### DEATH CALLS C. E. "ED." GERTJE WED.

Christian E. (Ed.) Gertje, 75, a farmer in the Cameron-Southwick area for many years, died of a heart attack at his home Wednesday, June 24, at 5:00 p. m. His death came as a distinct shock to family and friends, as he apparently was enjoying excellent health. He had worked a bit about his home and garden that day, and as was his habit, had lay down for a brief nap before dinner — death coming just at the conclusion of his nap.

He had farmed near Cameron from childhood, having grown up on a farm, and he loved the good earth and to watch it produce. Although still residing on the farm, he had been retired from active work for several years.

Mr. Gertje was born Sept. 22, 1883, in Roberts County, North Dakota, and lived there until 1890, when he moved to Cameron as a lad of seven. He was united in marriage to Anna M. Behrens at Cameron, October 14, 1907. She survives at the family home.

Mr. Gertje was a member of the Emmanuel Lutheran Church at Cameron. He served for several years as a school trustee in that district — and was always interested in the welfare of the children, as well as in all community betterments. He was the last survivor of the Gertje pioneer family, his sister preceding him in death last year.

Friendliness was Mr. Gertje's code with everyone. He loved to visit and to joke, and a smile and friendly wave of the hand was his habit with everyone. The well-filled chapel and profusion of floral offerings testified to the high regard in which he was held.

Survivors, besides his wife include a son, Roy Gertje of Southwick, three daughters, Mrs. Viola Rosenfelt of Walla Walla, Mrs. Margaret Flaig of The Dalles, Ore., and Mrs. Myrtle Parks of Juliaetta. Seven grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren also survive.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday at 2:00 p. m. in the Brower-Wann Chapel at Lewiston, with the Rev. Theo Meske, pastor of Emmanuel Lutheran Church, Cameron, officiating. Music was furnished by Mrs. Bud Lee, Mrs. Jack Lohman and Mrs. Burton Souders, Jr., who sang "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere" and "Beyond the Sunset," accompanied at the organ by Pauline Brigham.

### A. G. COWGER DIES IN TRACTOR UPSET

Abner Gilmore Cowger, 52, Southwick farmer and woodworker, was fatally injured at 9:30 a. m. Saturday, when a crawler tractor with which he was skidding logs, fell backwards on him. He was operating the machine on a steep incline and had made several trips up and down the slope previous to the fatal accident.

Mr. Cowger suffered a crushed left leg and right arm. Immediately following the accident Dr. Christensen was called, but Mr. Cowger was dead before he was able to reach him. Death apparently being caused by shock, as he lived about half an hour after the tractor turned over on him.

Mr. Cowger was born March 24, 1907, at Caldwell, and came to Southwick with his parents in 1919. He married Helen Jennings at Southwick May 31, 1933.

Surviving besides his wife are his mother, Mrs. Bessie Cowger, Orofino; two children, William J. Cowzer, Clarkston, and Mrs. Don Wright, Southwick; three sisters, Women's Army Corps Sgt. Mable Cowger, San Francisco, and Mrs. Pearl Hadden and Mrs. Lyle Goffinet, both of Orofino; four brothers, Harry Cowger of Emmett, Fred Cowger of Orofino, Frank Cowger of Headquarters and Ernest Cowger of Southwick. Three grandchildren also survive.

The body was taken to the Brower-Wann Funeral Home at Lewiston.

Funeral services were held at the Brower-Wann Chapel, Tuesday at 11:00 a. m., with the Rev. Edwin Towle of the Lewiston First Methodist Church officiating.

### MONDAY DEADLINE SET ON KENDRICK DIKING PROJECT

Monday, July 6, has been set as the deadline date for the beginning of work on the diking and dredging of the Potlatch river in Kendrick, Frank Abrams, mayor, said this week.

After several weeks spent in unwinding government red tape and legal complications, A. L. Canady and W. L. VanWinkle, contractors, and Don Smith, engineer, all of Ontario, Oregon, were in Kendrick Saturday to make final arrangements for the work.

Canady told W. L. Rogers of Kendrick that the heavy equipment would be on the scene and working by deadline time, Monday.

The equipment includes four tractors and three trucks, plus compressor and other small pieces.

The headquarters of the construction crew will be in the former Fred Zimmerman home in the west part of town. Rogers reported that Mrs. Canady will accompany her husband and will be the bookkeeper as well as housekeeper for her husband and two other officials.

Rogers said that the company has 90 days from the starting date until the project must be completed, but that the contractors plan to be on the job no longer than 60 days.

### KENDRICK VOTERS APPROVE WATER BONDS 46 TO 4

Kendrick residents overwhelmingly passed a special election ballot Wednesday of last week, allowing the village to issue revenue bonds for the purpose of obtaining a more adequate water system for the city.

