The faculty is complete with only one change from last year: At the Southwick Elementary School Mrs. Darwin Tarry will continue as Principal and teach grades 1, 2 and 3. Mrs. Nora Callison will return to teach grades 4, 5 and 6.

At the Juliaetta Elementary School Gerald White will continue as principal and teach grade 8; Mrs. Lester Nelson, grade 5; Mrs. Cecil Gruell, grade 4; Mrs. Eugene Taylor, grade 3; Mrs. Gil Erlwin, grade 2, and Mrs. Harley Perryman grade 1.

George Merrick will be the principal and teach math and science in the Junior High at Kendrick, with Mrs. Janice Jones handling Language and Arts.

In the Sr. High School Ben P. Cook will continue as principal and teach mathematics; Mrs. Elsie Deobald, Commercial; Dennis Racicot, coach and Social Studies; Mrs. Geo. Merrick, librarian and English; Robert Hall, Science; Lowell Carlson, English and General Science;

Elmer Stitzlein, district music; R. L. Meserve, district superintendent.

Mrs. Helen Cowger is both custodian and Hot Lunch cook at Southwick.

Mr. and Mrs. Eckman will continue as custodians of the Juliaetta building.

Arthur Foster will continue as custodian of the Kendrick building.

Mrs. Wm. Carlton is the School Lunch cook at Juliaetta, assisted by Mrs. Eckman.

Mrs. E. M. White is the School Lunch cook at Kendrick, assisted by Mrs. Edgar Dammarell.

Bus drivers and routes remain the same as last year — Bob Smith, Dick Benjamin, Ben P. Cook, C. A. McAlister, Verlin Benjamin, Ed. Mielke, Ted Peters and Aaron Wells. Mr. Wells is also school bus mechanic.

### DAVE GLENN DIES HERE, FORMER RESIDENT OF AREA

Dave Glenn of Los Angeles, who had been visiting in the home of his niece, Mrs. Andy Cox, since June, died at the St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston, Wednesday, August 12.

Mr. Glenn, a former resident of Juliaetta, was born at Black Mountain, North Carolina, in 1874. He came to this section in 1909, making his home in Juliaetta until 1922.

He was a carpenter, and helped to build the school house and many other buildings at that time.

He moved to Los Angeles in 1922, and had resided there ever since.

In June he came up to visit with relatives in the area and was a house guest of Mr. and Mrs. Andy Cox on American Ridge. He took ill on Saturday, and was taken to the hospital in Lewiston. Sunday he suffered a stroke and passed away on the following Wednesday.

Mr. Glenn's oldest son, Frank, was at his bedside at the time of death and took the body back to California where funeral services were held in Glendale on Friday, and he was laid to rest in the Forest Lawn Cemetery.

He is survived by four sons and one daughter, all of whom reside in California. Three brothers in North Carolina, and one sister in Alabama.

Mr. Glenn was a brother of the late John Glenn and will be remembered here by many.

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### BLAST REMOVES SWIMMING HOLE BLUFF WED. A. M.

The Kendrick fire siren wailed three times Wednesday morning at 9:05, signifying that the dynamite blast, that minutes later collapsed the rocky point near the upper Lewiston Grain Growers warehouse, was only 10 minutes away.

At 9:15 a. m. Wednesday workers for the Canaday and Van Winkle Construction Company touched off the detonator that exploded several hundred pounds of dynamite at the once popular Potlatch river swimming hole.

The "thud-like" explosion proved anything but spectacular to watch, showing little more than signs of causing a sizeable cloud of dust and causing the ground to tremble for an instant. Only a few rocks crossed the river channel, but the purpose of the dynamiting was achieved.

The cliff once housed the water tunnel for the diversion of stream water power to the Kendrick Flour Mill. It is now in a state of broken and loosened boulders. The blast literally pulverized the cliff, making it now possible to move in with bulldozers and shovel.

The rock that is to be removed from the blast area will be used as rip-rap in the construction of the dike along the Potlatch river. Its removal also straightens the river channel from the warehouse to the end of project.

Kendrick residents were warned Monday and Tuesday to open their windows for the blast, originally scheduled for 5:00 o'clock Tuesday evening. However, the time was postponed due to N. P. trains pulling in just before and just after the hour set. Residents who lived close to the area were requested to clear it.

So far as we know there was no damage to property, and workmen were on the scene beginning the task of removing the rock shortly after the explosion.

### FIRE EXTINGUISHED

Members of the State Forestry Department Fire crews finished the job of mopping up and extinguishing the big Bear Creek fire about two miles up the canyon, last week-end. The blaze covered an estimated 40 to 50 acres, burning brush, snags, and a small amount of green timber.

