

School Contract Awarded at \$312,630

BIDS CUT \$42,649 TO MEET SCHOOL DISTRICT'S BUDGET

Kendrick School Directors Tuesday evening approved a revised offer on the construction of the new Junior-Senior High School at Kenrick at a cost of \$312,630.00.

The contract was awarded to the Hollibough Construction Company of Greer, Idaho. Hollibough was the low bidder on the first bids, all of which were rejected last week.

The approval of the revised construction bids came after the school directors met Monday night and approved a resolution to rescind their previous rejection of all bids, and again take the estimates under consideration with deletions and revisions to bring the cost within the budget.

The first bid by the Hollibough Construction Co. was \$355,279.00. Revision by the architects, Dropping, Kelly & Finch of Boise, and deletions approved by the Board of Trustees Tuesday night brought the cost to within the school budget.

Hollibough said that with the approval by the Trustees he would lose no time in getting started on the job, which has a deadline date of August 1, 1960.

The general contractor said he would be on the job Wednesday, Sept. 17, and planned to be moving dirt by late afternoon.

One of the major changes in the construction costs was the lowering of the building, at the foundation level, one foot. This alteration cut the cost of construction \$4,900.00. Another was the elimination of painting of interior wall, \$5,500.00. The other deletions and alterations are listed below.

Deductions Approved
Deductions and deletions to bring the cost of the new building within the budget, approved by the Board of Trustees and the architects include the following:

Asphalt paving, \$2,809.00; half-inch sheet rock under acoustic tile in certain ceilings, \$1,192.00; walk-in freezer, \$2,565.00; painting of interior walls, \$5,500.00; ceramic tile on washroom floors, \$1,100.00; relocate master electric panel, \$2,531; redesign electric panel, \$1,970; deletion of P. A. system \$300.00; overhead electric entrance rather than underground, \$600.00; use of chromolux heater in gym, \$290.00; omit kitchen fan and hoods \$1,000.00; omit automatic motorized fan in gym, \$700.00; omit booster heater in kitchen, \$181.00; omit two classroom sinks, \$145.00.

Lower grade of building 1 foot (this refers only to foundation in height) \$4,900; change roof ventilators, \$2,448.00 eliminate science equipment (this to be obtained from govt. surplus through federal aid) \$4,700.00; eliminate collapsible gate and folding door \$370.00; eliminate hardwood floor in bandroom \$1,070; eliminate drive way gravel \$600.00; eliminate top soil on finish grade \$710.00; change to use of plywood rather than ship-lap in certain parts of building (this was felt better) \$1,240.00; remove Commercial room light divider \$500; delete door and grill, \$160.00; delete half of proposed blackboard surface (unnecessary) \$585.00; delete 222 surface feet of cabinet storage \$1,933.00; change yard drainage \$784.00; delete steel in foundation (unnecessary when height lowered) \$300.00.

The Trustees last week, upon rejection of all submitted bids, planned to call again for bids at the end of the month, but upon request of the architect, the bids were reconsidered with nearly 30 deletions and alterations.

The architect said there would be no appreciable changes in the building, and no alterations would be visible to the average person. In fact, some were thought better than the original.

Federal Funds
Supt. Robert L. Meserve explains: "The Science Department of the new High School will be completely equipped with the aid of Federal Funds recently made available by the passage of the National Defense Education Act. This Act provides funds, on a dollar for dollar match basis, to help schools improve their Science Departments. We expect to receive between \$2,500 and \$3,000 in Federal Funds to purchase approximately \$6,000 worth of science laboratory fixtures and equipment, to be installed during construction of the new building."

Paul E. Jones, 39, a former resident of the Kendrick-Leland area, died Friday afternoon, September 11, at his home in Raton, New Mexico. Cause of death was a heart attack.

Mr. Jones was employed as a driver for the Red Ball Freightways, Inc., at Raton, at the time of his death.

He was born Sept. 2, 1920, at Armada, Alberta, Canada, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Jones. His parents moved to Idaho when he was ten months old.

Mr. Jones grew to young manhood in the Leland-Kendrick area. He worked as a farm laborer until about 1940, when he was employed by the Morrison-Knutson Construction Co., in Washington, in the heavy construction division. He enlisted in the army in March of 1942, and served three years in the European theater during World War II.

Following his discharge he was again employed by the Morrison-Knutson Co., in Montana. He left the firm to farm and manage the Powell-Bohman ranch in the Park area.
