DIKE TO BE FINISHED BY OCT. 27 DEADLINE

The Kendrick dike is to be completed by October 27. Robert Long, Supervisory Construction Management Engineer reported to the Kendrick Gazette Saturday morning.

Long said the dike was progressing nicely, and even if high water does cause an unreasonable delay, the heavy rock in the dike's "toe trench" is sufficient to keep the levee from being undermined.

At the present time the Canaday & Van Winkle Construction Co. is working full shifts to complete the project before more high water forces additional delay.

Last week the construction had come to a stand still due to the rising waters of the Potlatch river.

Long added that working being done on the dike is of excellent quality, and when completed, at the end of the month, should be substantial enough to take care of any high water problems formerly faced by Kendrick residents.

Menfolk give qualities of a good wife—good homemaker, 47%; faithful, 15% good mother, 5%; intelligent, 2%; and so on. Parenthood apparently has small importance. 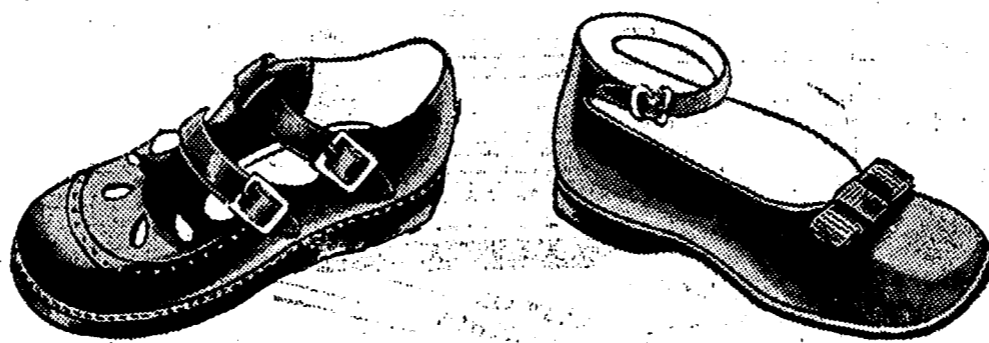
