U. S. Statesman, Noted for Flower

Although he was a brilliant states-man, and the friend of four Ameri-can presidents, Joel Roberts Poinsett is famous chiefly because he introduced the Mexican plant known as the "Painted Leaf" or "Mexican Fire Plant" into the United States.

Poinsett, then U.S. ambassador to Mexico, called the plant to the attention of American botanists and grew the plant himself as a hobby at his South Carolina home after he left Mexico.

The plant grew heavily in American favor — especially popular at Christmas time — and was renamed "Poinsetta," in honor of the man who brought it to this country. Contrary to popular impression, the flaming red bracts of the poin-

Abundant water is also a necessity, but it should be applied but once a day so that the plant may become moderately dry between waterings. This permits needed oxygen to reach the roots.

This makes it easier for the rotary motion to jam work into the enlarged gap if you momentarily relax a firm grip on the work. To correct this situation, adjust the tool rest forward so that it

Q.—"I'm planning to replace well-worn grinding wheels. I've heard that some new wheels disintegrate when first used. Is that

A .- It can happen if you don't observe a basic rule. Always select grinding wheels with an r.p.m. rating (marked on the label) that is higher than the rating marked on your grinder.








COLLISIONS DUE TO INCREASE

Boise - Rear end collisions are expected to increase as the winter wears on, was the opinion expressed this week by E. R. Hopper, commissioner of the department of law en-

Hopper said his prediction is based on 1959 accident report records which are being maintained in de-tail for the first time by the Traffic Safety and Driver Improvement Division, under Robert B. McCall.

Many of the indicated violations go hand-in-hand with weather changes - and most of them have been more numerous during the past three months than at any time this year. It was pointed out that adverse weather conditions often contribute to accidents but that safety epends on the driver inside, not the weather outside, of the car.

McCall reported that following too closely in an indicated violation that reached its peak in September, when the Pacific Northwest experienced an unprecedented heavy snowfall. This higher than average discrepancy on the part of drivers continued through October and November, right along with the increasing accident rate. September hit a new high for the year in accidents with 1,628 reported, and October was third high with 1,514.

Right along with following too closely as a violation, are indications that inattention on the part of drivers is increasing. This upswing bepeak in October, when 288 such violations were indicated by investigating officers.

It is possible to attribute high and low figures to just about anything, indicating the problem in mapping out plans for traffic safety and law enforcement. For instance, the weather cannot be blamed for the October peak in inattention accidents when collisions were in third place for a ten-month period. It would be just as easy to say that too many people were looking at Idaho's beautiful fall scenery, instead of at the road and at approaching vehicles.

The report showed that accident involved drivers hit their peak in not having the right of way during August, when 307 such violations were indicated.

June was the big month for speeding as shown in accident reports-going to the year's high of 156, and then dropping to 133 in November a figure still higher than average for the first ten months of the year.

Although October records show-ed the third greatest number of collisions so far this year, the number of persons injured was down to sixth place and deaths were among the low for the year - 12 for that month, the same as in March and April, and two more than May, when


