### DO YOU KNOW

Way down in Memphis, Tennessee, where the public power system pays no federal taxes, and gets money with dirt-cheap interest, we find that along with other businesses, Memphis, too, is caught in the wheels of inflation. Memphis is raising electric rates 10%! Now they will appreciate the Washington Water Power Company's need for a slight rate raise.






