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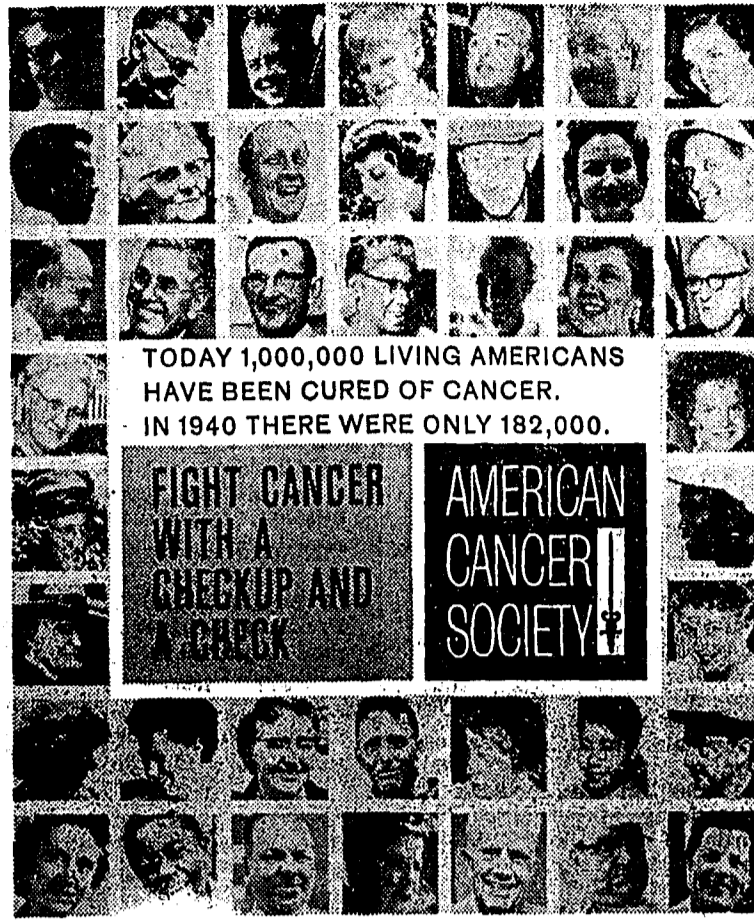

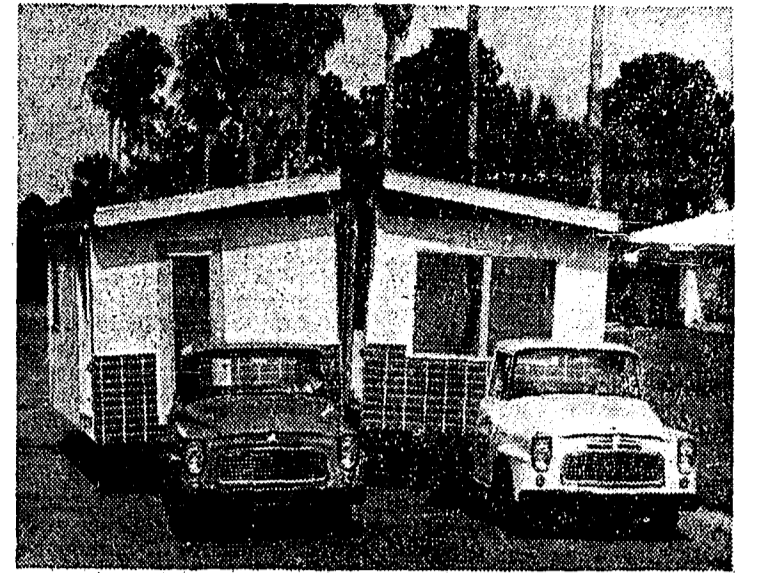

All that remains to be done is bolt halves to each other and to foundation.



JACKED-UP HALF is lowered onto foundation footings laid earlier. Homes have 680 square feet of living space, sell for \$8,990 each within a 500-mile radius of Leesburg plant. Price includes hauling of six-ton halves and cost of foundation.

CARPORT AND COVERED PATIO extend exterior lines, placing 1,502 square feet under roof. To paraphrase an old saying, "Home is where trucks park it."



