

## Subscription Contest Now In Final Five Days

## FOREIGN LANGUAGE INTRODUCED IN GRADE SCHOOLS

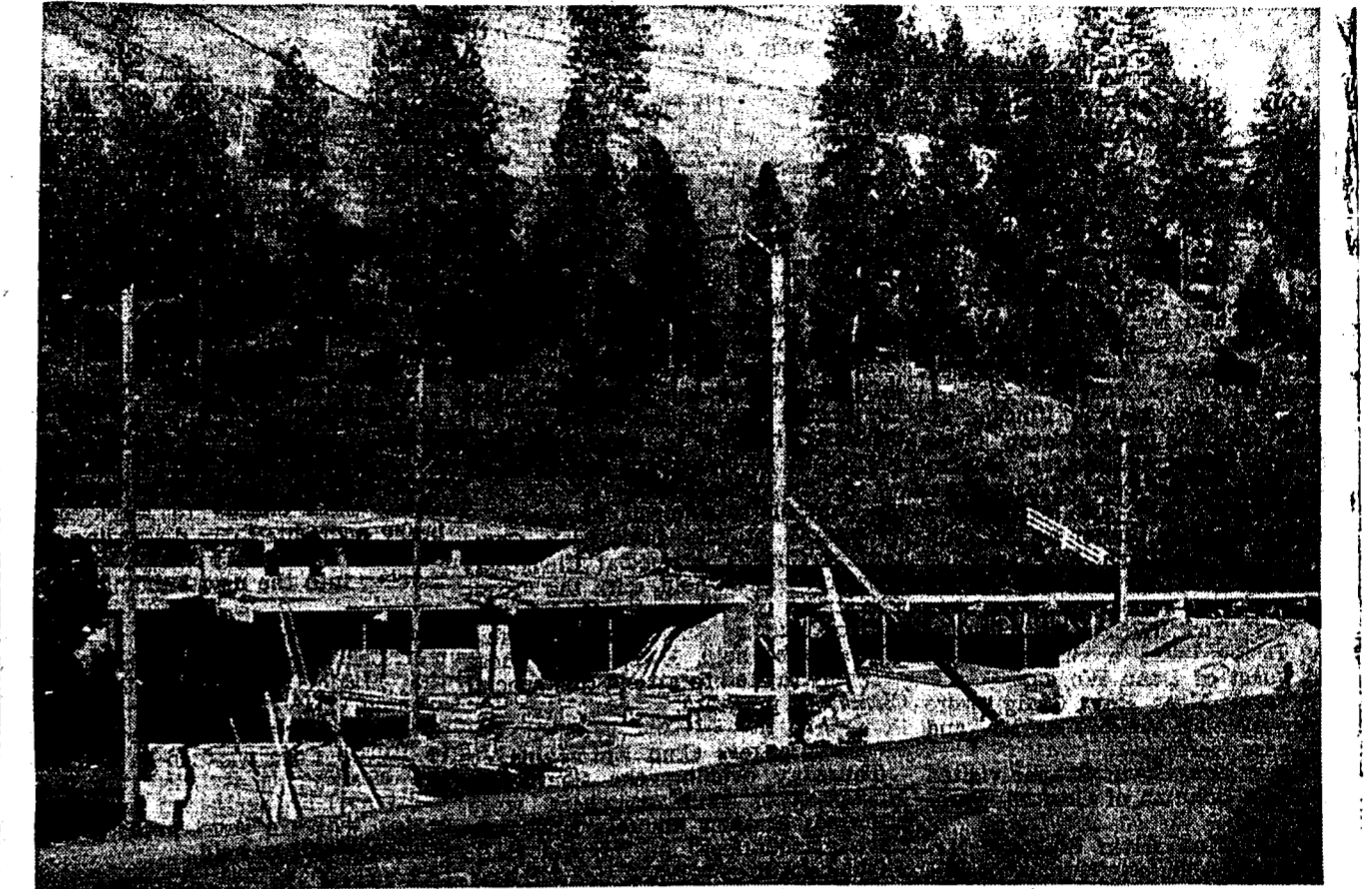
**Foreign Language**  
A foreign language in our school system? — Yes!

