## School Directors to Seek 5-Mill Levy for Juliaetta Addition

District 283 directors Monday night unanimously approved action to call for an increase on the present 2-mill reserve fund to 5 mills to finance the construction of an addition to the Juliaetta Elementary School.

The Board will call for the election to be held in the first part of May. The date is to be set at a special meeting of the board Friday evening.

"This method will save the taxpayers a considerable amount of money in interest," Superintendent of School Robert Meserve said.

If the increase is approved by the voters, this method of financing will pay for the school in two or three years, and thus eliminate having a sale of bonds, which would require an interest rate for the normal period of 20 years.

"It is a must that action be taken at this time to house the influx of grade school students expected during the 1960-61 school term," Mr. Meserve said.

The plan of the board is to increase the 2 mills to 5 mills just long enough to pay for the addition, then it is to revert back to the original 2 mills. The 5 mills is expected, if approved, to be in force only for two or three years.

### Other Board Action

No decision has been reached on the disposition of the present high school building. That problem is under consideration by the directors, who are trying to determine the most feasible way of doing away with the structure.

### New High School

Supt. of Schools Robert Meserve reported that the finishing touches are being put on the new school building, and that the contractor, Mr. Hollibough, expects to have the job completed by the 1st of May. The only work that will remain after May 1, will be the moving of the fluorescent light fixtures from the old high school to the new building. Also a small amount of painting and cleaning up will remain to be done at that time.

### REMODELING AT EQUIPMENT CO.

A complete remodeling and renovation job, both interior and exterior is underway at the Kendrick Equipment Co., the work being done by John Simpson of Lewiston and M. C. Halliday of Juliaetta.

In the interior the repair shop is now in the throes of remodeling — with large center posts being removed to provide additional repair "stall" room. The parts racks in the rear are to be moved to the front portion of the building, and the wood floor space there is to have the wood removed and concrete poured in its place. Complete motor analyzing equipment is expected to be installed in this portion.

On the exterior, to the north, rough cedar siding has been applied, and this will also be used in a portion of the building's front. The big repair shop door to the north will be reduced in size, with the main entrance to the south.

Interior remodeling and renovation has also begun, but this will move more slowly than that of the repair shop and exterior.

### KENDRICK HIGH SCHOOL NOTES

#### Enrollment

At K. H. S. there are 83 students presently enrolled. Last year there were 113 enrolled at the beginning of the year, the highest in the school's history. The drop of 30 makes up the difference of the highest and lowest enrollments of past years.

These figures place Kendrick as a "Class A" school (with less than 125 enrolled) in athletic competition.

Presently the Junior High has 57 students (seventh and eighth grades) with 35 in the eighth grade. This year's graduating class numbers 18, the difference probably providing for an increase in high school enrollment for the 1960-61 school term.

#### Seven Weeks

There are only seven more weeks of school, except for the seniors, who have only six. There will be no vacations during these last weeks of school. However, there will be such events as Hill Day, concerts, Lewiston Festival, Track meets, Baccalaureate and Commencement.

#### Spring Concert Coming

The music department of K. H. S. is planning for a Spring Concert, which will be held after the Music Festival in Lewiston (April 28, 29 and 30). The concert will, no doubt, be given in mid-May. Mr. Stitzlein is letting the students select the numbers they will present. More news on this will be presented later, as preparations for the Lewiston Festival are keeping everyone busy now.

Children, 1 to 14 years old, single swim, 25c. All others (14 years and older) single swim, 50c.

Season tickets were set at: Children, 1 to 16 years of age, inclusive, \$5.00. All over 16, \$7.00.

An examination of the pool disclosed that the dressing rooms need a new roof, paint, etc. The filter needs renewing, and a considerable portion of pipe in the system needs replacement.

One new pump was installed last year, and that is practically all that is new in the system.

This is the first raise in price since the pool was constructed in 1946 and 1947.

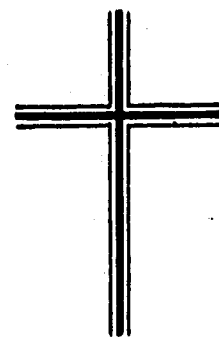

## FARM CHEMICALS

Moscow — Use farm chemicals only on the crops for which they are specifically recommended. That's the first rule for keeping out of trouble with the sprays and dusts, according to Homer Futter, county extension agent.

He suggests five other points: Use only the exact amounts recommended on the label.

Apply chemicals at the times specified, being particularly sure to keep the right interval between treatment and harvest.

Use only recommended methods of application. Guard against drift.

Carefully observe label precautions to protect the person using the chemicals and to prevent harmful residue on food crops.