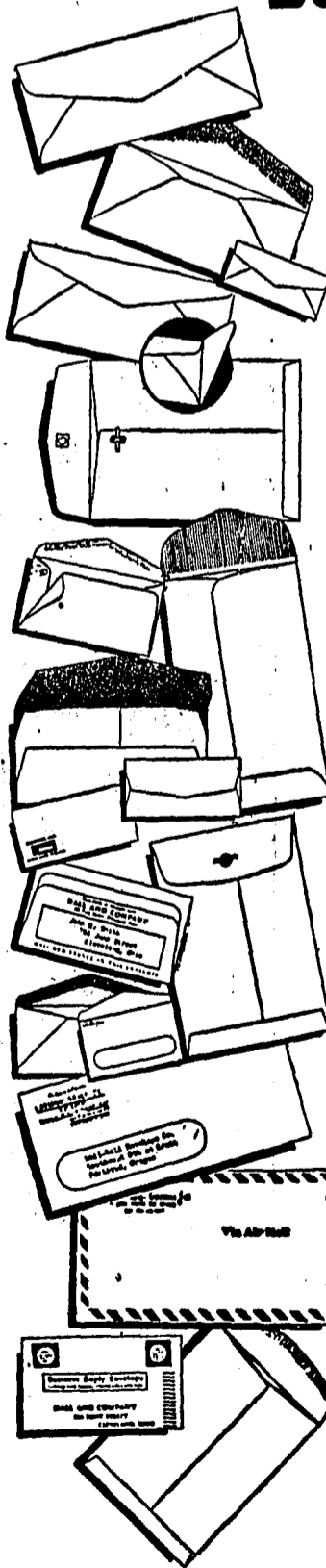

CAN YOU REMEMBER?

(By Jack Powell)

The following article appeared in the Shafon Mall (Oregon) under the head of "Jack's Jottings," and reached us via Mr. and Mrs. Walter McCall. They (and we) thought it so good that we reprint it for the benefit of our readers:

It recently occurred to us that a citizen reaching voting age this year would of necessity be of the vintage of 1939. This means that he would have been hatched a dozen years after the late Henry Ford threw in the towel and abandoned production of the now-legendary Model T Ford.

In fact, if it weren't for the efforts of antiquarians and antique car addicts, many a youth now reaching the age of reason would be hard put to identify one of those noble relics. It seems incredible, but the hardy "Tin Lizzie" once as numerous as the grasshopper or boll weevil, has now gone the way of the town ditching post and water trough.

Like their creator, Henry, they represented pure utility, no frills. They came for example, in a rather narrow color range, a choice of black. All shifting was done with the feet, an excellent arrangement since the helmsman needed both hands for the tiller. When the operator pushed the "go-ahead" pedal, his steed would sigh, shake itself, roar and lurch forward at a death-defying five-mile-per-hour clip. When he let both feet off the pedal, it would go into high gear, provided the forward speed was adequate. This process consisted of a series of mechanical belches, sounding something like "ga-hark, ga-hawk," and eventually ending in a steady rattle.

Showing down (as we now recall) the middle pedal, put the little jewel into reverse. This called forth a series of agonizing gasps, whines, shrieks, roars and shudders, after which it would occasionally back up. Reverse gear, being the lowest, was frequently called into play when a hill proved too steep for low and there was no way out but to back up. Other times, on a steep hill, when the fuel supply was low, the gravity gas system wouldn't feed except in reverse.

Right pedal was the brake. You shoved down on it, and if the Lord had you by the hand, you eventually stopped. If he didn't, there was always reverse, which worked better anyway. Failing this, there was low gear, the equivalent of "putting your gear down." If nothing worked you could bail out, since you weren't apt to be going very fast in the first place. In some Fords of our acquaintance, all the bands dragged and if you took your hand off the gas you'd probably stop anyway.

We can't for the life of us remember the author of "Farewell, My Lovely," possibly the best eulogy ever written on the Lizzie. But in it the author recalled how his own Model

T, when he would crank it on a cold morning, would creep forward as if nuzzling his pocket for a lump of sugar. Less sedate T's have been known to roar into action when cranked, running completely over their owner and leaving him flattened in the driveway, while they careened down the road, pilotless. This was seldom fatal, since they rode about a yard off the ground, but very annoying.

They had very definite personalities. Many former owners would still take the witness stand and swear that their T's responded to prayer, profanity, or even a swift kick in the differential. The "juice system," powered by a magneto and coil, was pure black magic. When starting seemed hopeless, it frequently helped to take out the coil and hit it a few raps with a hammer, but nobody ever succeeded in figuring out how it actually worked. This mystery is still unsolved.

When a T was roaring at full voice, with its mighty 27-horsepower motor functioning magnificently, and all four powerful pistons hammering, conversation at anything but a shout was impossible. Even if it had been, occupants generally were shaking like popcorn in a skillet, giving a quavering and "jerky" tone to their voices.

Lizzie was an unlovely thing and a bone-crusher. She was sneer, naked transportation and little else; a means of (you hoped) getting from here to there. But in her passing came an end of an era and something was lost.

