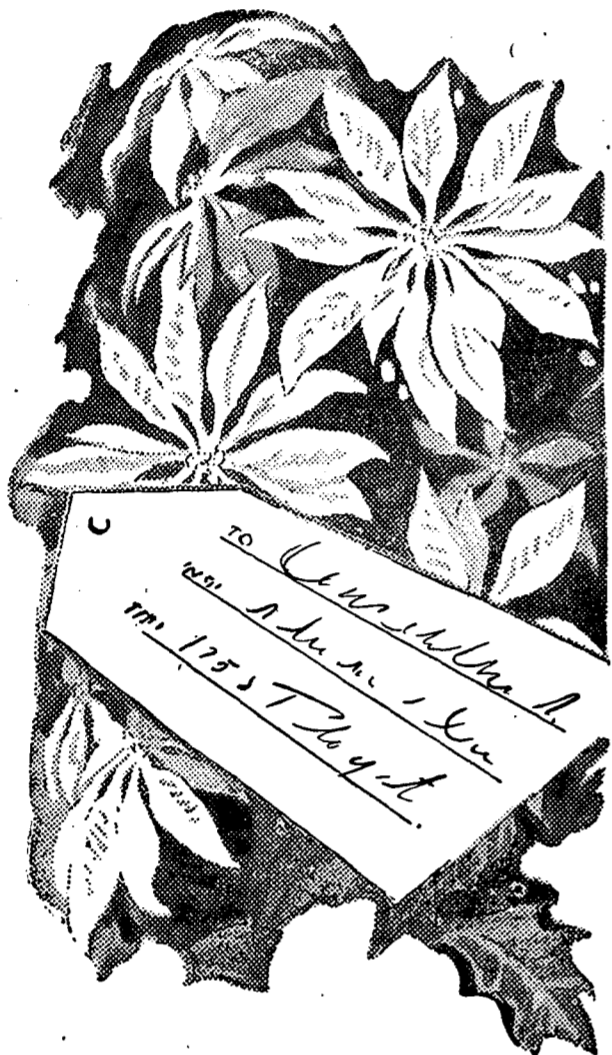

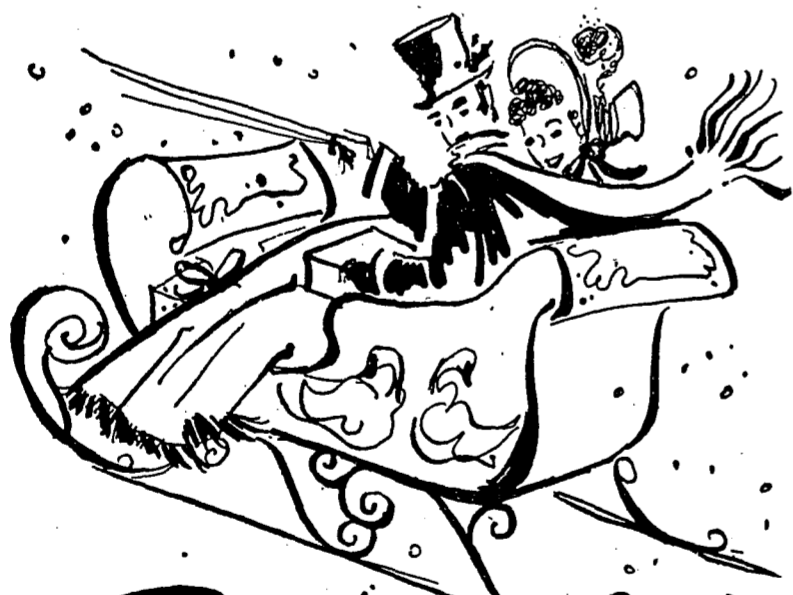

NATIONS' CUSTOMS VARY WIDELY ON CHRISTMAS DAY

In nearly all of the civilized world December 25 is a "red letter day." Peoples of all nationalities and religions celebrate the birth of the Christ. The customs of the many nations are a varied as the peoples and their faith are different.

In the Scandinavian countries, a Christmas tree made of a sheaf of wheat bound to a pole is raised for the winter birds. In Norway, rice pudding is always an important item on the menu for Christmas dinner. One almond is baked in the pudding and the person who finds the almond in his portion is always the first to get married.

