Robert Meserve, superintendent of schools said that as soon as the new plans are completed and arrive in Kendrick, a special meeting of the directors will be called to thoroughly study and go over them with the architects and prepare a call for bids for the construction of the new building. It is hoped that bids can be called for by the first week in August.

HIGHWAY REPAIRS ON STATE ROUTE 7

The rock base of about three miles of State Highway 7 between Kendrick and Deary will be treated later this summer by the State Highway Department in an attempt to stabilize it.

The road, 2.7 miles downgrade from Bear ridge, has deteriorated severely during the winter. District Engineer Philip A. Marsh said Monday that when rock has been laid on the road bed it stood up under the final stages of construction.

"It weathers badly," he said. Marsh said the highway department has advertised for bids on the project for opening the last week of July or the first week in August.

Four stabilizers will be tried on separate sections of the roadway including cement, lime, cracked oil coating and asphaltic emulsion. The stabilizers will be mixed in with new rock base.

SIMPLIPLAN CLAY PLANT AT BOVILL

A J. R. Simplot Co. representative, Philip T. Peterson, announced in Moscow Saturday that his company plans to construct a million dollar clay processing plant at Bovill beginning August 15.

Peterson, Simplot engineer living in Moscow, reported two buildings, 120 by 100 feet and 80 by 100 feet, respectively, will be built at the company's site near Bovill. Offices and chemical and metallurgical laboratories are already completed.

Preliminary work is underway on a 14-foot high, 250-foot long dam on Moose Creek. It will be finished by fall, Peterson said. The dam will impound 100 million gallons of water a mile above the plant site.

A 10,000-gallon water storage tank and 6,900 feet of railway track into Bovill from the plant are also being constructed.

"We will have a product sometime in October," Peterson continued. The company engineer said white glass sand would be produced immediately and within a year clays for paper filler and high gloss paper surfacing.

"Flour silica will be made at a later date, Peterson related. The silica, he explained, is used in toothpaste. It is a fine white sand.

Peterson estimated the plant would represent \$1,500,000 investment by next fall when all phases are in production.

KENDRICK SENIORS WILL NEED 36 CREDITS TO GRADUATE IN 1960

SCHOOL TO START HERE AUGUST 31

Students attending schools within Kendrick Joint School District No. 283, will return to their class rooms on Monday, August 31, it was announced at the Board of Directors meeting Monday evening.

Due to a recent ruling by the state it is now required that students attend classes for 177 days, instead of the previous 172.

The directors explained that by starting school in August they would second week in June of 1960. The second week in June of 1960. They way it now stands, schools will be out next spring on May 27.

The new schedule calls for 17 school days that will be taken in vacation time. Most of the vacations are required by law. Of the 17 vacation days, 11 will be during the Christmas and New Year period, and three during spring vacation.

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Kendrick School District administrators Monday evening unanimously approved an increase in the number of units required to graduate from high school from 17 to 18.

Previously, students at Kendrick had been required to have passing grades for 34 credits, but the graduating class of 1960 will be required to have 36 credits to receive their diplomas.

"We have increased our requirements to stay in line with other schools in the state," Gerald Ingle, chairman of the board, said. "Many of the schools in Idaho now require 19 or 20 units for graduation," he added.

Idaho law requires that each student being graduated from high school be passing in 34 credits, or 17 units. This will be the first year that Kendrick High School has required more units for graduation than is required by the state.

"Most students graduate with more than the required amount, anyway, and those who have only the required number are usually the ones who will need the extra education when school is out and they enter schools of higher learning or some profession," the chairman added.