Frank Abrams, Kendrick's mayor, said that of the 108 registered voters in the city, only 50 turned out to vote, and of the 50 — 46 voted "Yes" and only 4 "Nos."

Abrams said that now, with the approval of the bonds, a special meeting will be held tonight (Wednesday, July 1) by the trustees and the village attorney, Frank Barton, to determine the next steps in the legal chain before actual work can begin.

"We will get the project started in the near future and have hopes of completing the operation this year, maybe in time to ease the critical water shortage that now exists," Mr. Abrams said.

"We should know by next week just what the procedure will be and have an idea just how long it will take before we can have the operation complete," he added.

With the passage of the water bonds, residents being served by the Kendrick system will have an increase of about 50c per month on their minimum water bills, to meet the cost of the well drilling and other necessary expenses.

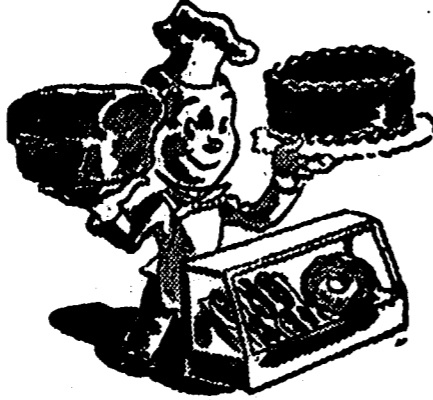

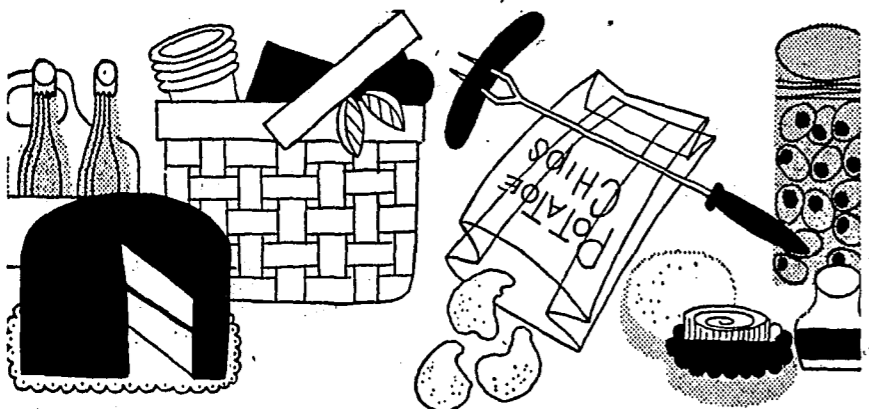

**IDAHO HEART ASSN. PROVIDES MANY STATE SERVICES**

The Idaho Heart Association during the past five months has handled nearly 1,400 inquiries from individuals, groups, and doctors in our state, reports Dr. Richard A. Forney, president of the organization.

"We feel that the usefulness of knowledge about heart disease multiplies in direct proportion to the number of people who share it," points out Dr. Forney. In providing physician speakers, as well as fifteen films on heart disease now available through the University of Idaho film library, we believe that we have performed a real service to Idahoans. In the five month period, we have arranged for 67 showings to such groups as P.T.A.'s, industrial workers, hospital nurses, as well as for classroom use.

The Idaho Heart Association has answered 300 requests for special and general literature to doctors and their patients alike.

Telephone calls relative to rheumatic fever progress, sponsored jointly by the Idaho Heart Association and the Idaho Department of Public Health, have numbered over 1,000 in this period. In some cases information relative to direct medical assistance was desired; however, the majority of requests was for literature and the availability of services as well as professional publications on rheumatic fever.

"While our association cannot pay for direct patient care, we can and do provide information about services that are already available for heart patients and their families, not only in Idaho but throughout the West," states Dr. Forney.

"Tremendous sums, far greater than those available to the Idaho Heart Association, would be required to meet such requests for direct financial assistance on a fair and comprehensive basis. Moreover, diverting the Association's limited fund from research centers to a comparative few individual patients would undermine our organization's ability to carry out the research program designed to benefit all heart patients in Idaho," stresses Dr. Forney.

For the first time, our research centers are beginning to glimpse where and how the answers to strokes, coronary diseases, and hypertension may be found. We must not be turned away from our goal of providing knowledge that physicians still need to know for 80 percent of their heart patients. New knowledge through research is the greatest hope we have of reducing a national heart death rate from its current high of 54 percent.

**PLASTIC DANGEROUS**

The popularity of plastic film as a packing material or as a covering is increasing because of the virtues of this material, but the same plastic film also presents a safety hazard, particularly to infants and small children, according to Idaho's Administrator of Health.