Chinese children make add stockings by sewing three pieces of muslin together, and hang them up on Christmas Eve to hold the gifts brought by Lan Khoong-Khoong — which means "Nice Old Father" to them, Santa Claus to us.

The "old fashioned" American Christmas, while reflecting the traditions of many countries, most closely resembles the traditional English Christmas, complete with plum pudding (for which mince pie is now generally substituted), mistletoe and carolers.

YOU CAN HUNT COTTONTAILS

Boise — The lowly cottontail rabbit will carry the brunt of Idaho's hunting pressure, now that the deer and elk seasons have ended, the state Fish and Game Department says.

Idaho's long hunting season in the cottontail bunny does not end until February 29, 1960.

Found in every state, the cottontail rabbit is the leading game animal in the country, frequently in areas where there is little other game.

Lauding the little animal, Ross Leonard, director, pointed out that kids with their first .22 caliber rifle or 410 shotgun, seasoned hunters accompanied by well-trained beagles, and oldsters with fading eyesight and slowing step — all have come to regard the bunny as their personal adversary when snow hits the ground each fall and winter.

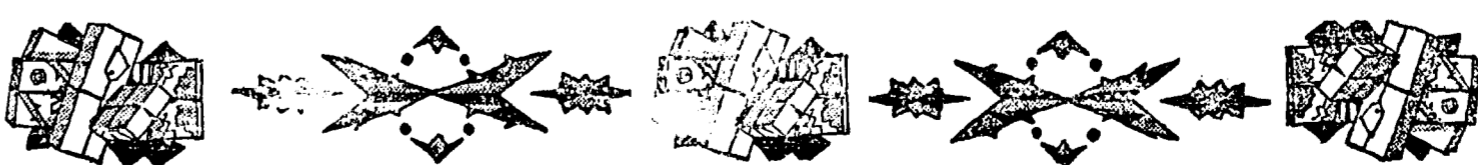
"When upland birds, migratory waterfowl and big game seasons end, the cottontail still provides hunters with sport until the end of February," Leonard pointed out.

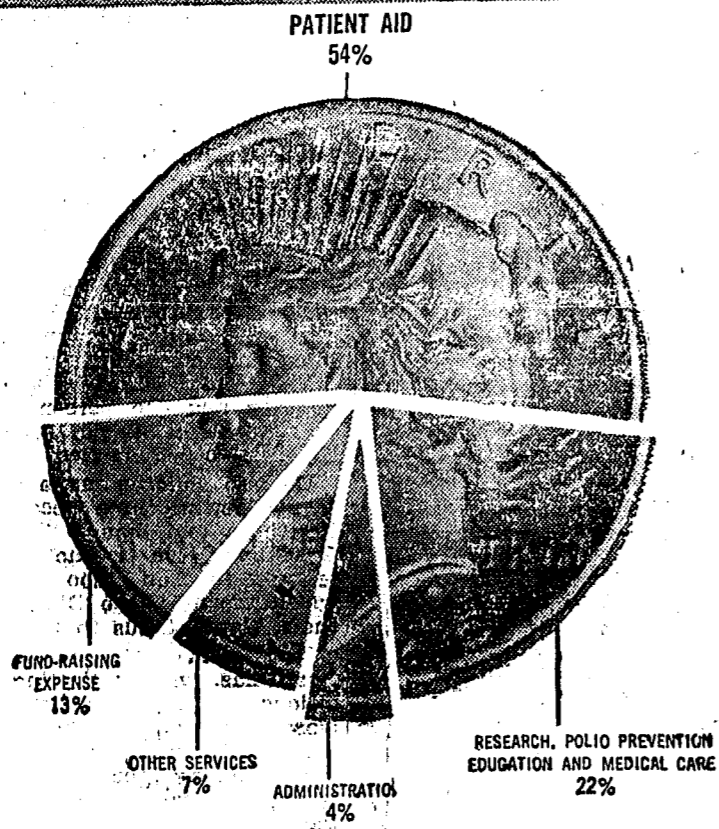

"Silent Night" Is Best Loved Carol

Of all the songs that return to bring warmth to the Yuletide season, no carol is so universally known as "Silent Night." Certainly no other is as loved and sung as this simple German song.

