





**ORIE W. HAMILTON  
KILLED SUNDAY**

Two men, one a former resident of American ridge were killed and another was injured critically in a head-on collision about two miles north of Pasco, about 5:30 a. m. Sunday.

Orie W. Hamilton, 55, a former Kendrick and Gifford area farmer and construction worker, died when another car crossed the center line and smashed into the auto in which he was riding. His son, Norman, 30, was injured critically.

Jack L. Morgan, 33, of Kenniwick, driver of the other car, also was killed.

Norman Hamilton, Pasco, driver of the car in which his father was killed, was taken to a Pasco hospital. His jaw was broken in three places, his pelvis was fractured and one wrist was broken. He was in surgery from 10 a. m. until 4:30 p. m., and is to undergo further surgery this week.

Two of the elder Hamilton's brothers, Leslie Hamilton of 1018 7th St., and Ted Hamilton of 316 12th Ave., and his sister, Mrs. Arnold Olson of 1124 12th St., all Lewiston, drove to Pasco the same day on being notified of the accident.

Orie Hamilton was born Jan. 5, 1904, at Ottumwa, Iowa, and moved with his parents to the American ridge area near Kendrick and later to Gifford. He was married to Irene Mehl of Gifford, July 4, 1928. The family moved to Pasco 14 years ago.

Mr. Hamilton is a nephew of E. H. Jones, and well known by many in Kendrick and Juliaetta.

**DO YOU KNOW**

Every American is taxed to pay for Federal "public power." The people of the State of Washington have paid \$85,250,000; the people of the State of Idaho have paid \$14,300,000. But there's another side to it. In addition to Federal aid in construction, public power is cheap because it escapes its fair share of taxes. Why should a PUD pay only about 7¢ of each revenue dollar for taxes while a private utility pays some 23¢? Since rates are about the same, what does the PUD do with the money saved in taxes? Nobody knows.

**NEW POWER LINES  
BEING BUILT**

A \$30,000 construction job is presently underway by Clearwater Power Co. line crews in the Juliaetta area.

The company is building 8 miles of new lines of higher capacity to serve 100 families in the Cherry Lane, Cottonwood Creek and Myrtle areas by a more direct route. These families presently have their power service routed over an extended area.

By removing these families from existing lines, the electric company service will be improved over a wide section of service area between Kendrick and Peck, Idaho.

Work will continue on this project for an estimated 60 days, weather permitting. Much of the construction is on steep side hills, over rocky ground and other difficult terrain which hinders construction considerably. Two railroad crossings, one river crossing and a highway crossing will be made to serve Co-Op members in that area.

The seven-man crew began actual construction work this week after several months of preliminary activity securing easements, surveying, and right-of-way clearing.

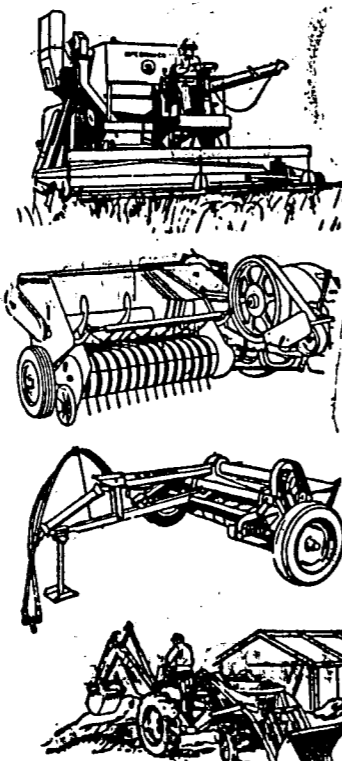

**KILLING SWAN COSTLY**

\$100 apiece is what rare trumpeter swans meant in terms of fines assessed recently against four Idaho Falls hunters who had killed the noble birds. Originally the trumpeter was found over much of interior North America, with nesting grounds in Canada and Alaska, the Northwest, and even as far south as northern Mexico. Settlement of the west deprived birds of needed isolation and, only 25 years ago, just 73 trumpeter swans were known to exist in the area of northeastern Idaho, southeastern Montana and northwestern Wyoming in a radius of

some 60 square miles. Now they are protected and the annual census last year found 697, with nesting estimates indicating further increases.

**WINTER WEATHER**

Some perhaps grumble about the penetrating chill of the past few days, but when compared with the weather in other areas — ours has indeed been wonderful.

The days have varied from high cloudiness to bright sunshine, with night temperatures just below the freezing mark — and daylight hitting into the high 40's. There has been some rain. Saturday morning snow fell for a few minutes. The flakes were "as big as silver dollars" but melted almost as fast as they fell, and an hour after the storm ended no traces remained in the valley. However, on top the hills it reached a depth of about two inches — and remained on the ground for some time.

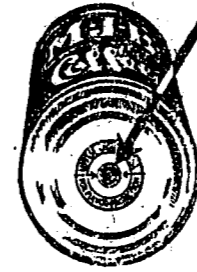