This was the personal touch. The man of 1960, sitting in a smooth, sculptured and tailored chariot, with power to burn at his toe-pit, is relying on forces beyond his control. If something goes haywire, he doesn't dare to right it, but simply whimpers into the phone for his nearest factory-trained mechanic. Matters have gone far beyond his poor powers to help or hinder.

But with the Model T owner it was man-against-beast. When things went

well he rode high in the saddle; there was a rapport between him and his steed. His Lizzie snorted, frisked and galloped; he wore a smile on his face and the sun shone. When a fit of temperament overtook her, he knew it would be "one of those days" and the two fought it out toe-to-toe, hammer-and-tongs. He hammered it, cursed its mulish disposition and nursed it back to health with baling wire and incantations. You can't hardly buy 'em like that anymore.

Our Note: For the uninitiated, Bill Blewett, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Blewett, has a "Tin Lizzie" — and it runs!

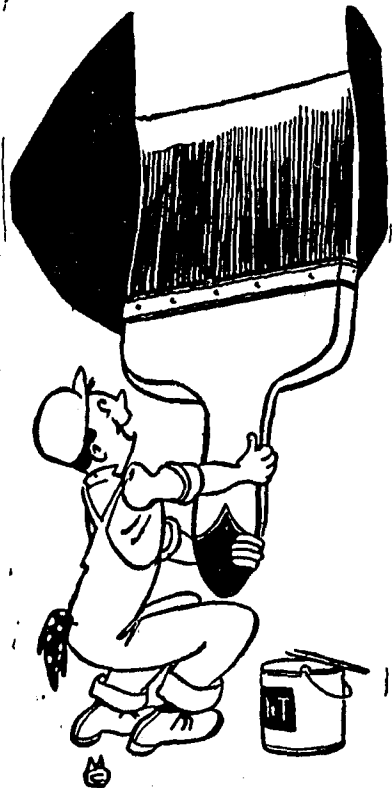

This is part of winter game management work and not to be confused with counting census of game animals.

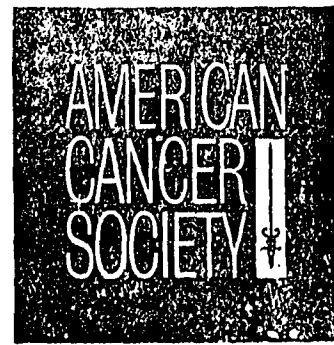
The Cassia deer herd has been under intensive management by the Idaho Fish and Game department since 1941 because it is among the important ones of the state. The first big game census in the area, however, was taken in 1917, when 19 antelope, 745 mule deer and 18 elk were counted. More recently, the unit has been producing at least ten percent of the state's annual total deer harvest.

CATTLEMEN AND COWBELLES MEET

Latah county cattlemen and Cowbellees enjoyed a full program and beef stew at their annual meeting at Deary, Wednesday, March 16th. The Cattlemen took full advantage of their ladies' Cowbelle organization when they did justice to a delicious beef stew deluxe lunch served by the ladies.

This was the first joint meeting of the two groups, as the Cowbellees were organized this past year. Dr. Leon Orme, University of Idaho Meats specialist, brought an interesting message to the group on "Meat Quality." The cattlemen must keep their research program going full force, as other industries develop new products that can compete with beef. There has even been work on using meat-flavored plastics as a meat substitute, which should keep stockmen on their toes producing meat that the housewife will buy and enjoy serving.

Fat on meats was desired in the past, but now the trend is for less fat, but still tender, well-flavored meat cuts. Quality of meat is determined by the desirable, bright cherry-red color, firm, fine texture and a network of fat, interlaced throughout the meat.

G. B. "Slats" Wilson, Lapwal, Past-President of the Idaho State Cattlemen's Association, reminded the group that their association represents the largest dollar agricultural income in Idaho. "We must keep up with our research to survive," Wilson warned the group. We have the tools to prevent many diseases and we must use them, reported Dr. James Bailey, University of Idaho veterinarian.

It does cost money for vaccines, sprays and health examinations, but they will save you money in the long run. Bailey pointed to the new systematic grub control spray as a way cattlemen can make money and improve the product they offer the housewife.

The new spray material "Corral" has been tested and not only controls cattle grubs, but will prevent lice infestation for the winter months. Cattle grubs can cause meat and leather losses amounting to as much as \$8.00 per head. Spraying at a cost of 80c per head will leave the cattlemen a nice profit.