This topic probably has been "kicked around" in your family from time to time, but you thought it would never happen here. Well, it will happen here, and soon!

The language to be taught will be Spanish. The beginners will be the sixth grade. The place will be the Juliaetta Elementary School and Southwick Grade school.

The teachers will be Mr. White and Mrs. Callison. The classes will start as soon as the teaching materials are received.

**The Program:**  
This program is made up of six different text books, each one a little more difficult than the previous one, and a recording for each book. It will probably take from three to four years to get the program fully incorporated into the school. The first year the sixth grade students will be taught from the first one or two books, depending on their

## Contractor Says School Is Now 47% Complete

Trustees of Kendrick Joint School District No. 283, heard a school building progress report Tuesday evening, and found that the new building is now more than 47 percent complete.

Everett Hollibough, prime contractor for the school, reported that construction is well ahead of schedule, and he said that he plans to have the job completed by June 1, 1960.

Dick Kelly, architect, of the Dropping, Kelly & Finch firm, Boise, was also present at the meeting, and reported that the contractor is doing a superior job, and has, in some cases, surpassed specifications in his work, making the job an excellent one.

Supt. Robert Meserve reported to the School Board that the district has received approval from the state for participation for federal aid in the Science department. The science equipment for which the school is eligible comes to about \$9,700.00, so the district will receive approximately \$4,850.00 in federal funds, Meserve said.

Meserve also added that the school will receive appropriations on federal aid for the Language department. "We are eligible for \$800.00, of which we will receive about \$400.00 in federal aid," Meserve said.

The superintendent also noted that the science equipment had been ordered, and is expected to arrive about the 15th of February, and is to be installed by the contractor. The gym bleachers have also been ordered, and plans call for their installation in the early spring.

"Of interest to all is the fact that a 'price war' on bleachers enabled the school district to purchase these items for the entire gym, for just a little more than half of the regular price," Meserve told the Gazette.

At the close of the meeting, routine bills were paid and the board briefly discussed and took under consideration the present curriculum, and plans to discuss further the curriculum for the local school.

**PEDAGOGICAL  
PHILOSOPHY**

To Parents and Patrons of Joint School District No. 283:  
Self-discipline is the best discipline. Of course, the teacher must set limits. Children are uneasy when they are expected to assume too much responsibility for their own behavior before they are old enough to predict its outcome.  
Proper discipline is based on giving each child the same consideration we would give to an adult. By and large, children reciprocate courtesy. They want to be taken seriously and challenged to do their best.  
Children respect fairness and honesty. A teacher who is not afraid to say, "I made a mistake; I'm sorry" is likely to get equal frankness from her pupils. She must keep promises. If she says, "I'll read that story to-

tomorrow," the children must know that she will do it.  
Almost every child is at times aggressive or destructive. A teacher must recognize this and deal with each incident honestly in a way that helps a child to face the facts and to realize that while the teacher still accepts him as a person, she disapproves of what has been done. Within a pattern of security established by gentle, firm controls, there is room for individual deviation if it does not disrupt a class or demand too much of the teacher's time. As in life, school situations should allow room for the children to make mistakes, to experience some of the results of wrongdoing as well as to profit by good example.  
A teacher who loses his temper, shouts at a child or hits him does not help his pupils to acquire control of themselves. Children watching such a scene reveal bewilderment, fear and sometimes a kind of guilty excitement — not the emotions that should be encouraged in a classroom. This does not mean that a teacher should avoid expressing justified disapproval, annoyance, or even anger. But he should be careful how he expresses these feelings. He should not let them distort his better judgment in assigning penalties.  
High school students often say: "We like a teacher who makes us work." What they mean is that they respect a teacher who sets high standards which they can take satisfaction in trying to meet. This does not mean that they respect a teacher who "keeps them in line" by strictures and formal rules. Their respect goes to the teacher who is able to get the best from them in an atmosphere of informality and lack

