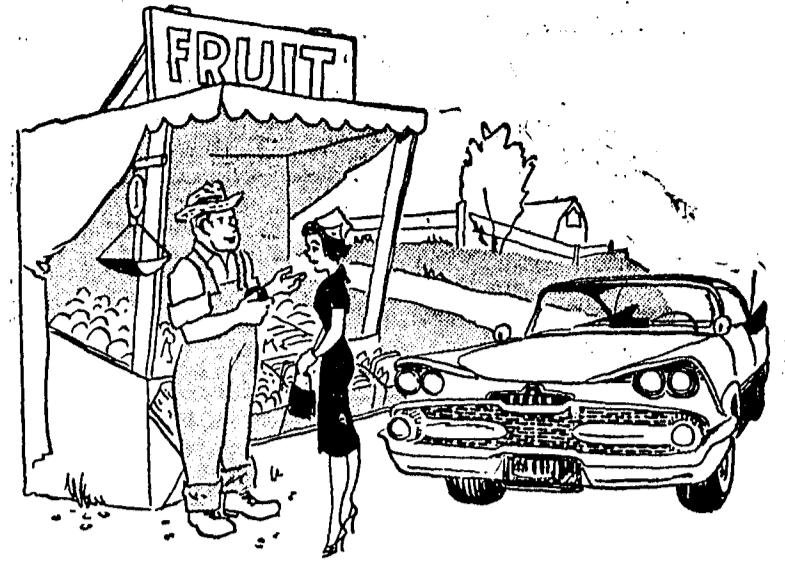

Remember, Drive with traffic. You are probably going too fast if you are passing many cars -- too slow if cars are passing you.

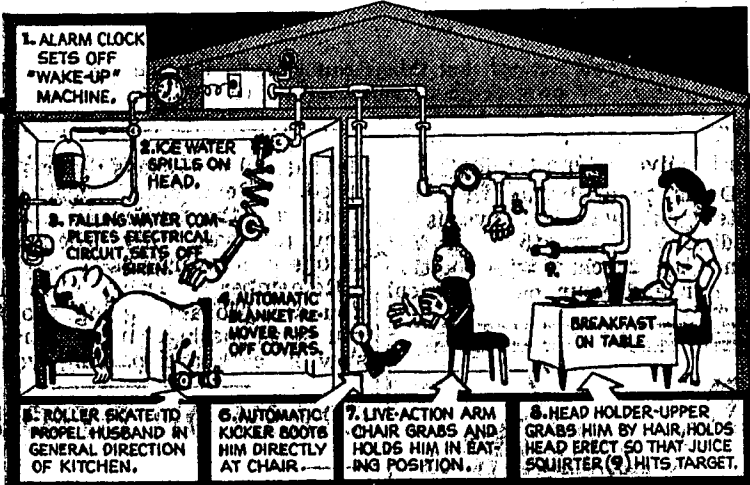

### Solution to Breakfast Problem



Having a problem getting the family up for breakfast? In this age of electronic miracles, the gadget shown above is suggested as a logical solution.

It will arouse the sleeper, in more ways than one, but once up, he can help establish good eating habits for the family.

Strong measures (maybe not to the extent shown above) are necessary, according to leading doctors and nutritionists who have studied the subject, to insure that breakfast will not be the day's most neglected meal.

Breakfast, according to those diet authorities, should supply about one-fourth to one-third of the daily food requirements. They point out that the "let's skip breakfast" people prove to be less alert, less efficient and more susceptible to fatigue than those who eat a good morning meal.

The human body is so constructed that for maximum health it requires fairly even intakes of food at regular intervals. You can't make up for the lack of a good breakfast.

People who are troubled in holding the right weight should eat a good breakfast. If they neglect breakfast they may eat too hearty a lunch or dinner. And they just might have a snack or two between meals.

What constitutes a good breakfast? The foods essential to the day's first meal include fruit or fruit juice, cereal, milk or other beverage, and several slices of toast. Eggs and breakfast meat frequently should be included.

These foods are necessary both for children and adults. They supply the nutrients essential for the physical and mental stimulus for work—and play.

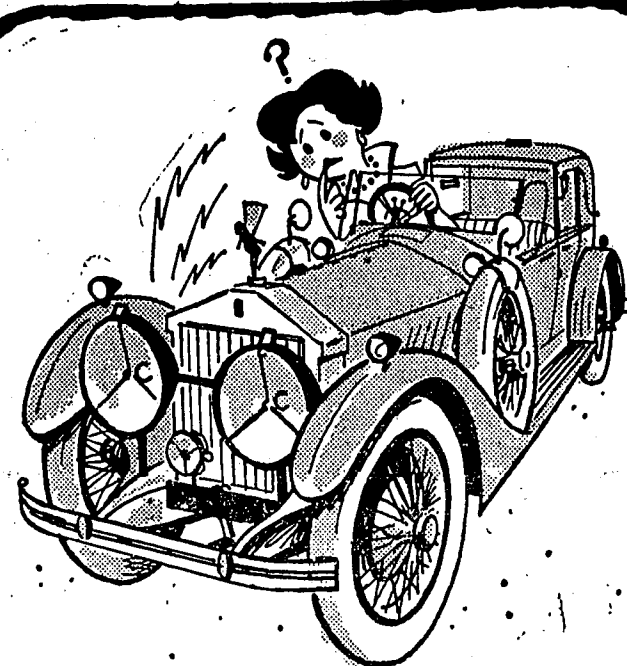

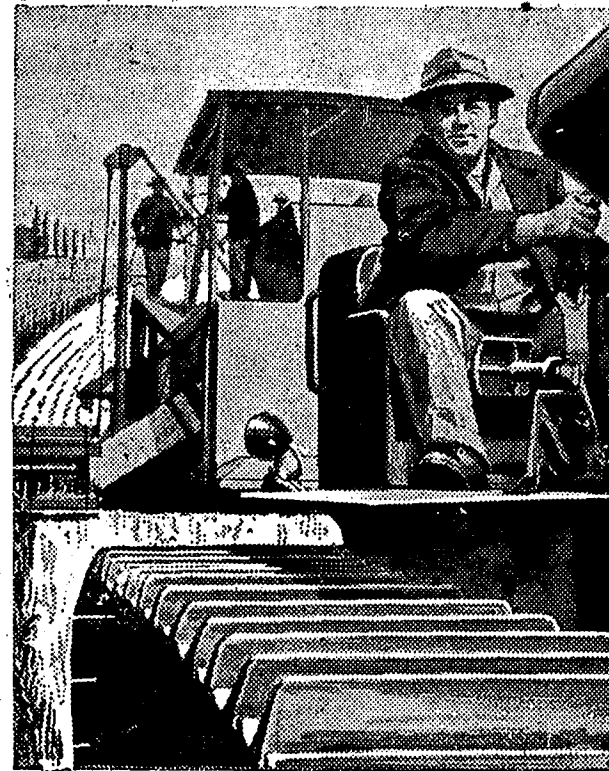
