NIGHT LIGHTS

U. of I, Moscow - Night lights in a poultry house usually mean more eggs. Dairy cows, on the other hand. do not respond with much more milk when the electric lights are left on after dark.

Recent research by the University of Idaho College of Agriculture, suggests that the men who care for the dairy herds after dark get more benefit from the night lights than do the cows, says D. W. Works, project director for the Idaho farm electrification committee.

"Lights do not stimulate increased milk production," he reports. This study was conducted by the Department of Agricultural Engineering in co-operation with the Department of Dairy Science.

"While the cows may not respond to the night lights the workers about the dairy barns certainly appreciate them," Works notes. "They report that when lights are on at night the cows are easier to feed and care for. Night lighting is an important factor in farm safety."