Store unused sprays and chemicals out of reach of children or animals — preferably under lock and key.

Moscow — A final plea for Idaho residents to send in Easter Seal contributions to finance services for crippled children and adults has been returned with a contribution, said Stahley, who is athletic director of the University of Idaho. "Our Easter Sunday, April 17. "The donation envelopes mailed to 138,000 Idaho homes cannot help our crippled youngsters unless they are returned with a contribution," said Stahley, who is athletic director of the University of Idaho. "Our Easter

Seal campaign is the major source of funds for the worth-while program of patient aid and rehabilitation care which the Idaho Society for Crippled Children and Adults provides for our handicapped children throughout the state."

Surveys have shown that about 18,000 Idaho school children have some speech and hearing difficulties and nearly 4,000 youngsters need orthopedic aid, he said.

The Easter Seal Society will establish a new speech therapy center in Twin Falls, August 1, and future centers are planned at Pocatello and Lewiston to provide help to children throughout Idaho.

Many handicapped children already receive services and special education provided at the Boise Easter Seal Center, Stahley said. This center was opened four years ago with funds raised by Easter Seal drives and contributions.

Donations also make it possible for crippled youngsters to attend Camp Easter Seal on Lake Coeur d'Alene where they take part in specialized programs of crafts, swimming, hiking and out-door education.

Stahley said ninety percent of the funds raised during the current drive will remain in Idaho, with counties retaining one-fourth of the amount they raise for direct aid to local

crippled persons. If Easter Seal donation envelopes have been mislaid, contributions can be mailed directly to the Idaho Society for Crippled Children and Adults, 128 South 5th Street, Boise, Stahley added.

## EASTER SEAL APPEAL MADE

Boise — An appeal for Idahoans to send in their Easter Seal contributions was made today by J. Neil (Skip) Stahley. Sheets of Easter Seals and return envelopes were sent to 138,000 Idaho homes two weeks ago.

Stahley, University of Idaho athletic director and State Easter Seal chairman, pointed out that the Easter season campaign now underway is the only one used by the Idaho Society for Crippled Children and Adults to raise money for special services for the crippled.

Funds donated last year made possible expanded operation of the Easter Seal Center in Boise, bringing speech and hearing therapy and special education to the handicapped. Because of help received some children were able to take their places in regular school classrooms.

Stahley says plans to open additional Easter Seal Centers in Pocatello, Twin Falls and Lewiston could be accelerated through generous contributions during this March 17-April 17 campaign.

On the local level, the Society's trustees in each county have funds available to provide medicines, special shoes and other aids, and pay transportation costs to medical centers for surgery or treatment.

Many of the children aided are victims of cerebral palsy. Others have speech and hearing defects, orthopedic problems or congenital heart disorders.

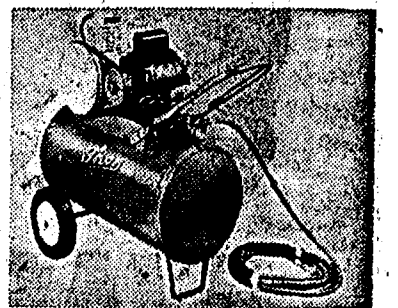

**QUESTION:** Does an air compressor have enough uses on a farm to warrant purchase of one for my farm shop? I know it would be handy for inflating tires but it'd be pretty expensive tire inflation, wouldn't it?

**ANSWER:** There are far more uses for an air compressor than meet the eye! Inflating tires is just a start. Spraying insecticides is a truly important job for air compressors. And consider these uses, just a few of many:



There are numerous uses for air compressors on a farm.

An air compressor will supply power for equipment to clean farm machinery and screen filters; disinfect poultry houses and hog houses; dust gardens, plants, etc.; dry fruits and vegetables; handle rice hulls; lubricate farm machinery; operate forges; paint farm buildings and equipment; pick raw cotton; spray fruit trees and livestock; spray rust preventives; apply white wash; and, of course, power pneumatic hammers, diggers, and other air tools you might add to your shop.

Today you can buy a portable air compressor for about \$130. Use it for such tasks as listed—or others you'll discover as you use such equipment—and it'll soon pay for itself.

**QUESTION:** What can I put on the concrete floor of my workshop so it won't be slippery?

**ANSWER:** Sand paint is the most commonly used for this purpose, but it tends to wear off under great activity. You might be interested in a new non-slip mineral-coated fabric that is said to be resistant to oil, grease and water and eliminates "danger spots."

This fabric is available in 6 x 24, 3 1/2 x 7 1/2, and 5 1/2 x 5 1/2 sizes and is installed somewhat like floor tile. It is primarily recommended for stairs and industrial uses but could be used on a workshop floor.

