## DIKE WORK NOW IN FINAL STAGES, RIP-RAP BEING PLACED

Workers of the Canaday and Van Winkle Construction Company this week started the final leg of the Kendrick dike project.

The last part of the job is the placing of the rip-rap, or large rock facing on the dike itself.

Two heavy rock blasts were made earlier this summer by the construction company to enable them to have enough large rock to make the rip-rap.

No final date (so far as we have been able to learn) has been set on the completion of the dike operations, and neither the Army Engineer or Mrs. Canaday would comment as to when the work was expected to be completed. However, Mrs. Canaday did say that as soon as the rip-rap was all in place, all that would be left would be to clean up.

The dike project at Kendrick is part of a nation-wide emergency flood control project being done by the U. S. Corps of Army Engineers, with federal funds, made available.

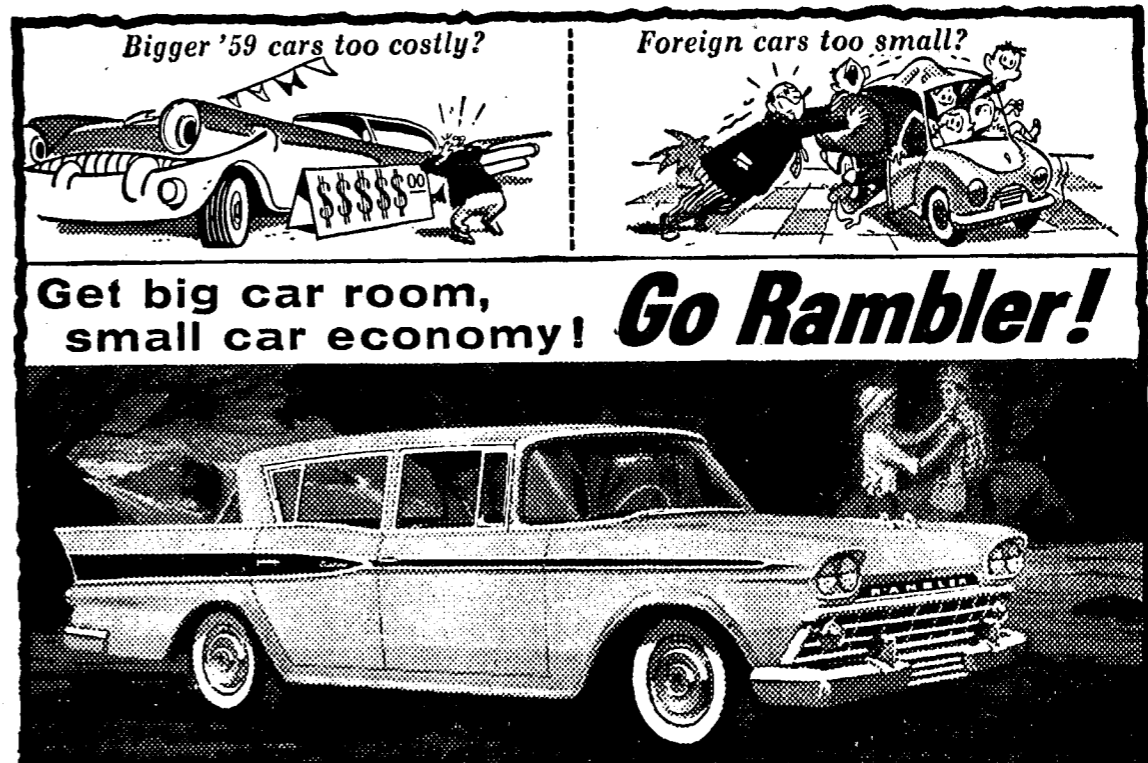

### GASOLINE, GOOD GRADES DON'T MIX

Washington, D. C. — The teenage hot rod, enthusiast or jalopy jockey is becoming recognized as a special problem in many high schools.

He often presents a hazard to life and limb in the school area. He often uses his automobile to escape from extra-curricular activities that would be helpful to him. And all too frequently his automobile is responsible for poor grades. Sometimes it is responsible for his dropping out of school before graduation, according to an article in the *NASA Journal*, published by the National Education Association.

