DEPOT FINISHED

Construction crews of the Northern Pacific last week completed remodeling operations on the Kendrick depot, and now, except for the exterior color, the building presents a most pleasing and modern appearance.

The old upper floor, which once was used as living quarters by the depot agent and his family, was removed and the building cut into a one-story, bungalow-type, with long, overhanging eaves. The old wooden platform was also removed, and a tan-colored gravel spread in its place. The unloading or loading of freight cars for local freight is now handled by a ramp from the freight and express end of the depot.

So far as we have been able to learn the original building was constructed about 1890, and when work was in progress this was indicated by finding that the entire structure was put together with square nails!

Hecht of Juliaetta, who were married fifty years ago — on October 28, 1909, at Lewiston, renewed their wedding vows before nearly a hundred old friends and relatives on Sunday, October 25, at the Community Hall on Big Bear Ridge, with the Rev. F. C. Schmidt of Kendrick officiating. Wedding music was played by Mrs. Margie Stevens, who also accompanied Glenda and Linda Stevens who sang "I Love You Truly" before the ceremony. Mrs. Hecht was attired in a mauve afternoon dress and wore a golden orchid corsage.

Mr. Hecht was 73 on Sept. 30, and the wedding date is also Mrs. Hecht's 70th birthday. All their wedding-like has been spent in the immediate area, where Hecht was engaged in farming until his retirement several years ago. The home place on Bear Ridge is now being farmed by their son-in-law, Dick Benjamin. The couple has three daughters: Mrs. Velma Benjamin, Mrs. Vera Schlegelhuber and Mrs. Ruby Nelson, both of Deary; four grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Many baskets and bouquets of yellow and bronze mums decorated the hall for open house honoring the couple. The tiered wedding cake, baked and decorated by Mrs. Al Ruby and Mrs. Grant Clemenhagen, was frosted in white and trimmed with yellow roses and gold leaves, topped with a circle of gold leaves containing a golden bell and the numerals "50". Golden glitter candles were set in a glitter base and tied with a golden bell and ribbons on either side of the cake. 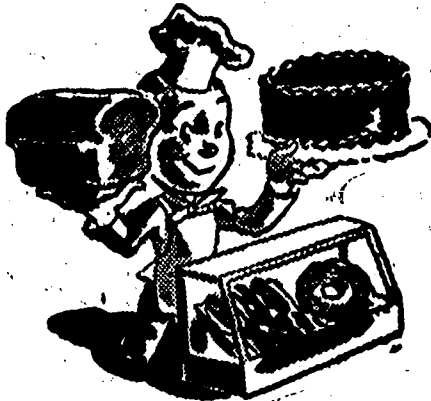

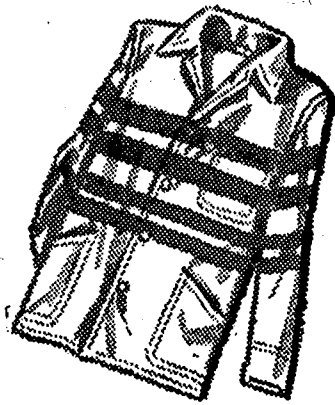

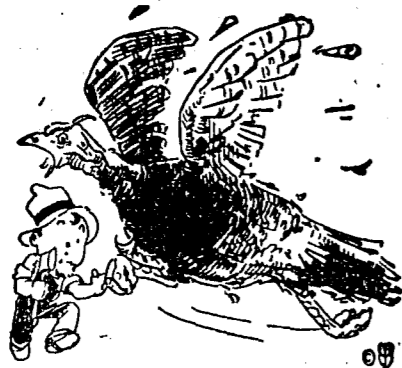