Dr. Terrell O. Carver noted that some 49 cases of plastic bag suffocation have been reported in the nation since January, and that 41 of these were children less than one year old.

Once plastic film has served its intended usefulness, it should not be left around the house or given to infants or young children as a plaything. Young children playing with this ultra-thin, limp film may pull it over their face and be delighted because they can see through it — but the film may cling to the face and cause asphyxiation.

Thin plastic film is not designed for makeshift mattress or furniture covers, so persons should buy adequate covers which are available in store, rather than use the potentially dangerous film.

Plastic film helps preserve the life of certain merchandise, but it also can be a hazard to the life of children. Parents should be careful not to leave this potentially dangerous film where youngsters can get it.

**IN R.O.T.C. TRAINING**

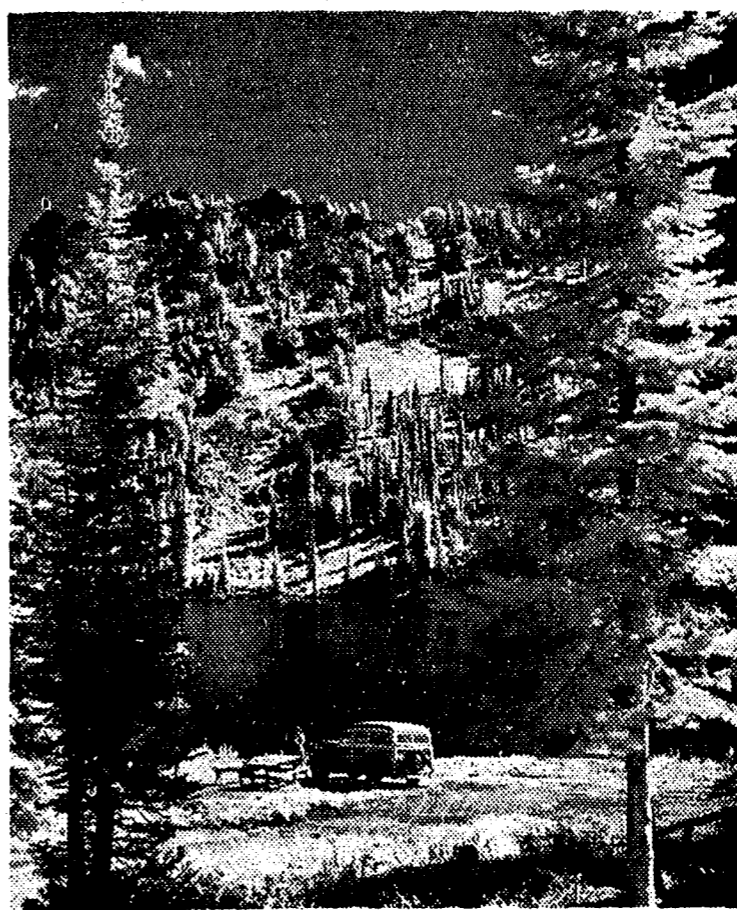

TRAILS END is marked by Black Lake in the Seven Devils range near Hell's Canyon. It provides good fishing and camping facilities on a road which goes into the rugged country from the town of Council in southwestern Idaho. Several other high lakes are within striking distance from this point. Gem state visitors and residents alike are attracted to such sapphire-like lakes which nestle by the hundreds in the coolness of mountain solitudes. Some are reached by road, some only by trails, and some remain ice-dim until after July 4th in an average year. The Fish and Game department advises that Forest Service personnel be contacted for specific road and trail information before parties venture into such wilderness areas.

**FOOD POISONING**

Boise — Another health hazard during the summer months is food poisoning, and hot weather invariably brings increased reports of this illness. Food poisoning, which is usually caused by toxins that are produced by several kinds of bacteria, can be avoided by a few precautions.

Almost any moist food can serve as a toxin producing area for the bacteria, which need only food, water, warmth and a little time to do their work. Some of the more common foods reported in outbreaks of food poisoning during the summer include cream puffs, deviled eggs, corned beef, weiners, ham, hamburger mix, turkey, chicken, cooked potatoes, baby formula and banana, chocolate or other types of cream

pies. Although boiling will kill some of the toxin producing bacteria, it won't necessarily destroy this poison once it has been formed. The best way to avoid food poisoning is to keep all moist foods either very hot, or ice cold. If you plan to store cooked food, protect it by covering it while it is cooking, and then refrigerate it as soon as possible. More than 30 to 60 minutes cooling out of the refrigerator can be dangerous.

Food poisoning normally causes severe abdominal cramps and nausea, from two to several hours after eating. If you suspect food poisoning, consult a physician as soon as possible.

Use caution and care in food handling. The old rule of keeping hot foods hot and cold foods cold can prevent a lot of misery.