## GAME LICENSES ON DECREASE

Boise — During the past ten years,

it is surprising that even one class of license should have sold less last year than it did way back in 1950. It's true — but what a spread, what a difference a decade makes in all of the others! The 1950 sale of resident combination fish and game licenses reached 117,051. Last year the sales figure for the same item was 108,325, a difference of 8,726. But the others, including resident game licenses, resident fish, non-resident game, non-resident birds and non-resident fish show a total increase of 47,940, the difference between aggregate sales in 1950 and those for 1959.

During the decade, deer tags jumped from 89,173 to 123,335; the elk tags soared from 33,855 to 56,381.

## U. OF I. DEVELOPS PLACEMENT PLAN

U. of I., Moscow — "Looking to the development of students to their full capacities, the University of Idaho has adopted an advanced placement program," President D. R. Theophilus said this week. "Students may earn university credit for certain basic courses without taking them in college, providing they successfully pass examinations indicating they already have the knowledge."

The University of Idaho program is similar to that recently established at Harvard and Columbia universities, and other leading institutions of higher learning.

Under this system, which I consider one of the most important advances in American education, it is possible for a student to complete a four-year college program in three years," Theophilus pointed out. "But, more important, students have new opportunities or challenges to tax their abilities to the maximum, which is vital to American progress."

The president added that it has been found that relatively few students in institutions with the advanced placement program plan to finish college in fewer than four years. Students who have earned college credits via the special examination route have enriched rather than accelerated their educational programs by taking more advanced work. Too, many of the students in the advanced placement program have become so interested that they are looking toward higher degrees.

Under the program, a student can actually earn college credit while still in high school. For instance, a high school student who has had more than an average amount of mathematics and has done superior work in the field, can take an examination in mathematics and if successful, he will not only eliminate the need for taking basic mathematics at the university, but with the approval of the department, may receive university credit in the subject. Examinations are also given in history, languages, biology, chemistry and physics.

Examinations will be given in participating high schools this spring during the week of May 16-20. They will also be given to students on the University of Idaho campus. Under the University of Idaho program, recommended by the faculty and approved by the regents, up to a total of 32 credits or one-fourth of the total necessary for graduation, may be earned by a combination of advanced standing, correspondence and extension instruction.

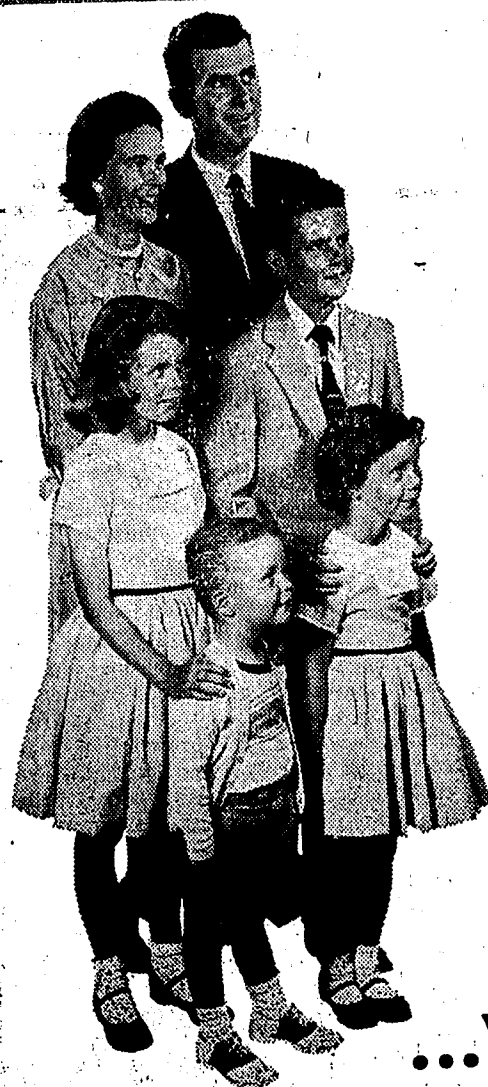

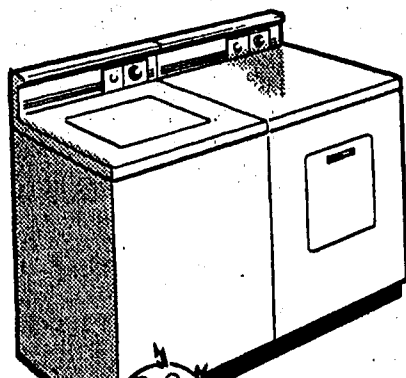

**IDAHO CAN AND WILL GROW**

Boise — A steady but unspectacular population rise is forecast for Idaho during the 1960's, in a report released this week by the State Department of Commerce and Development.

