

School Directors Reject Contract Bids; All High

Joint School District No. 283 directors last Thursday rejected all bids for the construction of the proposed new high school, as the bids all exceeded the architects' highest figure.

A total of 13 contractors were on hand at last week's meeting to offer bids on the construction job. The lowest bid was made by the Hollibough Construction Co., of Greer, with a low of \$355,279.00. The highest bid was \$399,400.00, which was the offer of the Selkirk Construction Company.

The complete list of contractors and their bids are as follows: Commercial Builders, \$366,148.00; Dunham Brothers, \$358,780.00; Gus Larkin, \$395,121.00; Kenastin and Huntley, \$369,854.00; Johnson, Busboom, Rauh, \$358,116.00; Don St. Marie, \$376,420.00; Selkirk Co., \$399,400.00; Welsch Bros., \$392,370.00; G. and M. Construction, \$378,644.00; Purvis Construction, \$398,472.00; E. H. Matlick, \$368,000.00, and Sava Construction Co., \$362,441.00. The low bidder was Hollibough Construction

with \$355,279.00. With the refusal of all bids, the board of directors is now confronted with returning the plans to the Boise architectural firm of Dropping, Kelly & Finch, and having them revised enough to make up for the \$55,000.00 over-bid by the lowest contractor.

Robert Meserve, superintendent of schools, said that bids will again be called later this month, after the plans have been altered enough by the architects.

"We are not discouraged, and feel that the contractors will now sharpen their pencils and get down to cold, hard figures, and we will have a more accurate estimate the next time we open bids," Meserve said. Bids are expected to be called in about one month, following the plans revision and time for the three-week period for advertisement on bids.

One major change that will be made the next time bids are called is that separate bids will be called for general, electrical and mechanical "as we figure we can save some money by splitting the bids and have a few more estimates on the different

parts of the construction. The last bids were estimated by only one contractor, with the primary contractor sub-letting the various parts of the construction," Meserve related.

The school directors still hold the decision on whether they will accept the construction bids, and should bids again be high, they have the right to again reject, and set a later date.

NEWMANS LOSE BARN AND AUTO

Fire of undetermined origin destroyed a barn, a shop and part of a machine shed at the Wallace (Wally) Newman farm about 2:00 a. m. Thursday, Sept. 3. Newman estimated the damage at over \$10,000.00, partially covered by insurance.

The General Telephone Co. had two tons of copper wire stored in the barn. It salvaged this for scrap.

The blaze was discovered by truck driver Homer Marvin in the east corner of the barn. He woke Newman, and before he could get extinguishers the entire building was afire. It soon spread to an adjoining machine shop which contained a late model car, four guns, and fishing and camping equipment; a welder, electric drill, garden tractor and many other items. All were destroyed.

About 15 men from the Max J. Kuney Construction Co. rock crusher and truck drivers helped move machinery and play water from the gravity feed system on the house, another machine shed and a chicken house. Neighbors Tom King, Don McIver and Allie Vannoy also helped.

A strong east wind blew embers and ashes as far as King's home about a half mile away. A barley field was set afire several times, but due to humidity, the fire did not spread fast and the men were able to extinguish it with little damage. Two tanks half-filled with gasoline and diesel fuel were between the house and shop but were not damaged.

Newman said he would have lost everything had it not been for the quick work of the crusher crew and neighbors, high humidity, and the fact that the fuel tanks did not blow up.

The cause of the blaze has not been determined.

Loss has not yet been fully determined, but insurance will cover only about fifty percent of it.

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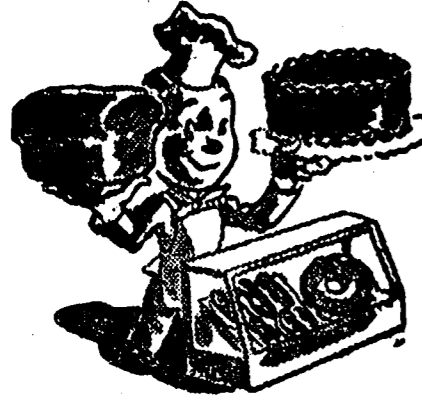
