



Even if you live far from an industrial "target" area, a nuclear bomb blast would have almost an immediate effect. The dangers of possible "fall-out" would be multiplied by disruption of many services and complicated by a stream of evacuees from bombed

The struggle for survival within a target area after an attack would be even greater.

The handyman can put his power tools to work now on "Project Stay Alive" by building an emergency food and equipment cupboard. To the distant rural resident, it offers a useful reserve supply. To the urban area survivor, it might mean the difference between life and star-



Emergency food cupboard is very important today.

The basement seems the likely place for such a cupboard, except in areas of flood danger. The survival center could be built in the often unused area under a stair-

The center should have enough shelf-space for a seven-day supply of such foods as powdered and evaporated milk; dehydrated and canned juices, fruits, vegetables, soups and meats; jars of cheese and peanut butter; readyto-eat cereals and crackers; instant tea; coffee or cocoa, and bottled or canned beverages.

You may also wish to include storage space for blankets, clothing, tents, flashlights, first aid and other emergency equipment.

In many countries, someone is serving as a civil defense officer who can advise you on building and locating your emergency storage cupboard. A fully enclosed supply center, constructed of waterproof and fireproof materials, would appear the most desirable. Keep some of your reserves packed in knapsacks or other carriers for quick removal in case evacuation is necessary. (Readers may address handicraft problems to Thor Research Cen-
