

FARM FORESTRY CLINICS

A series of three Farm Forestry clinics are being organized by Russell Slade, extension farm forester of St. Maries, for woodlot owners and operators in Kootenai, Benewah and Latah counties.

The clinics are scheduled for Wednesday, Feb. 3, at Coeur d'Alene; Thursday, Feb. 4 at St. Maries, and Friday, Feb. 5, at Moscow. The program for all three places will include the following subjects: Financial returns and expenses from small woodlands; woodlands as a security for loans; tree diseases and insects important to small woodlands; local log markets and tree plantings for Christmas trees and timber.

In addition the clinic at Moscow will include: The tree farm program; soils and sites of small woodlands; thinning of woodlands; agricultural stabilization and conservation for forestry practices and depletion allowances on income tax for small woodlands.

Discussion leaders will be local log buyers and representatives from the College of Forestry, University of Idaho; local banks, U. S. Forestry Service; Soil Conservation Service; farm woodland owners and others.

The clinics will be informal and participation from those attending will be encouraged.

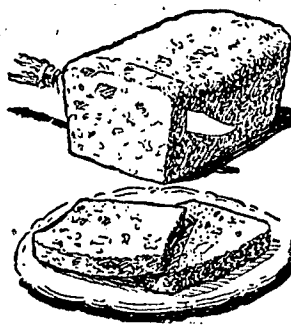