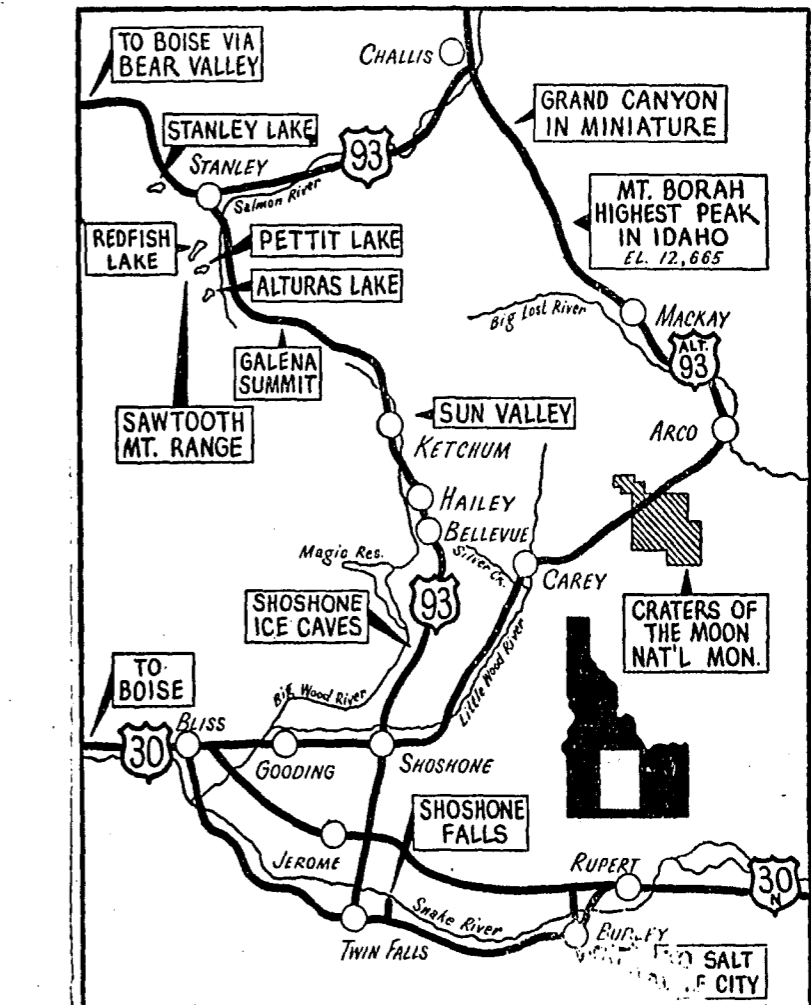

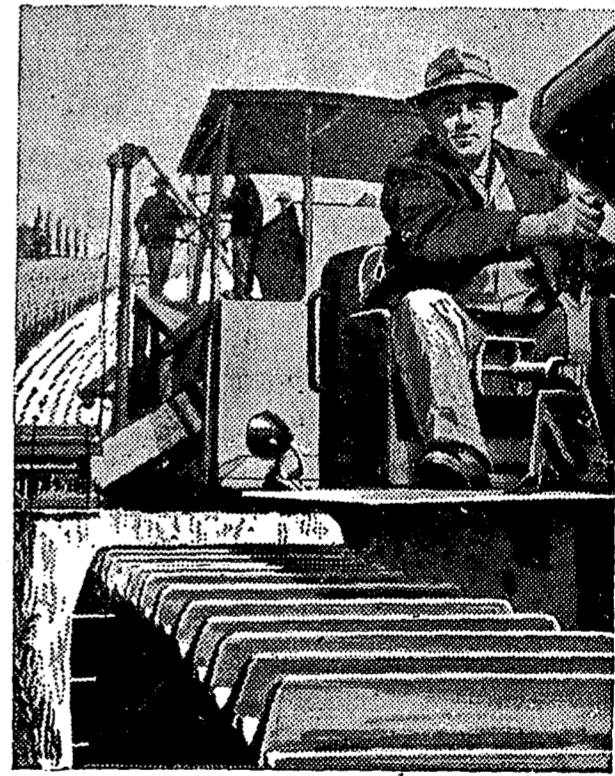
Kendrick, Idaho, July 8, 1959