The issue came to the fore about a year ago when a high school principal at Reburg, Idaho, found that in his senior class straight A students drive an automobile to school, but 83 percent of the failures did. In between, 15 percent of the B students drive, 44 percent of the C students, and 71 percent of the D students.

Other principals then found a similar correlation between grades achieved and student driving customs. In some instances, however, this was not true.

It appears that among the economically privileged students, for whom the ownership and operation of an automobile presents no financial problem, a car is no particular handicap. It is a definite handicap, however, for the student who has to strain to find the money for gas, oil, repairs and installment payments.

These students are apt to spend much time fussing over their automobiles to save money on repair bills, and they often drop out of school for several days at a time to get the money for payments or for operating expenses. Some even drop out of school entirely to earn the money to support their automobiles.

When the financial problem is not present, other difficulties often arise. Joy riding during the lunch hour, hot-rodding after school, and even beer-drinking in the cars are some of the disciplinary problems mentioned by various principals.

In combating these, the schools require usually written registration at school of student drivers, written requests from parents for permission for their children to drive to school,

inspection of parking areas during lunch time, use of assigned parking spaces and requirements that buses be used for transportation for extra-curricular activities.

Many private schools, but few public schools, have absolute prohibitions against student drivers. The school administrators in Danville, Indiana, found a few years ago that 50 students were driving to their small public high school. They undertook an educational campaign to discourage the practice, and invoked strict regulations. By last year the number of student drivers was down to 25; this year it stands at eight.

### BAGGAGE BANDITS

J. H. (Ed) Flesman, a resident of the Leland area from 1908 to 1942, but now of Portland, sent us this account of a hold up in the Portland, Oregon, store in which he is now employed:

Aug. 7 — A "baggage bandit" gunman obtained approximately \$2000 in a holdup of a Rodgers Variety store at 2736 NW Vaughn today.

The third robbery this week attributed to the gang of holdupmen whose trademark has been to bind their victims with adhesive tape, occurred shortly before the store was

due to open. Dressed in a business suit, wearing a dark brown hat pulled over his face and carrying a brown brief case, the robber looked like a typical salesman as he walked through a rear shipping door of the store about 8:35 a. m.

He met the stock clerk, James E. Flesman, 4706 NE 68th, and motioned him with a revolver to proceed into the main part of the store, where David G. Lamson, manager, was preparing cash from the opened safe for the day's business.

Both men were compelled to lie in the floor and the gunman bound their hands and feet with masking tape. He stuffed four large money sacks and six small ones into the brief case and strode out of the rear door. No car was seen or heard.

Lamson broke his bonds almost immediately and called police. The gunman is believed to be one of a gang that specializes in this type of operation.

