

SUNDAY NIGHT FIRE GUTS CORNER APARTMENT IN KENDRICK HOTEL

Fire of undetermined origin, swept through a first-story apartment at the Kendrick Hotel Sunday night, destroying most of the belongings of Ernest and Donald Jones, its occupants.

The fire broke out at approximately 10:20, and moments later flames were licking up the front of the one-story portion of the brick building.

Donald Jones, alone in the apartment, had gone to bed, but smelled smoke, arose and escaped before the full force of the blaze was felt. His father, E. H. Jones, was visiting in Lewiston at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Wade T. Keene.

Kendrick Volunteer Firemen were on the job within only moments after the alarm was sounded, and the fire was under control within three minutes.

Occupants of the hotel were ushered from the building, although there was no apparent danger to the rest of the building, as it is separated from the damaged apartment by a complete brick fire wall. The blaze was contained in the front of the corner apartment.

Quick action on the part of the firemen kept the flames away from the apartment's kitchen, although some water damage occurred. Clothing of the two men was also damaged by smoke and water, and a few items lost. All furniture in the two rooms other than the kitchen was a total loss.

The Kendrick Volunteer Firemen are to be highly commended for their quick action and the expert job of putting out the fire. Mrs. Allie Jones, owner of the hotel said. Mrs. Jones also added that the insurance investigators have been on the scene and work is expected to start immediately on the rebuilding of the apartment. Mr. Jones carried no insurance.

Ernest and Donald Jones have moved to the Bernard and Ray Jones home on Big Bear ridge, and their plans are not known at this time.

SAFETY PAYS IN FARMING

U. of I., Moscow — The secret of a successful operation is to do the right thing at the right time. And from the safety standpoint, the county agent says, it is also true that it should be done the right way.

Hurry causes accidents. For example, a farmer was too busy with other things to repair a ladder to the hay mow. He stepped over the broken rung every day but didn't take time to fix it. The hired man stepped on the broken rung and fell. He broke a leg and was laid up all during spring work. Thus a small oversight threw the farm out of gear for months. The farmer was so far behind he had to keep hurrying. He was injured in a tractor accident because he was in such a rush, and was incapacitated for two weeks himself.

"There are hidden costs in accidents," says the county agent. "They involve not only the medical bills but time lost and human suffering. They are directly responsible for reduced yields, lower livestock production, and a decrease in farm production."

"Statistics show accidents can cut gross farm income by 40 percent."

to a report received this week by Ruth J. Shane, county home extension agent.

Instant mixes and drinks made large gains, the report showed. One cup of coffee in every three is now made from instant coffee.

Many of the new food products are fairly recent. One-third of the prepared foods were not on the market ten years ago. The typical supermarket devotes 80 feet of space to frozen foods and offers wide variety, including about 50 kinds of baby food. Since World War II, sales of prepared baby food have gone up 280 percent. They are now a billion-dollar-plus industry.

The new foods include about 100 mixes for cakes, cookies and biscuits.

Although the value of frozen foods has soared more than 2,700 percent, to \$2.7 billion, canned foods are still the most widely known and used items.

SPRAYING FOR WEED CONTROL

To control weeds in grain, spray with 2,4-D when the crop is through tillering and before it begins to boot. That's the suggestion of Homer Futter, county agent, based on recommendations of Robert Higgins, agronomist of the University of Idaho extension service.

One pound of 2,4-D per acre will take care of annual broadleaf weeds. The extension service recommends two pounds for perennial noxious weeds.

Here are some other suggestions on the use of 2,4-D:

Spray alfalfa two weeks before it is plowed when commercial potatoes or beans are to be the next crop. This eliminates the alfalfa root problem in these crops. Do not spray dairy pastures when they are

being grazed. Keep stock out of pastures for at least two weeks after spraying.

Do not spray grain fields immediately before harvest.

Dalapon is one of the few weed killers for which residue tolerances have been established. It used at pre-emergence, it can control quackgrass in commercial potatoes. Use it according to recommendations on the label.

There is no clearance for trichlorobenzene acids on any crop land.

POPULATION GIVEN

Lewiston, Idaho — A preliminary announcement of the population of Juliaetta, taken as of April 1, 1960, shows 363. This figure is believed to be substantially correct, but it is subject to revision after the returns for non-residents are credited to their proper locality, and other routine checks have been made.

