### AUCTION

Mrs. George Eggers brought us in the following copy of an auction sale bill which is over 100 years old, clipped from an eastern paper. A similar one has been going the rounds of the press, but we had not seen this one — so here it is:

Public Sale  
"Having sold my farm and am leaving for Oregon Territory" by ox team, will offer on March 1, 1849, all my personal property, to-wit:

"All ox teams except two teams, Buck and Ben, and Tom and Jerry; two milch cows, gray mare and colt, one pair of oxen and yoke, 1 baby yoke, 2 ox carts, 1 iron plow with wood mold board, 890 feet of poplar weather boards, 1,000 three-foot clapboards, 1,500 ten-foot fence rails, one 60 gallon soap kettle, 85 sugar troughs made of white ash timber, 10 gallons maple syrup, 2 spinning wheels, 20 pounds mutton tallow, 20 pounds beef tallow, one large loom made by Jerry Wilson, 300 poles, 100 split hoops, 100 empty barrels, 32-gallon barrel of Johnson Miller whiskey 7 years old,

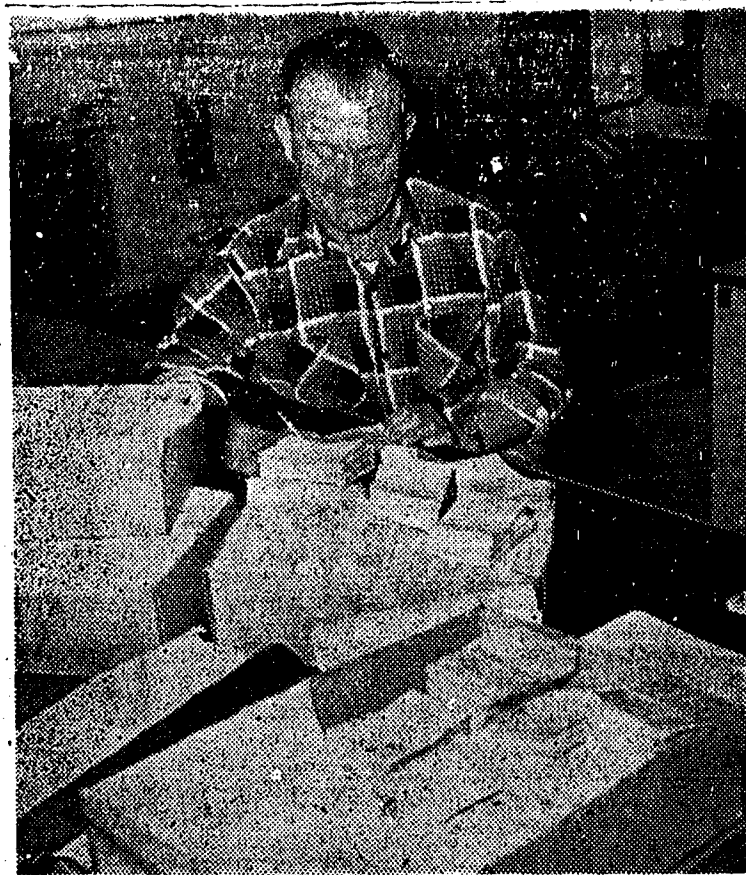
20 gallons apple brandy, one 40-gallon copper still, four sides of tanning leather, one dozen real hooks, 2 handled hooks, 3 scythes and cradles, one dozen wooden pitchforks, one-half interest in tan yard, one .32 calibre rifle, bullet molds and powder horn, rifle made by Bon Miller, 50 gallons soft soap, hams, bacon and lard, 40 gallons sorghum, six head of fox hounds all soft mouthed except one.

"At the same time will sell my six negro slaves, 2 men 35 and 50 years old, 2 boys 12 and 18 years old, 2 mulatto, wenches 40 and 30 years old, will sell all together to same party as will not separate them. Terms of sale cash in hand or note to draw 4 percent interest, with Bob McConnell as security.

"My home is 2 miles south of Versailles, Kentucky, on McComm's ferry pike. Sale will begin at 8 o'clock a. m. Plenty to drink and eat."

GAME BIOLOGIST WILLIAM CUNNINGHAM analyzes hunter report cards for 1959 seasons. In the past four years hunters have taken an average of nearly 70,000 deer and 15,000 elk. These animals now are more plentiful in Idaho than they were 20 years ago. In most seasons from 50 to 60 percent of state deer hunters were successful, and elk hunting is usually between 25 and 30 percent. Last fall, slightly fewer elk than average were taken because of bad hunting weather early in the season. Hunter report cards bring vital information to game management workers, and the department is gratified that more than 85,000 were completed and returned.

### NIGHT LIGHTS

U. of I. Moscow — Night lights in a poultry house usually mean more eggs. Dairy cows, on the other hand, do not respond with much more milk when the electric lights are left on after dark.

Recent research by the University of Idaho College of Agriculture, suggests that the men who care for the dairy herds after dark get more benefit from the night lights than do the cows, says D. W. Works, project director for the Idaho farm electrification committee.

"Lights do not stimulate increased milk production," he reports. This study was conducted by the Department of Agricultural Engineering in co-operation with the Department of Dairy Science.

"While the cows may not respond to the night lights the workers about the dairy barns certainly appreciate them," Works notes. "They report that when lights are on at night the cows are easier to feed and care for. Night lighting is an important factor in farm safety."

Adequate yard lighting makes it easier to observe livestock and give the animals better night care. Works indicates that this contribution to better management is by itself, adequate justification for the lighting units.