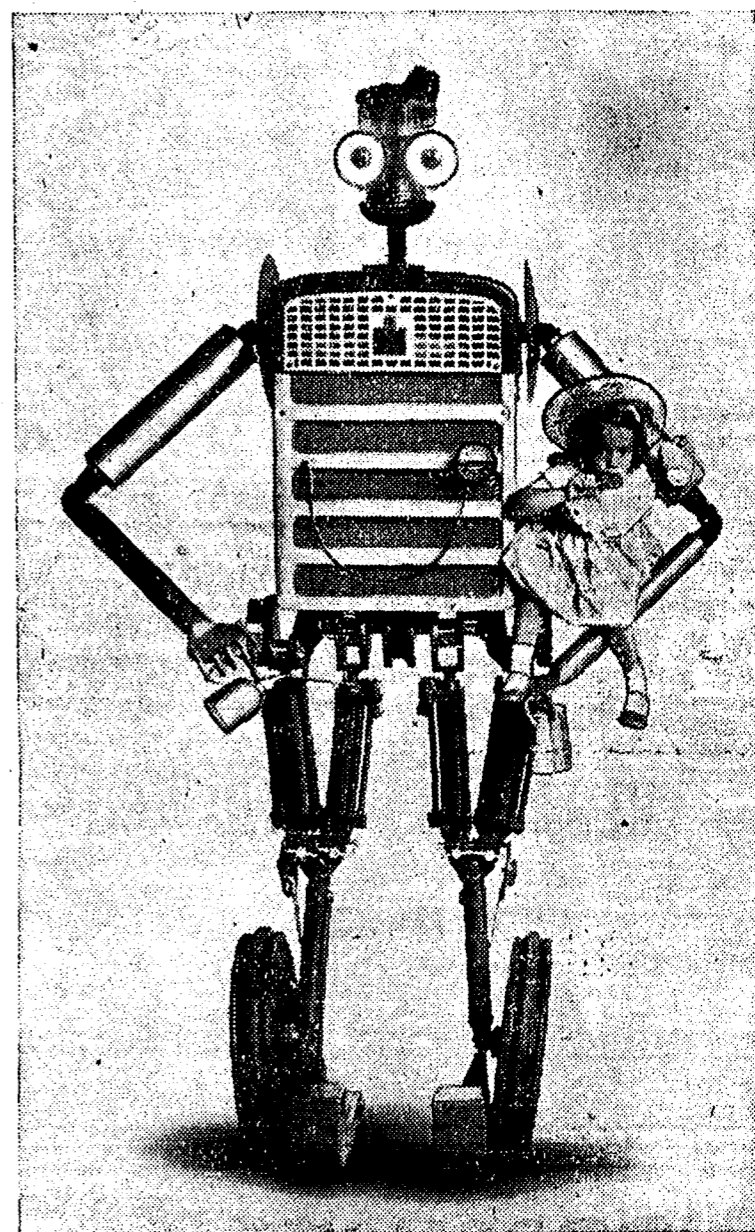

**ENROLLMENT UP**

U. of I., Moscow — As the University of Idaho prepared this week to enroll a record number of 4,000 students this fall, President D. R. Theophilus told the faculty at its first meeting of the new academic year, that bigger impacts of students are still to come.

President Theophilus said that it is estimated the university enrollment would be 6,062 by 1970. This represents about a 50 percent increase within the next decade.

"This fact offers problems, but they are challenges which I am sure the people of the state as well as the faculty and staff of the university will not hesitate to accept," the president declared. "It is believed that the university should continue the practice of admitting all graduates of accredited Idaho high schools."

Theophilus stressed, however, that high schools should have competent guidance personnel so that proper counseling is available to students throughout their school years. He said that the university must have adequate student advisory personnel to help guide students into the type of training and work best suited to their abilities and interests and to assist them in meeting social problems.

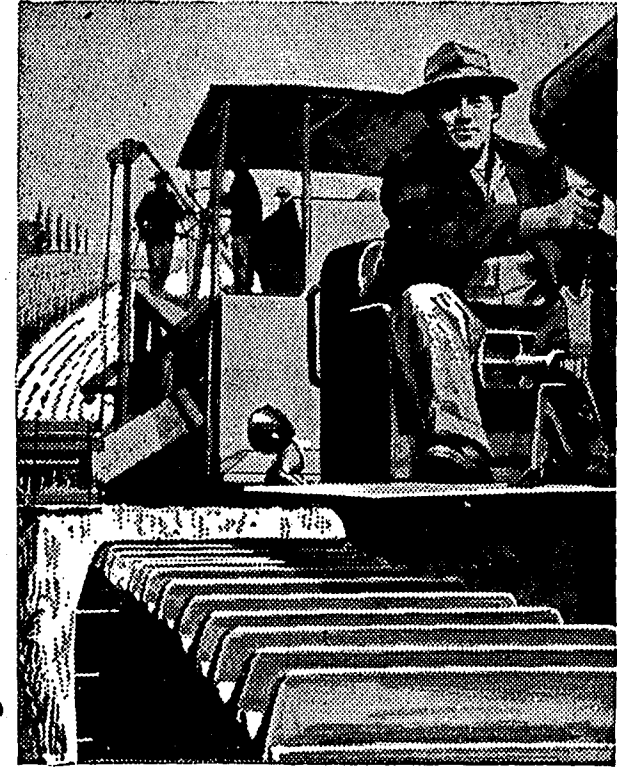