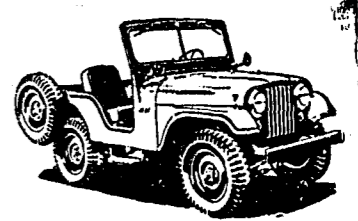

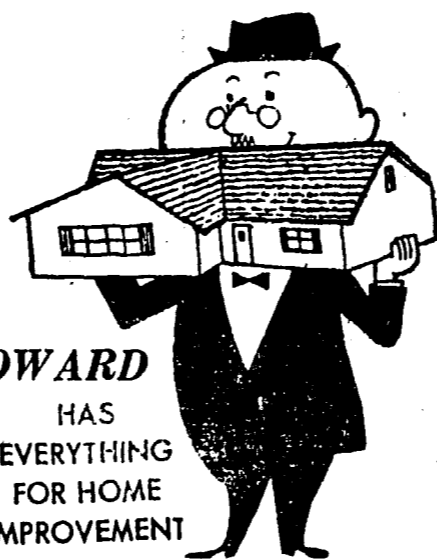

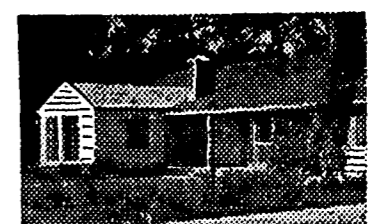

**Bigham Raises French Wheat**

July 15, 1923 — Walter Bigham, a young farmer on American Ridge, has five acres of magnificent wheat on the farm, developed in four years from six kernels of the common wheat grown in France, says the Star-Mirror. Bigham, who served with the 91st Division during the war, brought home the six kernels with him and planted them four years ago, carefully keeping the grain separate from other wheat, and planting each year the increase until he now has a five-acre patch of as fine wheat as one could wish to see. The wheat grows from six to six and one-half feet tall, and is bearded. So far it has proved smut proof and the stalks are so large and firm that it resists the high winds and rain without falling.

A sample of the wheat, which is now more than six feet tall, was brought to the Star-Mirror office. The heads are long and well filled and it would seem probable that Mr. Bigham has introduced into this district a valuable variety of wheat.

Growing nearby is a 100-acre field of certified Jenkins Club wheat, on the ranch of Frank Benscoter, a pioneer of American Ridge. This wheat is also nearly six feet tall, very uniform, will run well over 40 bushels to the acre, barring accident. Crop reports from the ridges in the southern part of Latah county are uniformly favorable. While there is a considerable acreage of wheat and some oats, there is also a large acreage of beans, which promises a big yield.

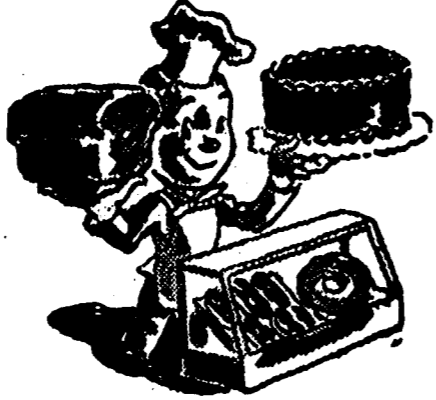

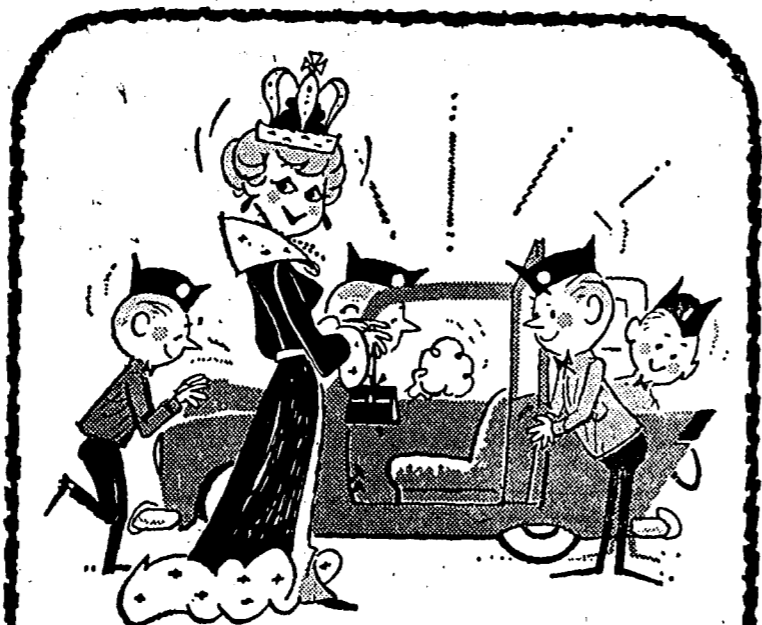

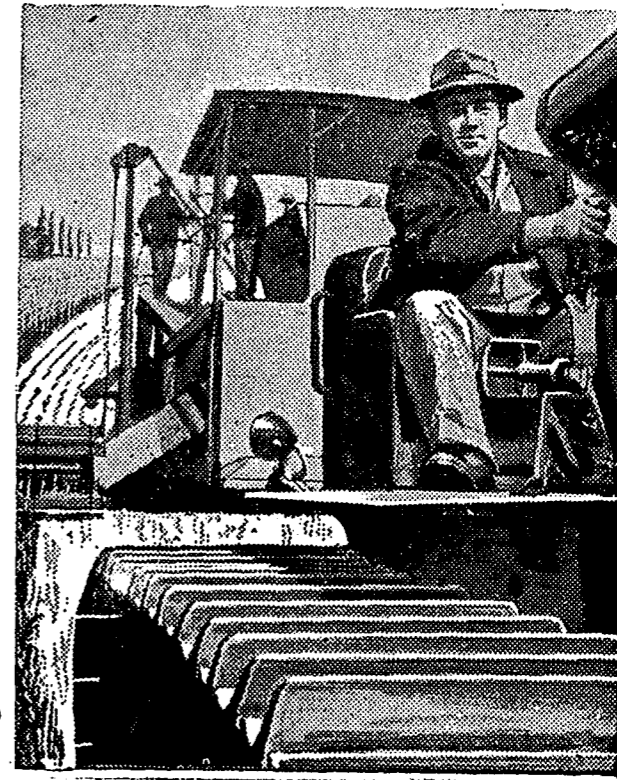