For years its origin was unknown, except that it supposedly dated back for many centuries. Recent investigations, however, disclosed that it was produced in 1818. The poem was originally written by Joseph Mohr, an assistant priest in Oberndorf in South Germany. The melody was composed by a schoolmaster, Franz Gruber.

Both the poet and the composer were part of the choir that sang the now famous carol that Christmas Eve in the Oberndorf church. The beloved song was sung first to the accompaniment of a guitar, for the church organ was out of order that Eve in 1818.

It has since been sung to the tune of almost every musical instrument in the world — and in the languages of many races.

Boise — The Department of Agriculture has allocated 42,000 pounds of frozen ground beef to the Idaho school lunch programs.

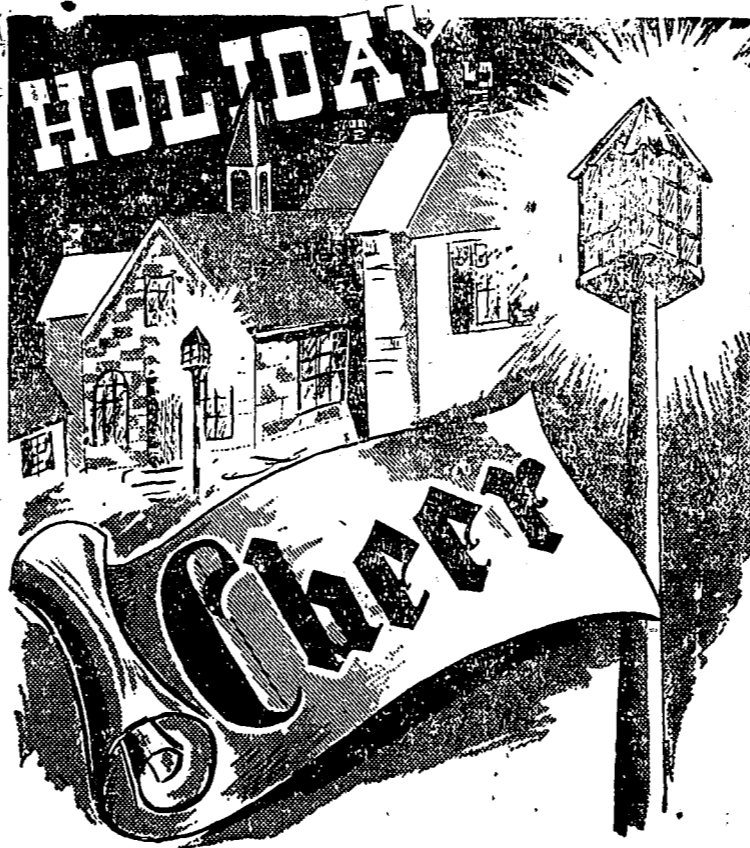

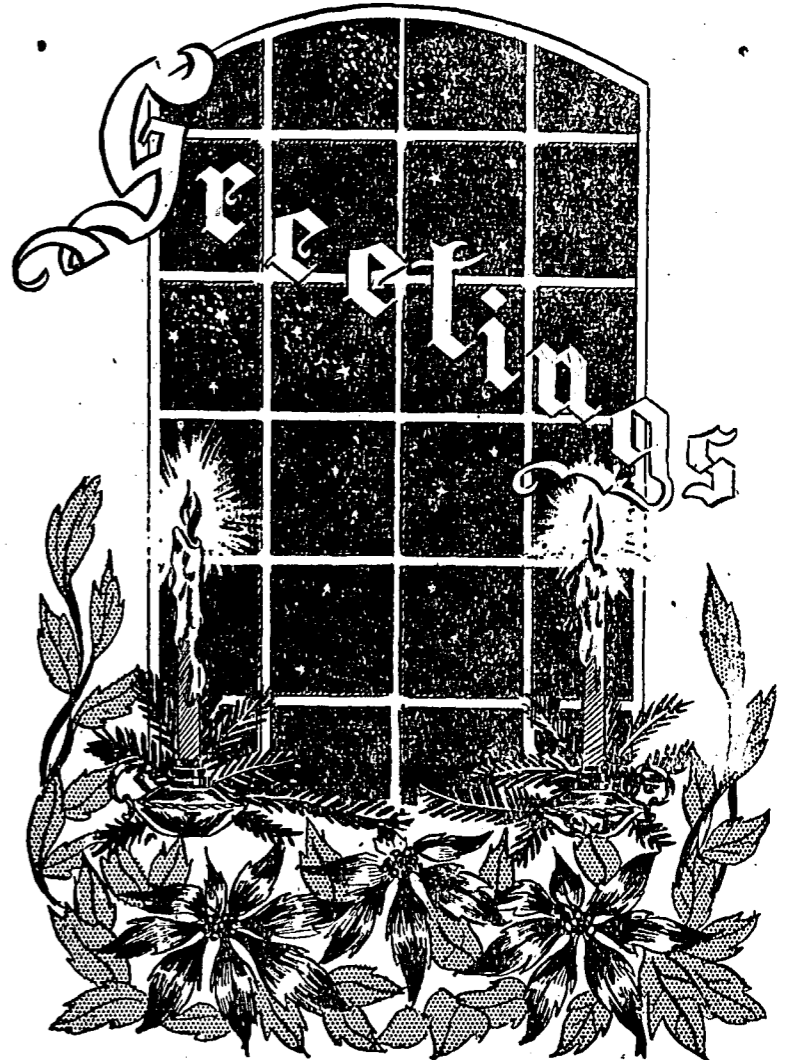

**CHRISTMAS CAROLS
HERALD SEASON**

For centuries Christmas Carols have heralded the Yuletide season around the Christian world. Many of them, slightly altered by changing times and customs, or perhaps in translation from a foreign language, have been handed down from one generation to another.

A great number probably have been lost because they were popular in generations not adequately covered by a written history.

Christmas Carols are of two main types — religious and convivial. The religious offer praise to the newborn and celebrate the birth of Christ. The convivial exalt mirth and the traditional feasting.

The latter is almost an invention of our modern civilization, and few "popular" Yuletide songs manage to return year after year. "Jingle Bells" and "White Christmas" seem to be the notable exceptions.

"Silent Night," "It Came Upon the Midnight Clear," and "O Come All Ye Faithful" seem destined to last forever.