of pressure. The desire to "find out" is still a youngster's most important incentive to learn, but he must also be responsible for planning his work and carrying it out. One student who had been having trouble with her language course reported that she had found the solution to her problem. When her teacher asked what this great discovery was, she replied, "Why, I go to my room and shut the door and study my French!"  
To accept this simple, basic responsibility for settling down to work on his own, a student must have the capacity to discipline himself. No parental nagging, no admonitions from teachers, can be truly effective if a student has not acquired this capacity.  
To elicit dynamic control from within rather than to impose static restraints from without, takes time and patience. Self-discipline in the school can grow only in a climate that is basically friendly and rooted in mutual respect and confidence.

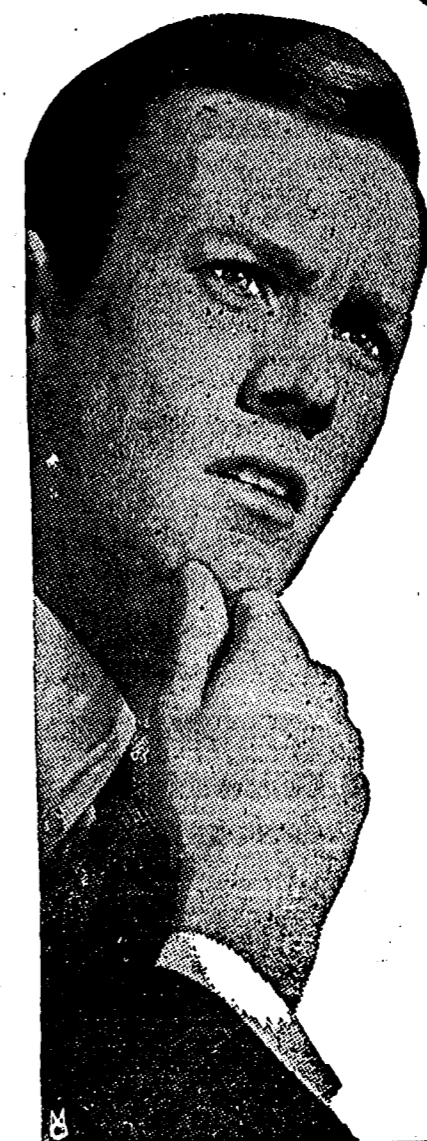

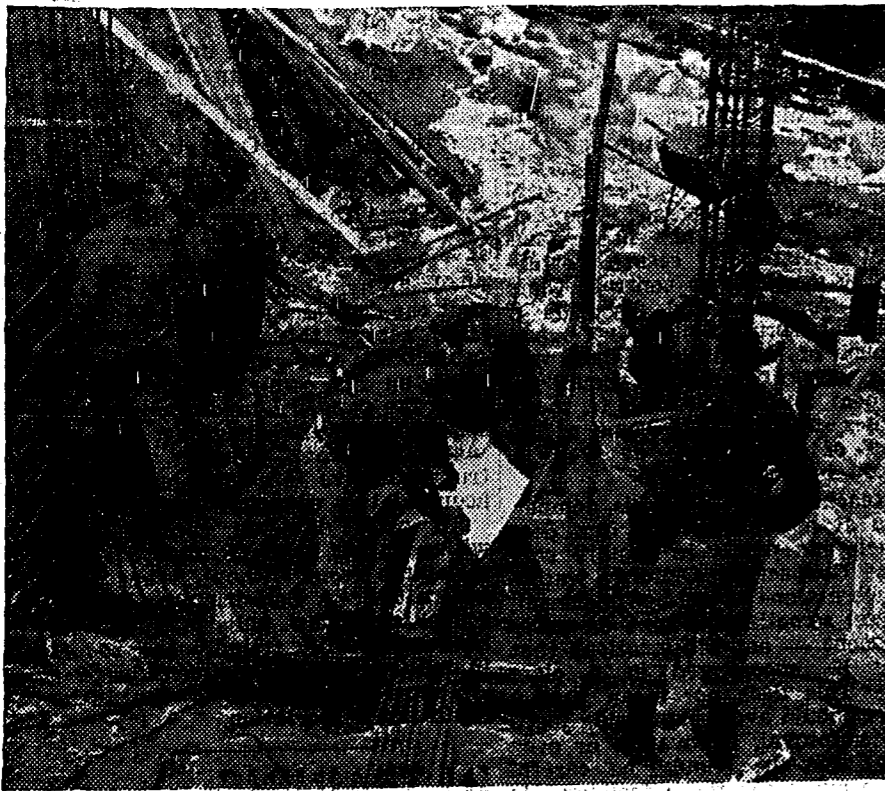

**Working To Help the Fish**

Construction work is underway to by-pass Dagger Falls on the Middle Fork of Salmon River with fishway around natural obstruction to ancient salmon spawning beds upstream. This fish and game department project is expected to be completed next year.

Biologists have demonstrated that extended delay in reaching spawning grounds results in heavy mortal-

ity of fish. Nature's inexorable law is that when salmon are delayed too long on, upstream migration, their time runs out and they die without fulfilling their mission of procreation.

Dagger Falls is about ten miles upstream from the Beary Valley-Stanley road junction, and the forest service has built a work road to the fishway site, which at present is closed to public use.

**ALIEN REGISTRATION**

Helena, Mont. — District Director R. G. Hoffeller of the Immigration and Naturalization Service states that the annual alien address report program usually causes a sharp rise in the number of applications for naturalization.

The law requires all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions, to report their address each January. Throughout the United States, almost 30 percent more applications for naturalization are received during the months of January, February and March than are received during other months. This sudden rise is attributed to the Alien Address Report program.

Aliens not required to make this report are diplomats, those accredited to certain international organizations, and those who have entered temporarily as agricultural workers. Forms for making the reports will be available to aliens at all Post Offices and offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service during the month of January.

It is indicated that aliens desiring information concerning naturalization or similar matters should obtain the forms at an office of the Service, where trained personnel will be available to answer inquiries.