M. for the purpose of voting upon the question and proposition of issuing Water Revenue Bonds in the principal amount of not more than \$7,000.00 for the purpose of acquiring funds to pay the cost of the following improvements and betterments to the water system: (a) Acquisition of additional water supply; (b) Acquisition and installation of necessary pumps; (c) Construction of pump house and/or shelter; (d) Connecting the water supply to Village water system, pursuant to provisions of Ordinance No. 115 of this Village, which is hereby referred to for further particulars, and which is made by reference a part of this Notice.

Said Bonds shall bear interest at a rate, or rates, of not in excess of five per cent (5%) per annum payable semi-annually, and shall run for a period of Twenty (20) years from date of issue, shall be of the denomination of \$350.00 each, and shall mature and be payable as follows: \$350.00 in each of the years 1962 to 1979, both inclusive and \$700.00 in the year 1980, as provided in said Ordinance No. 115. The principal and interest of said bonds shall be paid solely out of the revenues of the Water System. The question to be submitted to the electors shall be by ballot reading substantially as follows:

Havens, Village Clerk, is the registration officer for said election and that the registration books will be open at his office in the City Hall in said Village, which is the place of registration, during office hours, to-wit, from 9:00 o'clock, A. M. until 5:00 o'clock P. M. beginning this day, until and including Saturday, March 19, 1960; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, preceding said election, to-wit, March 17th, 18th and 19th, 1960, said books will be open from 9:00 o'clock, A. M. until 5:00 o'clock, P. M. and from 7:00 o'clock, P. M., until 9:00 o'clock, P. M.

All electors of said Village having the qualifications to vote at general elections for the election of Village officers of said Village, are entitled to vote at the election herein noticed. Said electors are required to have and possess the qualifications of electors of the State of Idaho, as required by the Constitution and laws thereof, and to have resided within the limits of said Village for three months preceding said election and to be registered as required by law. Those electors who have registered for the last preceding general election held in said Village are not required to register again for the election herein noticed so long as he or she shall continue to reside at the same address in which he or she is living-and-from which he or she shall have registered, but those who failed to register for said general election, or thereafter, or have failed or neglected heretofore to vote for two successive biennial Village elections, are required to register in order to vote at the election herein noticed. If an elector has registered and has removed from the Village and has remained away for a period of one year, his name shall be stricken from the register, and if he shall again reside in the Village for at least thirty days, he shall again register.

Said election shall be conducted in other particulars as other municipal elections.

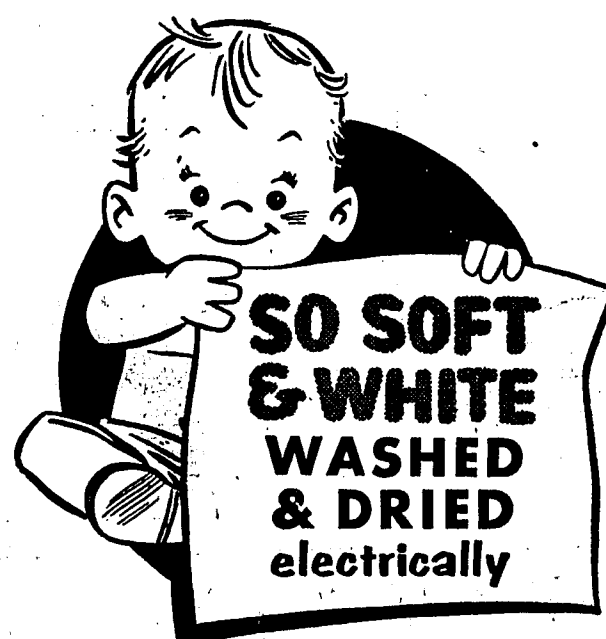

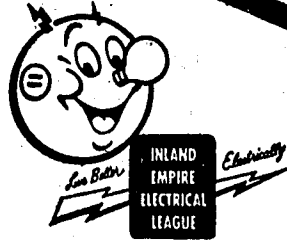

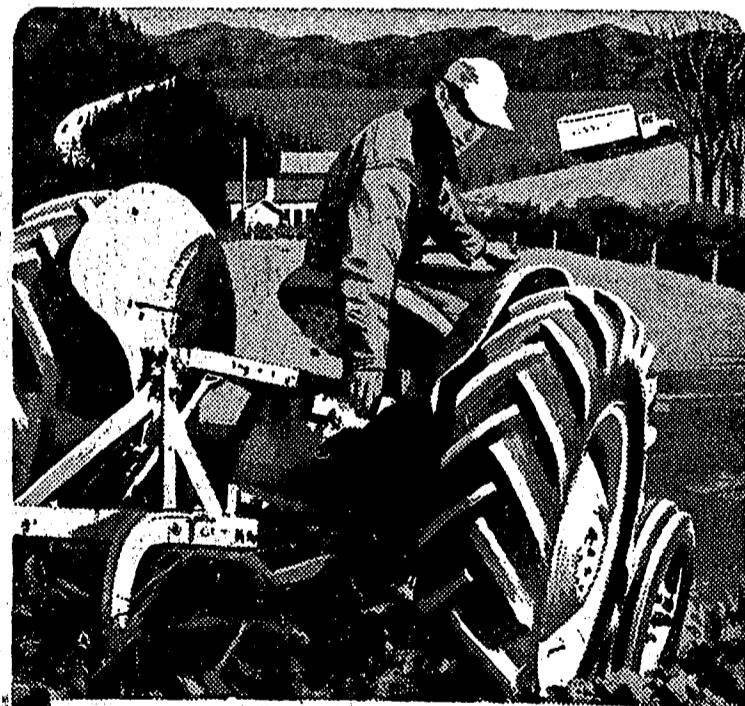
