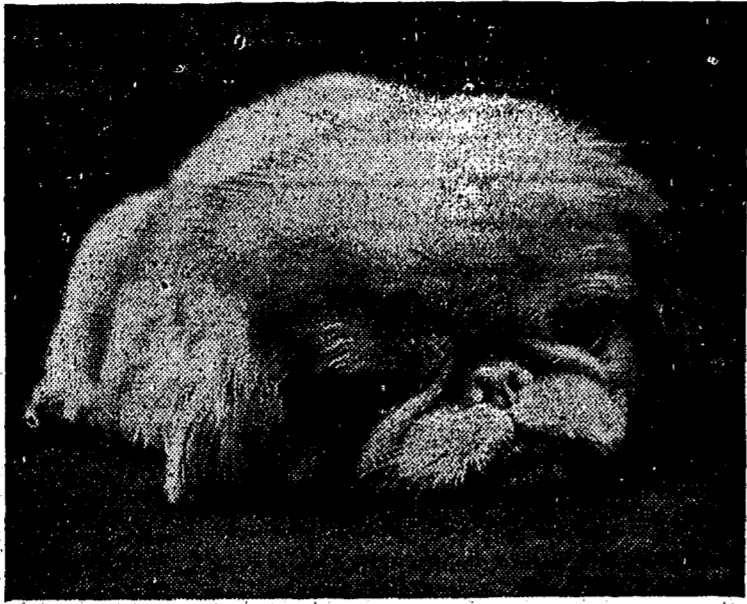

On "Art Day" last week, potato turkeys were created by the children. The legs were made of colored toothpicks.

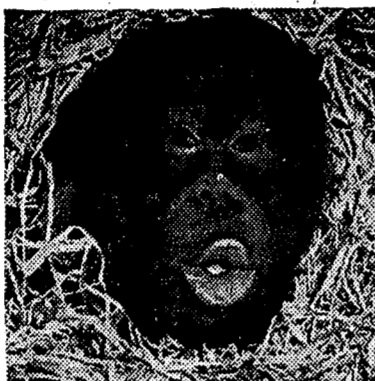

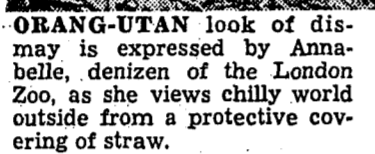

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KEY TO BEEF PRICE LIES IN MARKETING SPEED SAYS E. S.

U. of I., Moscow — The key to the beef outlook in the next few months is how rapidly the large numbers of steers and heifers are marketed and how many heifers are held back for increasing the herd. That's an observation of the University of Idaho extension economists in their latest summary of the agricultural situation.

"If steers and heifers are moved to market in an orderly fashion and at somewhat lighter weights, cattlemen will likely experience only a gradual decline in fat cattle prices during 1960," the economists say. "If feeding to heavier weights continues and bunched marketings occur there might be sharp price breaks."

The analysis was prepared by Wayne Robinson, Robert Wilcox and Virgil Kennedy. Idaho cattlemen had 90,000 head on feed October 1, a six percent increase over a year ago, and a 22 percent increase above July 1. Steer numbers were the same as a year earlier. Heifers were up 15 percent. The economist said there are indications Idaho feeders intend to market their cattle at a slower rate than for the United States, with 48 percent of the October number to be sold during the October-December period, and 42 percent after January 1st.

Potatoes In Picture

Speaking of potatoes, the report said the late Idaho crop of 38.8 cwt. compares with a 1958 crop of 41.6 million cwt. and the 10-year average of 27.3 million cwt. "Some of the earlier harvested potatoes lack maturity desirable for storage, but producers were unable to delay harvest because of frost danger. Quality on the whole is reported comparable to that of 1958. Food processing plants in Idaho have been expended further in 1959. They can process more potatoes than they did last year.

"Sales of fresh potatoes by size are increasing. Sizing is done by mechanical means in some packing sheds and by hand in others. This development fits in well with the growth of the food processing industry, and is expected to continue.

Report from the GOVERNOR

GRANGERS MEET

At the business session it was voted to pay the registration fee for one boy to the National Boy Scout Jamboree in Colorado Springs, Colo., in 1960. To raise funds for this purpose it was voted to sponsor a dance on Dec. 5th.

The Evening's program was built around the Thanksgiving theme. There was a reading of the "First Thanksgiving" and origin of the title "Uncle Sam."