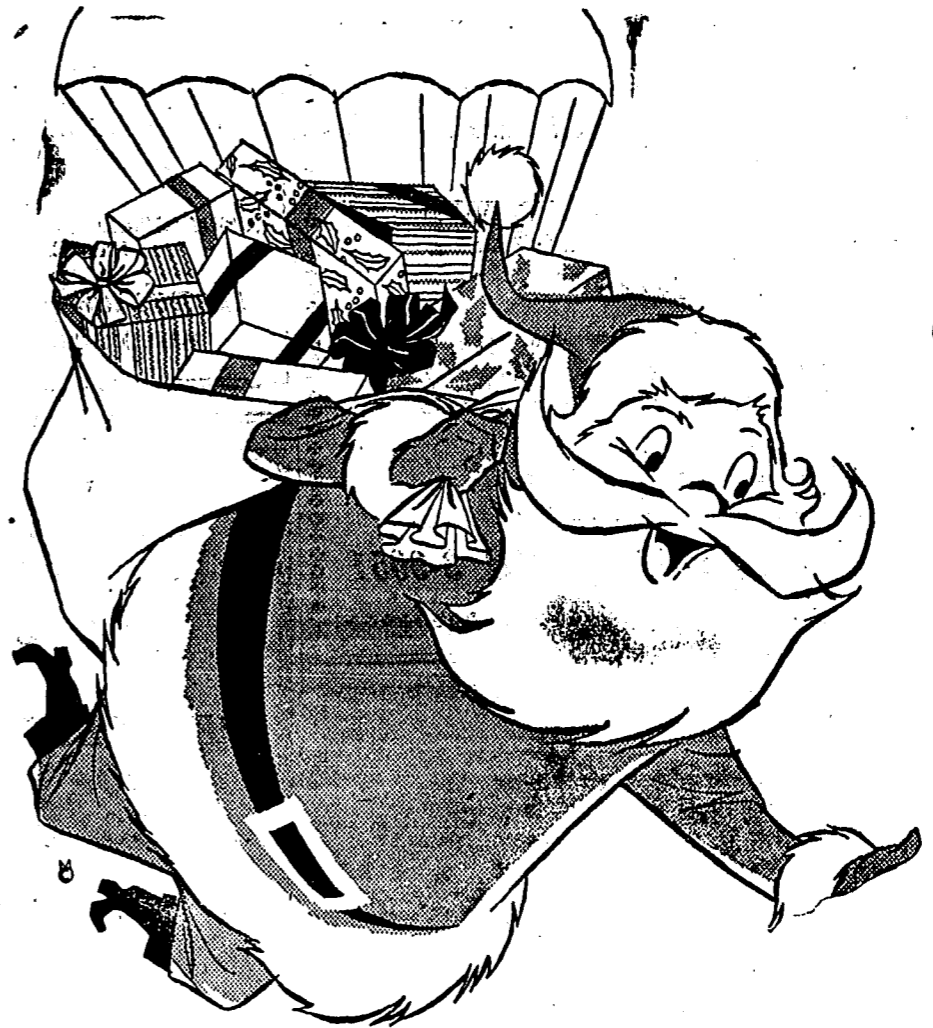
**RECEIVE GRANT**

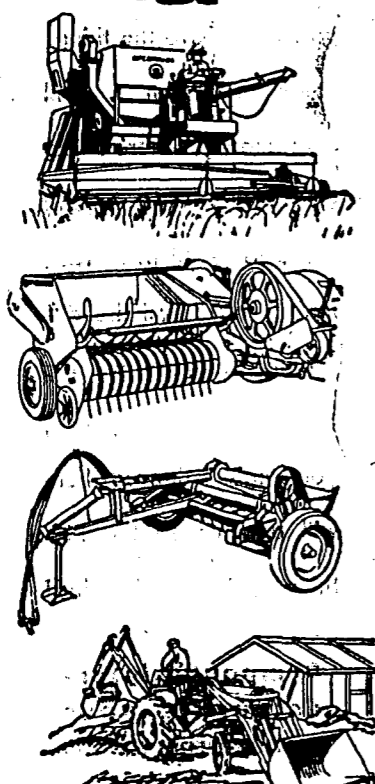

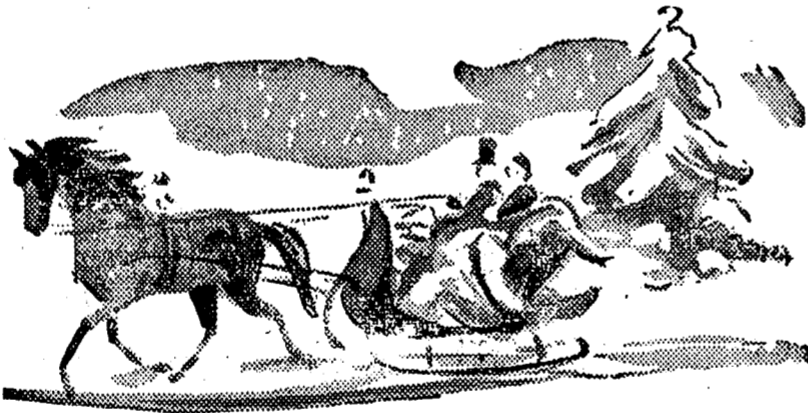