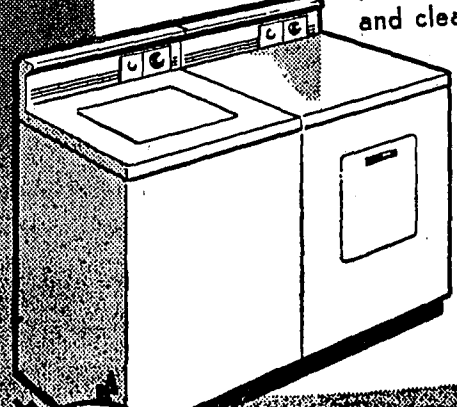

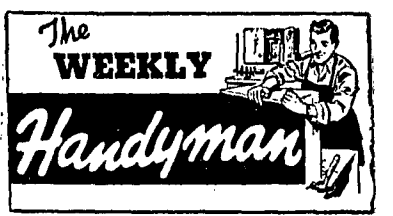

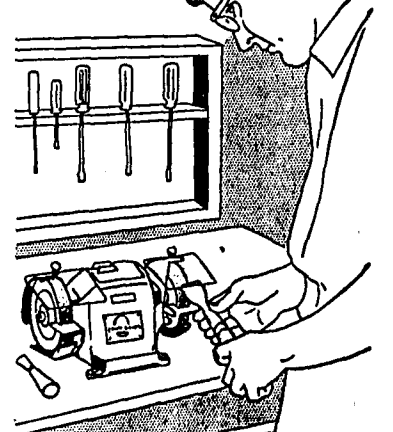

QUESTION: I would like to add an electric grinder to my workshop, but the few I have seen are quite expensive. Can you recommend an inexpensive speed grinder?

ANSWER: There is one on the market today that can be purchased for less than \$20. The price is not the only attractive feature of this bench grinder, either.



A small bench grinder is an asset to any home or farm workshop.

It is so small—only 10 inches long—that it can be attached to your workbench or stored below and never be in the way. Furthermore, it has many of the same features of larger, more expensive models used by maintenance and repair men.

This particular speed grinder is powered by a 1/4-inch motor and has two 4 1/2 by 3/4-inch wheels, fine and coarse grit. Among its features are eye shields, water-cooling tray, and adjustable tool rests.

An electric bench grinder is an asset to any home or farm shop because it can sharpen such tools as chisels, knives, draw-knives, plane blades, axes, drill bits, garden and field tools.

QUESTION: I have noticed that many of the new portable electric drills have spade-grip handles as well as the common pistol-grip. Which one is best for the workshop?

ANSWER: Manufacturers have introduced the spade-grip handle to their home-shop tool line to give the home and farm craftsman a wider range of selection.

Usually it is a case of personal preference, because there is little to choose between the spade-grip (also known as the end grip or saw grip) and pistol-grip handles. Both are designed with ease of handling in mind.

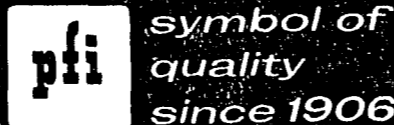

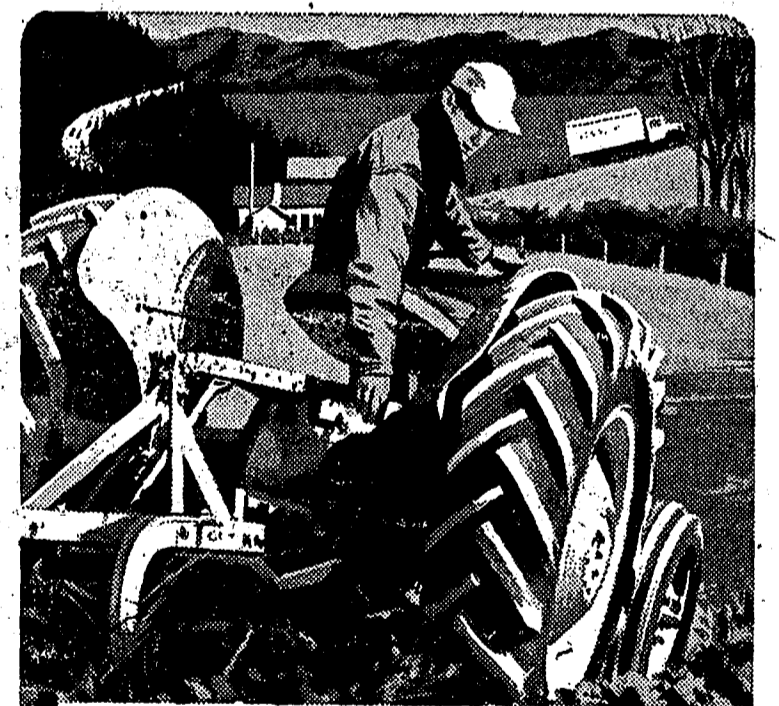