A skit, "Uncle Sam's Thanksgiving" was presented by Eugene Taylor, as Uncle Sam; Earlen Taylor as Columbia — and seven guests, Kathryn Morey, Katherine Holsington, Elsie Chamberlain, Dick Benjamin, Velma Benjamin, Charles Stevens and Dave Clayton.

It was decided to hold a pie social and card party following the next meeting, Dec. 1 — so please bring your card tables, cards and pies.

Boise — It's an unprecedented tour — this visit of the President to Asia, Africa and Europe. His prime target will be the creation of opinion favorable to the United States in India, Pakistan and the Middle East.

Many people have doubts about the wisdom of the President's personal efforts toward the construction of a just, durable and enduring peace. I note that Mr. Acheson, the last Truman secretary of state, has attacked the President's mission on the grounds that it is a useless excursion.

Frankly, I think that Mr. Acheson is wrong and that the views which he expressed for the Democratic advisory committee do not even voice the opinion of most thinking members of the Democratic party. He sounded to me a little like a petulant sidelineer who thinks he could do better. This is understandable, but not necessarily laudable.

In these days of jet airplanes and swift communications it is impossible and unwise for the President of the United States to "hole up" in the White House and be effective on the world scene. Whether we like it or not, the world looks to the United States to be the leader of the free nations of the west. This is not a leadership that we sought, but it is clear that the Republic will have missed its historic mission in this century if we seek any way to avoid the moral responsibility that circumstances have imposed. The whole value of western Christian civilization is at stake. We will be less than true to our heritage of freedom if we do not face the challenge of today and tomorrow with vigor, with courage and with realism.

I daresay that the President would much prefer to spend the pre-Christmas season at home with his family. But he will bring reassurance and counsel of undoubted strength to the people of India and Pakistan whose borders are menaced by Red China. He will portray to the leaders of these smaller and newer nations, as

no one else could, the dedication of the United States to the preservation of their freedom and our sympathy with them in their aspirations to better and enrich the lives of all of their people.

The President's bold seizure of the initiative in this endeavor to relax some of the tensions that have afflicted world affairs will receive added impetus from this tree continent tour. I am sure that his efforts will pay dividends for America in added prestige and in a deeper measure of understanding of our aims and objectives.

On a purely personal note, I am glad that the elected president of the United States is going to visit Asia, Africa and Europe. For altogether too long these countries have America only in the personal image of unsuccessful aspirants for the Presidency. This Eisenhower mission will, of course, change all that.

I am thankful that he has the spirit and dedication to undertake this tiring and difficult task. His efforts may yet achieve the bench mark in history which he has so earnestly sought. And this, of course, is his ambition to be the architect of a just and durable peace for all the world. — Robert E. Smylie, Governor.

NEW ATTRACTION IS PLANNED

Missoula, Mont. — A Forest Service task force has started developing plans for the preservation and development of the earthquake area in the Madison River Canyon, according to Chas. L. Tebbe, regional forester at Missoula, Mont.

This task force approach follows announcement by the Secretary of Agriculture on August 30, that an "Earthquake Geologic Area" will be established under regulations to embrace parts of the Gallatin and Beaverhead National Forests, where the most severe shocks occurred the night of August 17.

Plans call for the area to include the giant slide which dammed the Madison river, and many of the faults and fissures, as well as the new natural lake formed behind the slide. The area has unique scientific and general interest.

The task force is composed of foresters, engineers, hydrologists, geologists and recreation specialists. They will complete intensive investigations and plans designed to protect the area for its scientific value and still make it accessible to the general public through installation of necessary facilities.

Harold E. Anderson, forest service staffman from the Kaniksu National Forest at Sandpoint, Idaho, has been detailed to the regional office to head the task force. He has had lands and recreation experience in Idaho and Alaska, and served as research project leader in Alaska. He is a forestry graduate of the University of Washington and holds a masters degree from Yale University.