The report estimates that Idaho's population, currently about 689,000, will increase to 797,000 by 1970. The state's 1950 population was 588,637.

James Anderson, in charge of research for the Department, says the state will have to be content with an unspectacular population growth as long as young people leave the state to find jobs elsewhere. "If Idaho's population increase is to include the sons and daughters of her citizens, we must provide a variety of jobs for their employment through an active industrial development program," he says.

The report makes these points: Mechanization on the farm has resulted in less agricultural jobs. If young men cannot find jobs in manufacturing and industry in Idaho, they'll leave the state to get good jobs. As Anderson points out, however, industrial development programs being carried out now by the local and state groups will gradually provide a wide base of employment for the state's young people.

The report also notes that nearly 55 percent of the people in Idaho live on a farm. Twenty years ago a little more than 60 percent of the state's population lived on farms. In 1920 the percentage of farm dwellers was almost 71.

In spite of the fact that more than half of Idaho's people live on farms, more than a third of the state's population lives in cities with populations of 10,000 or more, the report states. In 1920 only 8.5 percent of Idaho's population lived in cities of that size.

Four counties in the state registered population growths of close to 10,000 since 1950. They are Ada, Bannock, Bonneville and Canyon.

**PULLETS BETTER**

Moscow — A flock of pullets is more profitable than a flock of hens that have gone through the first molt. In the first place, says Homer Futter, county extension agent, pullets will lay from 20 to 40 percent more eggs than hens in their second year. Pullets will normally lay for 14 to 16 months before they begin to molt. It takes about 12 weeks for a layer to go through molt. During that time the bird uses high protein feed to grow new feathers rather than lay eggs.

Pullets take less feed to produce a dozen eggs. Bob Black, poultryman of the University of Idaho extension service, says this is because they lay at a higher rate and because, the birds themselves are smaller. They need less feed.

Pullets also lay eggs of higher interior quality. Their eggs contain a high percent of thick white. This is important in determining egg I. Q.

Pullet eggs have stronger shells. As the production period increases the shell strength and interior quality go down.

Black says a pullet can be fed up to laying age with about the same amount of feed it takes a hen to carry through a molt. The amount is about 20 pounds in either case.

**RECREATION AREA**

Boise — Accolades from both the Fish and Game Commission and the department go this week to Gov. Robert E. Smylie and Public Lands Commissioner John G. Walters. Acting as chairman and commissioner of the State Lands Board, the two officials expedited the leasing of 38 acres, more or less, about 16 miles east of St. Maries, to the Fish and Game Department for only \$27.02.

The property will be developed as public access to the St. Joe river, and for recreational purposes.

This is not the only land acquired recently for public access to fishing, boating and hunting areas, and for recreational purposes. During the 1958-1959 fiscal year, the department acquired five other sites or access routes, comprising a little over 721 acres, at a total cost of \$45,976.

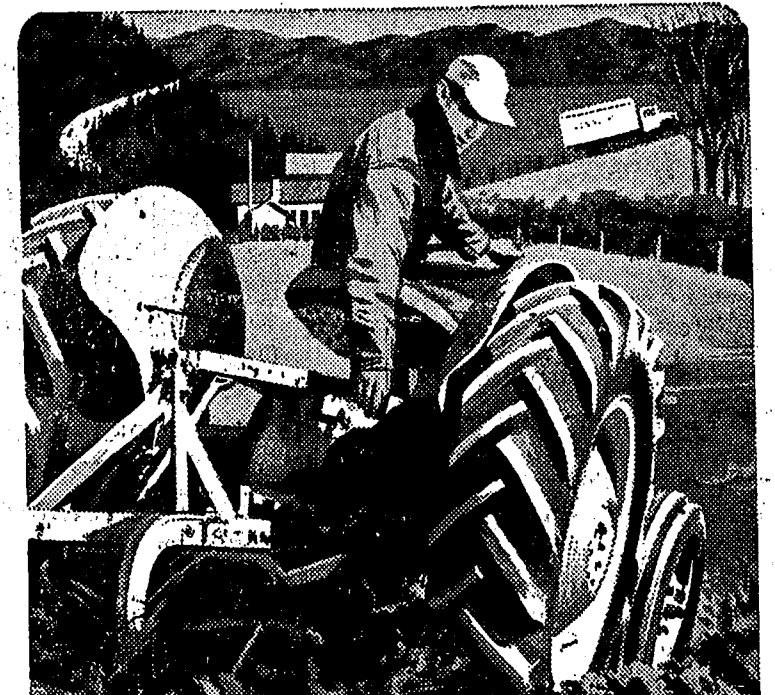
