In several instances, after an REA joined the public power group, a progressive PUD manager handled both PUD and REA, and then the jig was soon up for REA.

ALIEN REGISTRATION

Helena, Mont. — District Director R. G. Hoffeller of the Immigration and Naturalization Service states that the annual alien address report program usually causes a sharp rise in the number of applications for naturalization. naturalization.

The law requires all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions to report their address each January. Throughout the United States, almost 30 percent more applications for naturalization are received during the months of January, February and March than are received during other months. This sudden rise is attributed to the Alien Address Report


Aliens not required to make this eport are diplomats, those accredited to certain international organizations, and those who have entered temporarily as agricultural workers. Forms for making the reports will be available to aliens at all Post Offices and offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service dur-