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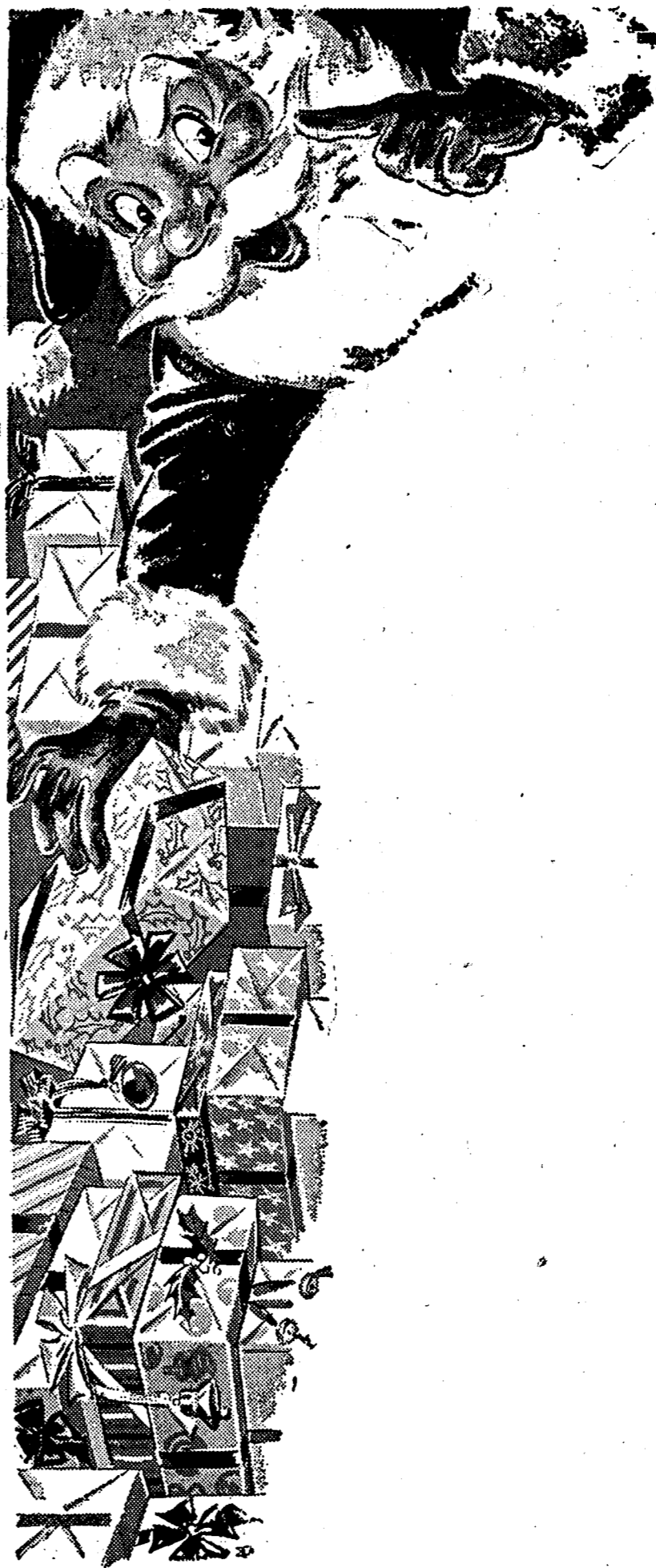

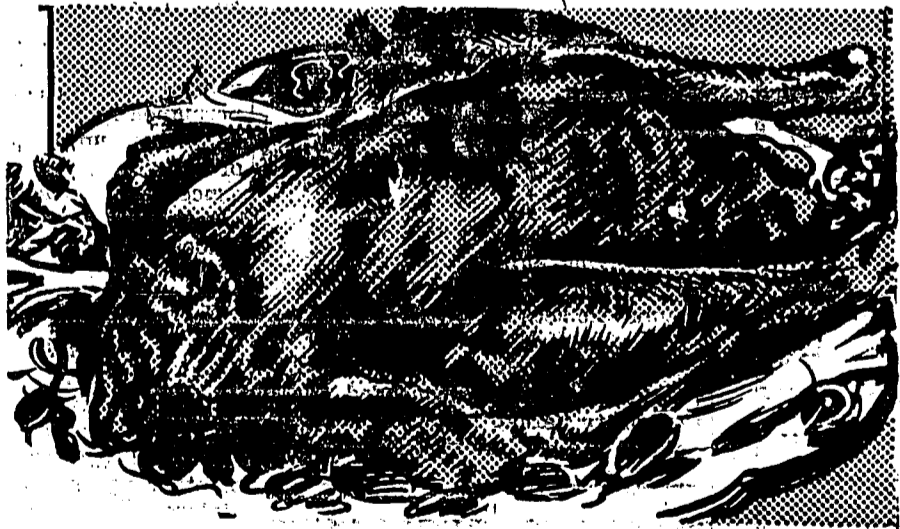
