NEW PENSION LAW BECOMES EFFECTIVE IN JULY OF 1960

Veterans and widows in the Kendrick area are showing a keen interest in the new pension law which goes into effect next July 1. Louis Given, contact representative at the Moscow Veterans Administration office, reported this week. Many of these persons will be eligible for higher pension payments starting next July.

Given emphasized that veterans, widows and orphans presently on the pension rolls should not write the V.A. about the new law, as correspondence will result only in delays. He explained that all eligible persons presently on the rolls will receive an option form to complete. On this form, they may choose the existing pension program or the new plan. As the form will be mailed automatically, writing to the V.A. will not hasten its receipt.

The new pension plan, Given pointed out, has no bearing on service-connected disability compensation. It concerns non-service connected pensions only.

Basic requirements for pension eligibility will be changed July 1, 1960, for widows of World War II and Korean veterans, as well as for their children. Present law requires that the veteran have service-connected disability. After July 1, 1960, the widow has only to submit proof that the veteran had active war service for 90 days or more, with a discharge other than dishonorable.

Under the present law, eligible veterans receive a pension of \$66.15

or \$78.75 a month if annual income does not exceed \$1,400 if single or \$2,700 with a dependent. Pensions under the new law range from \$100 to \$40 a month subject to income limits. These limits are on a scale from \$600 to \$1,800 if single, and from \$1,000 to \$3,000 with dependents. For a widow alone, death pensions will range from \$60 to \$25 a month depending upon the widow's annual income which cannot exceed \$1,800. Higher rates apply to a widow with children, the top income limit being \$3,000, above which no pension will be paid.

Given repeated that no veteran or widow presently receiving a pension will be changed to the new law unless an election is made to do so. The V.A. will automatically send a form in ample time for the eligible person to make the election.


DO YOU KNOW

Daniel Ryden says a hobby could save your life. Whether it be gardening, hunting or playing the piano, it is no longer an indulgence, but a necessity. When we are completely tired out, we need rest, but we live in a world where physical exhaustion is practically unknown. Because of tensions and boredom, most of us need more physical exercise of some kind. So find a hobby and go after it.

I know a man who has strong leanings toward public power. The other day he said that Washington Water Power pays more taxes than a PUD; for example, because WWP makes a profit and the PUD does not. This is typical tricky reasoning, and not true at all. In the first place, if the PUD pays off its loan and has a system left, that system represents profit. Both WWP and the PUD receive money from their customers. WWP pays 23¢ of each revenue dollar in taxes, while the PUD pays about 7¢—three to one. If WWP should receive a rate increase of \$3,000,000, the tax collector immediately takes \$1,600,000 for taxes. It does not come out of profits, because the company did not have a chance to use it. To support functions of government which benefit all of us, the PUD gets off mighty easy. I'd like to see them pay their share.


If you earn \$5,000 a year, every hour is worth \$2.56. This adds up to \$625 in a year's time. So whether you work for yourself, or work for somebody else, don't waste time. Keep busy at something.

What do you know! In a recent column I said the national rural electrification officers consider the REA the same as any other private business. Well, the manager of a neighboring REA said the same thing. "We consider ourselves private business," he said. "We borrow money and operate on business principles, and we don't want folks to call us public power." So I ask myself, why have public power leaders tried to put the public power label on REAs?

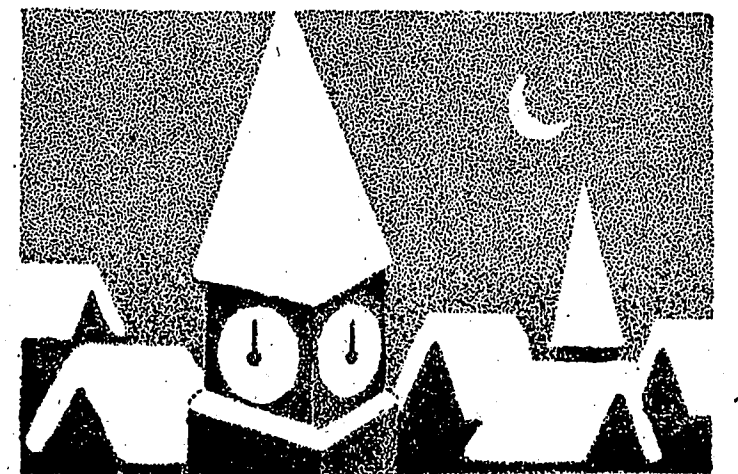
