OUR ELECTION YEAR POLICY

On every election year, during the spring and early summer months, politicians — especially those seeking state and national offices start "warming up for the political wars" with their announcements of candidacy and statements on how they intend to save the nation from political, economic and moral disaster.

This year the "warming trend" is coming earlier than usual because of the change in the primary election law which advances the primary election to June 7, this year, rather than the first week in August.

Candidates have already begun their flood of announcements, all of which means that we're on the receiving end for the normal barrage of political promises.

This, then, is a good time for the Kendrick Gazette to make its usual election year announcement regarding policy on political publicity. The situation has not changed.

Whenever a bona fide candidate pays a personal visit to this community — or something comes up in the political race that directly involves this community — we'll carry the story — and stories on local candidates.

But for the rest of it — the reams and reams of propaganda, the daily batch of "statements," "charges" and "news releases," the beaming photographs, and all the rest — the Gazette will consider such material for what it really is — political advertising, and unless accompanied by check on bona fide insertion order, it will wind up in "File 13." This same will apply to political advertising thinly disguised as a "Letter to the Editor."

For ourselves, we will do our best to follow our 30-year-old policy of "strictly independent in politics." If we have any political preference or prejudice, we will do our best to keep it out of our columns. Frankly, we believe that "every man's politics and religion" is his own, and it is not up to us to try and change it!

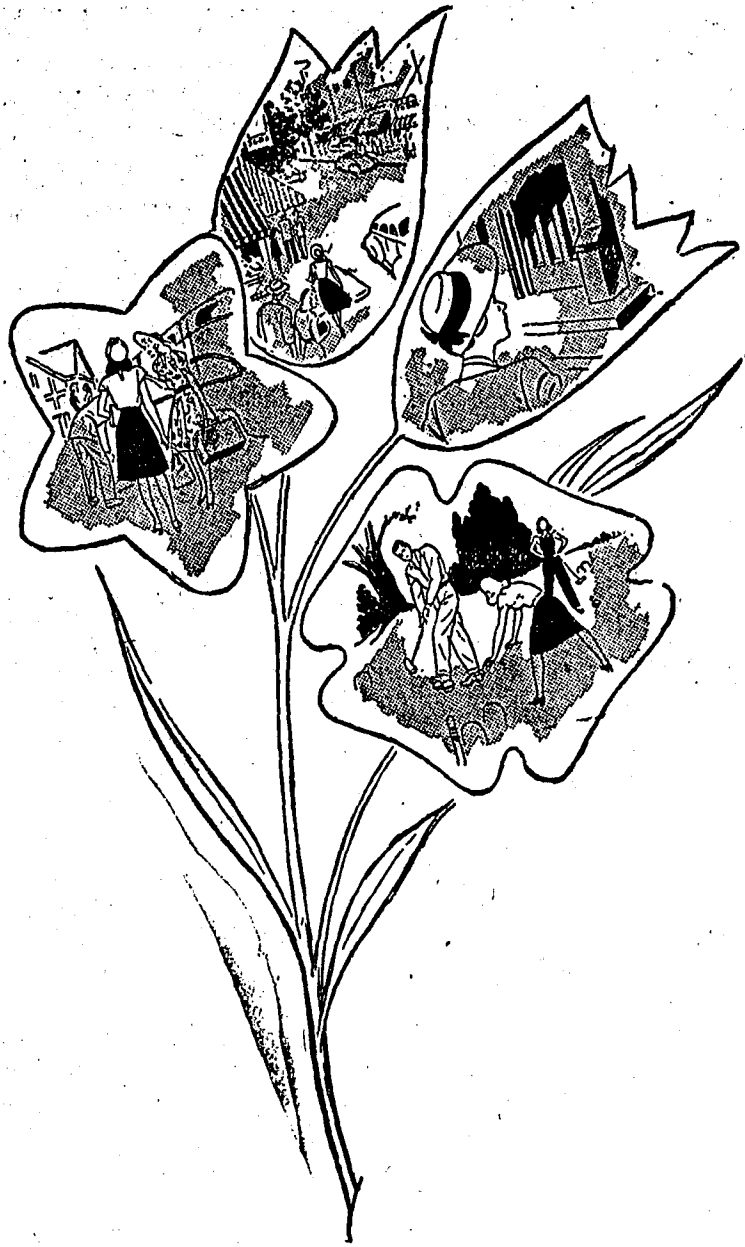

NOTICE OF SPECIAL MUNICIPAL BOND ELECTION AND REGISTRATION THEREFOR

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that pursuant to Ordinance No. 115 of the Village of Juliaetta, Latah County, Idaho, a special election will be held within the Village of Juliaetta, Idaho, on Tuesday, March 22, 1960, between the hours of 9:00 o'clock A. M. and 7:00 o'clock, P. M. for the purpose of voting upon the question and proposition of issuing Water Revenue Bonds in the principal amount of not more than \$7,000.00 for the purpose of acquiring funds to pay the cost of the following improvements and betterments to the water system: (a) Acquisition of additional water supply; (b) Acquisition and installation of necessary pumps; (c) Construction of pump house and/or shelter; (d) Connecting the water supply to Village water system, pursuant to provisions of Ordinance No. 115 of this Village, which is hereby referred to for further particulars, and which is made by reference a part of this Notice.

Said Bonds shall bear interest at a rate, or rates, of not in excess of five per cent (5%) per annum, payable semi-annually, and shall run for a period of Twenty (20) years from date of issue, shall be of the denomination of \$350.00 each, and shall mature and be payable as follows: \$350.00 in each of the years 1962 to 1979, both inclusive and \$700.00 in the year 1980, as provided in said Ordinance No. 115. The principal and interest of said bonds shall be paid solely out of the revenues of the Water System.

The question to be submitted to the electors shall be by ballot reading substantially as follows:

"IN FAVOR OF issuing Water Revenue Bonds for the purpose provided in Ordinance No. 115"

"AGAINST issuing Water Revenue Bonds for the purpose provided in Ordinance No. 115"

The voting place for said election shall be at the City Hall in Juliaetta, Idaho.

NOTICE AS TO REGISTRATION NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that Ira W. Havens, Village Clerk, is the registration officer for said election and that the registration books will be open at his office in the City Hall in said Village, which is the place of registration, during office hours, to-wit, from 9:00 o'clock, A. M. until 5:00 o'clock P. M. beginning this day, until and including Saturday, March 19, 1960; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, preceding said election, to-wit, March 17th, 18th and 19th, 1960, said books will be open from 9:00 o'clock, A. M. until 5:00 o'clock, P. M. and from 7:00 o'clock, P. M., until 9:00 o'clock, P. M.

All electors of said Village having the qualifications to vote at general elections for the election of Village officers of said Village, are entitled to vote at the election herein noticed. Said electors are required to have and possess the qualifications of electors of the State of Idaho, as required by the Constitution and laws thereof, and to have resided within the limits of said Village for three months preceding said election and to be registered as required by law. Those electors who have registered for the last preceding general election held in said Village are not required to register again for the election herein noticed so long as he or she shall continue to reside at the same address in which he or she is living and from which he or she shall have registered, but those who failed to register for said general election, or thereafter, or have failed or neglected heretofore to vote for two successive biennial Village elections, are required to register in order to vote at the election herein noticed. If an elector has registered and has removed from the Village and has remained away for a period of one year, his name shall be stricken from the register, and if he shall again reside in the Village for at least thirty days, he shall again register.

Said election shall be conducted in other particulars as other municipal elections.