Our note: If we recall correctly the unofficial census of 1956 gave Juliaetta 425. It, like Kendrick, is less than anticipated.

The Club held a talk by Milt Williams of the Idaho Fish and Game Department on "Hunter Safety," and following this voted to sponsor a "Hunter Safety" course, in cooperation with the school, next September. In this course, which takes five study hours, Mr. Williams will present the class room instruction, and assist the Lions in the actual gun handling portion, and target practice, this latter taking two study hours.

RAIN, MORE RAIN IS WEATHER FARE

There seems little doubt but what this spring is one of the wettest on record, and weather the past few days has certainly kept the record up.

Following a rather chill, damp mid-week program, a "sticky-muggy Wednesday" and another chill day Thursday, rain began falling on Friday, continuing almost all day and up until the early hours Saturday. During this period Reinhard Wilken of Leland reported that his rain gauge showed .75 of an inch! A real soaker — and moisture we didn't need.

Saturday was another chill day, and about 1:15 a brief hail storm arrived, dropping stones as big as peas, and staying with it until the ground was white. However, a half hour later, all signs of the storm had vanished.



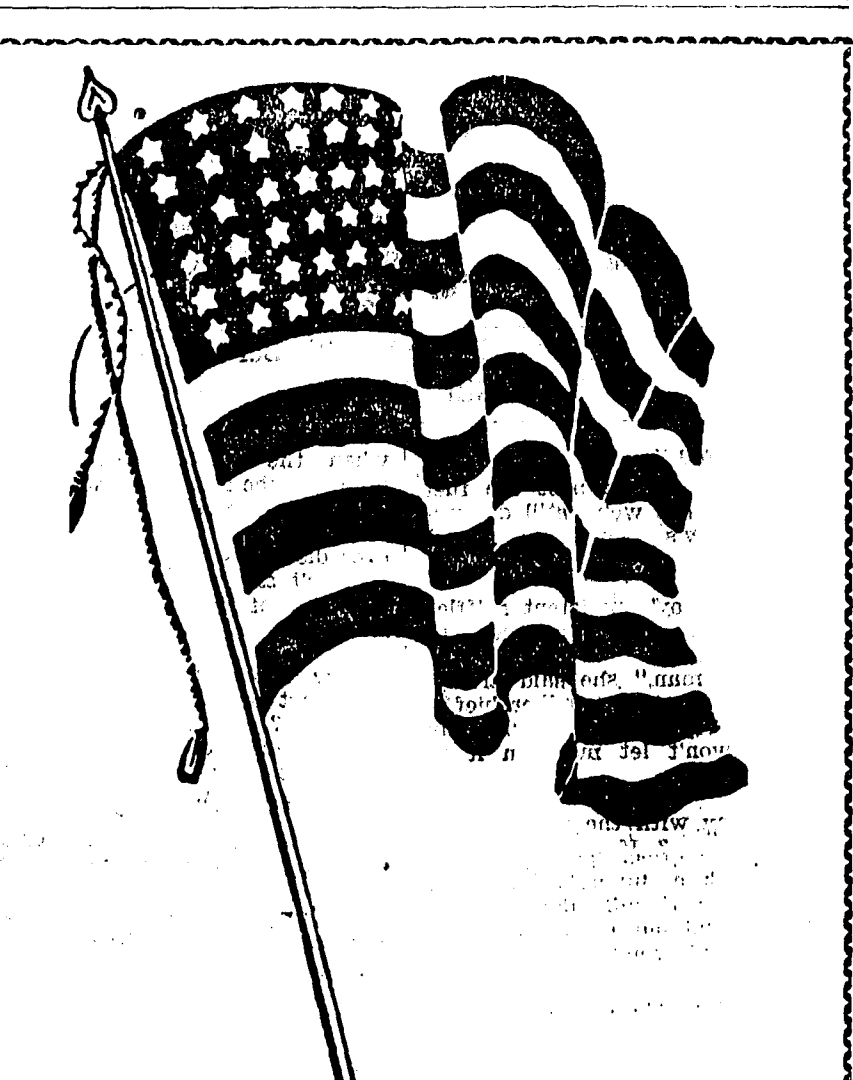