**PORK PRODUCTION
RISING STEADILY**

U. of I. Moscow — Low prices of feed grains still encourage pork production over most of the nation.

R. Wayne Robinson, extension agricultural economist for the University of Idaho, says this favorable feed supply will tend to keep hog numbers high for the coming year.

As Robinson sees it, swine producers of the midwest see a favorable ration between the price of corn and the market price of their hogs. With cheaper feeds, they can still make a profit on the lowered markets of this fall and winter. Such a situation became apparent

last fall when government reports of plentiful grains were first made public. Farmers who at one time might have planned to sell brood sows probably bred them for another pig crop. "It adds up to more pork on the market in 1960 and a probable further drop in prices early next fall," Robinson says. "Just how the price reduction will come will depend on those factors that influence such markets. If, for any reason, it becomes necessary for large numbers of producers to send their swine to market at one time, the price is very likely to break suddenly. On the other hand, good weather conditions and the promise of more cheap feed for another year could easily influence farmers to hold their animals for orderly marketing. Should those conditions exist, any further price reduction will probably be small."

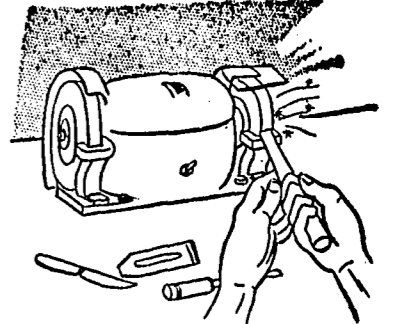

Ask a handyman what's the most useful power tool in his workshop. If he's standing next to a drill, he'll probably nominate that tool. If he happens to be working with a power saw, that might get the nod. So it goes with the man who chooses his tools carefully and uses them correctly. They all become "indispensable."

