DEFENSE PROBLEM

Moscow's population would increase about two and one-half times if evacuation of families from surrounding target areas became necessary; food supplies would be frozen and only essential foods would be distributed; all commercial trucks would be pressed into service to furnish transportation for evacuees.

IDAHO FARMERS TO VISIT RUSSIA

Boise — Vern Ingebritsen, farm director for a Moscow radio station, has been named host and delegation leader for a group of Idaho agricultural leaders on a special 21-day goodwill farm inspection tour throughout Europe and the Soviet Union.

The Idaho farm leaders will depart New York's International Airport on Monday, June 27. They will take part in numerous farm visitations, as well as meetings and interviews with United States and foreign government agricultural representatives throughout Belgium, Holland, Poland, Germany, France and the Soviet Union.

Arranged and designed to implement the aims and purposes of President Eisenhower's "People to People" campaign and the United States cultural visitation exchange program, the purpose of the journey will be to promote understanding between people, to receive a summarized look into the different ways the people of Europe and the Soviet Union conduct their farming activities, observe methods and learn first hand, something of the conditions that exist behind the Iron Curtain.

DO YOU KNOW

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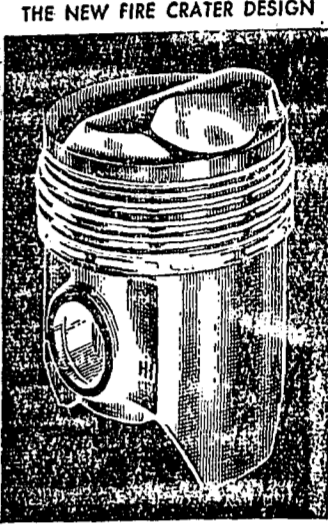

FOSTER HOMES BEING SOUGHT IN COUNTY

Mrs. Margaret M. Johansen, County Director for the Department of Public Assistance, reports that the local office is searching for foster homes in Latah County to provide family living for children of all ages.

The Department's program was broadened in July, 1959, when the law gave the department authority to accept custody of children on a selective basis.

Because of the many unhappy experiences that usually proceed the breakdown of a home and the fact that it is hard for any child to be separated for his natural parents, every foster child requires exceptional understanding and care. Consequently, foster homes must be very carefully selected and standards set by the state must be met. Foster parents must be of parent age, their home must be adequate for the care of additional children and they must be warm, understanding people and love children.

Under the child welfare program of the Department of Public Assistance, a social worker supervises the placement and is always ready to give counsel to the foster parents. Payment to the foster parents for care as well as medical and other expenses are worked out on an individual basis through the department.

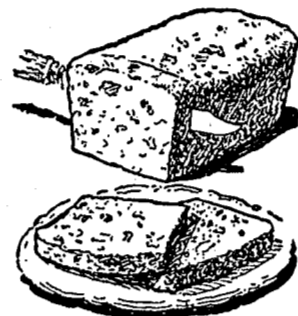
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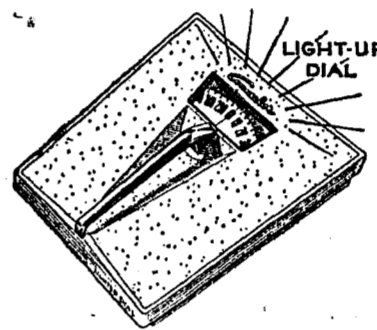
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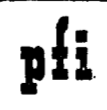

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ORDINANCE NO. 495
AN ORDINANCE VACATING A PORTION OF RAILROAD STREET SITUATED IN THE VILLAGE OF KENDRICK, LATAH COUNTY, IDAHO; AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF DEEDS TO THE OWNERS OF LANDS ABUTTING ON SAID STREET AND PROVIDING FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the Village of Kendrick, Idaho:

Section 1. That the portion of Railroad Street of the Village of Kendrick, Idaho, beginning on a line across said Railroad Street fifty (50) feet West of the East boundary line extended of lot 10, Block 7, Original Town of Kendrick, Idaho, according to the recorded plat thereof, and extending to the West boundary line extended of Lot 8 of said Block 7 be, and the same is hereby vacated.

Section 2. That the Chairman of the Board of Trustees and the Clerk of the Village of Kendrick, Idaho, be, and they are hereby, authorized and directed, in the name and on behalf of the village of Kendrick, to execute and deliver to the owners of land abutting on said vacated portion of Railroad Street good and proper deeds conveying to said owners the one-half of said vacated street abutting on the land of said owners.

Section 3. That this ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage, approval and publication.

FORMER KENDRICK MAN, WIFE, WORK IN HEART RESEARCH

William and Carolyn Dempsey Mitchell, students at the University of Idaho at Moscow, are pooling their talents in a basic research project under a grant from the Idaho Heart Association.

This Idaho student couple, pre-medical and bio-chemistry majors, are planning careers as a medical doctor and in research and teaching. William Mitchell is a graduate of Kendrick High school and Carolyn received her diploma from the Hatley High school.

In their research project, the Mitchells are doing a descriptive anatomical study on the snake, putting special emphasis on the heart and circulatory system. Included in the research is an attempt to offer a scientific reason for the snake's ability to move on a dry surface. "Snakes have blood vessels which should go to legs," says Mrs. Mitchell. "We are tracing the complete circulatory system of a boa constrictor to see what happens to these blood vessels."

The Mitchells are but two of 14 young Idahoans, who during the past 15 months have worked on scientific research in Idaho's institutions of

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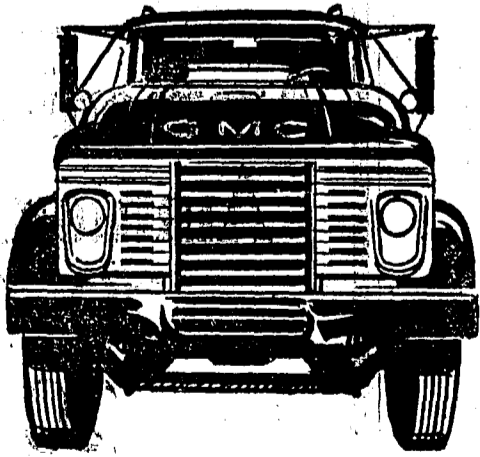

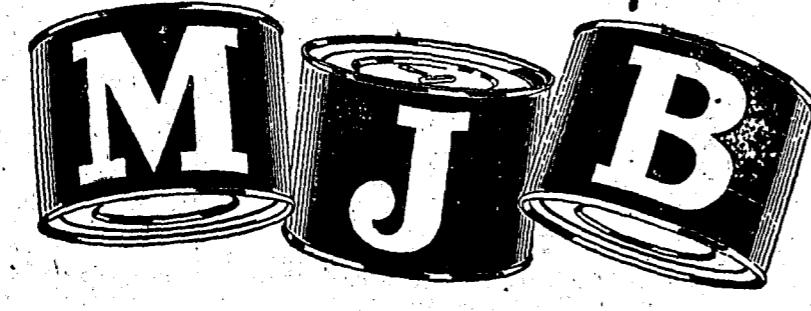