One tool definitely in this category is the bench grinder. While most tools, in general, perform actual work on projects, the grinder is used mainly to shape other tools in shape.

Chisels, knives, drill and plane bits, screwdrivers—these are just a few of the tools normally sharpened and shaped on a bench grinder.



Bench grinder a definite must for any shop.

Two questions bring up important things about bench grinder use:

Q.—"What causes work to jam between the grinding wheel and the tool rest? This has happened several times lately, but never occurred when the grinder was new."

A.—Using the grinder causes the wheel to wear down gradually. This is normal. But as the wheel wears, the gap between it and the tool rest grows. This makes it easier for the rotary motion to jam work into the enlarged gap if you momentarily relax a firm grip on the work. To correct this situation, adjust the tool rest forward so that it just clears the wheel.

Q.—"I'm planning to replace well-worn grinding wheels. I've heard that some new wheels disintegrate when first used. Is that true?"

A.—It can happen if you don't observe a basic rule. Always select grinding wheels with an r.p.m. rating (marked on the label) that is higher than the rating marked on your grinder.

**Santa Claus, Indiana,
Got Famous Name
Christmas Eve, 1882**

Although many towns have names directly or indirectly associated with Christmas, there is but one town named Santa Claus — in Indiana.

Except for a lucky break, the town would have had another name and hence would not have enjoyed the annual fame that it gathers around the Yuletide season.

The original intention to name the town Santa Fe fell through when the officials at Washington suggested that the town be named something else, since there was already a Santa Fe in New Mexico.

On Christmas Eve, in 1882, the citizens held a mass meeting to select another name, but every one proposed was discarded for one reason or another. The meeting was about to break up when Santa Claus, making his yearly visit to children in the neighborhood, strode in to get warm. He was in costume, and his arrival put one name in every mind. And so the town was named Santa Claus.

GIFT GIVING

The first Christmas gifts were those brought by the three Wise Men to the new-born infant at Bethlehem. The symbolic exchange of gifts at Christmas time, the world over, reflects the spirit of the gift-bearing Wise Men.

**LAND VALUES
SAID NEAR PEAK**

U. of I., Moscow — The price of Idaho farm land — steadily rising since World War II — may reach its peak in 1960.

Wayne Robinson, agricultural economist for the University of Idaho, says shrinking returns from capital invested in farm lands no longer justifies increased investments of this nature.

"In 1950 the average annual return on a dollar invested in good farm lands was at least 7 1/2%," Robinson points out. "The same invested dollar now returns 6c. Investors are realizing that their money will bring greater returns from other ventures. Farm lands will probably have little chance of increasing further in value when their returns have slowed to a point where capital no longer finds them attractive."

Robinson lists other reasons for predicting that land prices will reach their high point next year. All indications point to lowered farm income in 1960 with further tightening of the price-cost squeeze. Net incomes to farmers are expected to go down more than 7 percent in the next 12 months, he says. Only those farmers who do the most efficient job of production will show a profit for their efforts and investment.

The economist points out that consolidation of farm lands has continued to increase despite higher prices for farm lands. Changes in technology and farming methods over

the past quarter-century have encouraged efficient farmers to buy adjoining farms and farm constantly larger and larger holdings. Even with high land prices of the past few years, such consolidation has constantly increased, but will likely decrease in view of the lower returns from farm lands unless land prices decline.

Robinson says he does not expect a sudden drop in land values once the peak is reached. Government supports of farm crops are likely to hold profit and loss figures somewhere near a balance so that investors will become once more interested as land prices drop. Reductions in values are thus likely to be very gradual, when and if they come.

**TO KEEP NEEDLES ON YOUR
CHRISTMAS TREE**

If you have the type of a tree holder that permits the tree trunk to rest in water, you will find that a small amount of plant food dissolved in the water will aid in retaining the needles on the tree and keep them green. If you use a pebble or rock-filled pail to support the tree, cover the pebbles or rock with a plant food solution.

Use one teaspoonful of plant food (powdered form) to each gallon of water in the container, or use one plant food tablet to each gallon.

HOLLY WREATHS

Most popular of decorations is the Holly or evergreen wreath — symbolic of the thorns which were pressed on the brow of Christ at the Crucifixion.
