

CHELAN COUNTY HOMEMAKERS CITE MRS. MARVIN LONG

Chelan County Homemakers' Council paid tribute last Tuesday to the county's first home demonstration agent, Mrs. Marvin Long (Martha Lowery) of Kendrick, as part of its 30th anniversary observance at the Masonic Temple in Wenatchee, Wash.

Mrs. Long reminisced about the work there in the early 1930's when the depression was at its worst. These years offered a real challenge to a home agent, as well as to the homemakers themselves, she said. She was greeted by many friends and co-workers of 30 years ago, who are still active council members.

Art Chase, Ephrata, county agent there 30 years ago, was also cited. Chase told of his efforts, aided by a group of farm women, to obtain a home demonstration agent to assist with 4-H work, then in its infancy, and to bring the rural homemakers the latest ideas in good living on a limited budget; information welcomed by farm families then struggling to keep their farms in the face of mounting debts. It was largely through the efforts of Chase that the first home agent was obtained for Chelan County.

It was in April, 1930, that a meeting was called to organize the homemakers to enable them to derive the utmost benefit from the services of Miss Lowery, first home demonstration agent in the county. Members came from various local clubs throughout the county.

Among the new council's many activities was a yard improvement contest. This elicited much interest and when tours were organized under the leadership of Miss Lowery, caravans of cars visited the winning yards over the county.

Spurred by the contest and aid from the new home agent, home repairs, long neglected during depression days, were undertaken by the women. Screen doors and windows were repaired, kitchens were improved by discarding useless equipment, rearranging cupboards, constructing knife racks and putting rollers on the kitchen woodbox.

The women painted their homes inside and out. They refinished floors, raised vegetable gardens, entered pillow making contests and contests featuring clothing made from feed sacks. Farm women found that an entire outfit could be made for as little as \$1.50. They took new interest in life in spite of money shortages.

Miss Lowery held a class in farm accounting to enable the women to make the best use of what money was available. She even held demonstrations of dyeing hose so that two stockings of different colors could be matched and save the price of a new pair.

Those were truly depression days. As better times returned to the valley, projects changed to meet the changing needs of the rural woman. Recreational leaders were trained in each member club. Clinics for cleaning and sewing were held, food preservation studied, dressmaking and clothing alterations taught. The list of subjects is almost innumerable, and continues to grow as needs of women change. Over the years a succession of fine home agents have done much to make the lot of Chelan County Homemakers pleasant.

Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Wright of Lewiston were presented a gift for being the oldest couple present who had been married at Southwick.

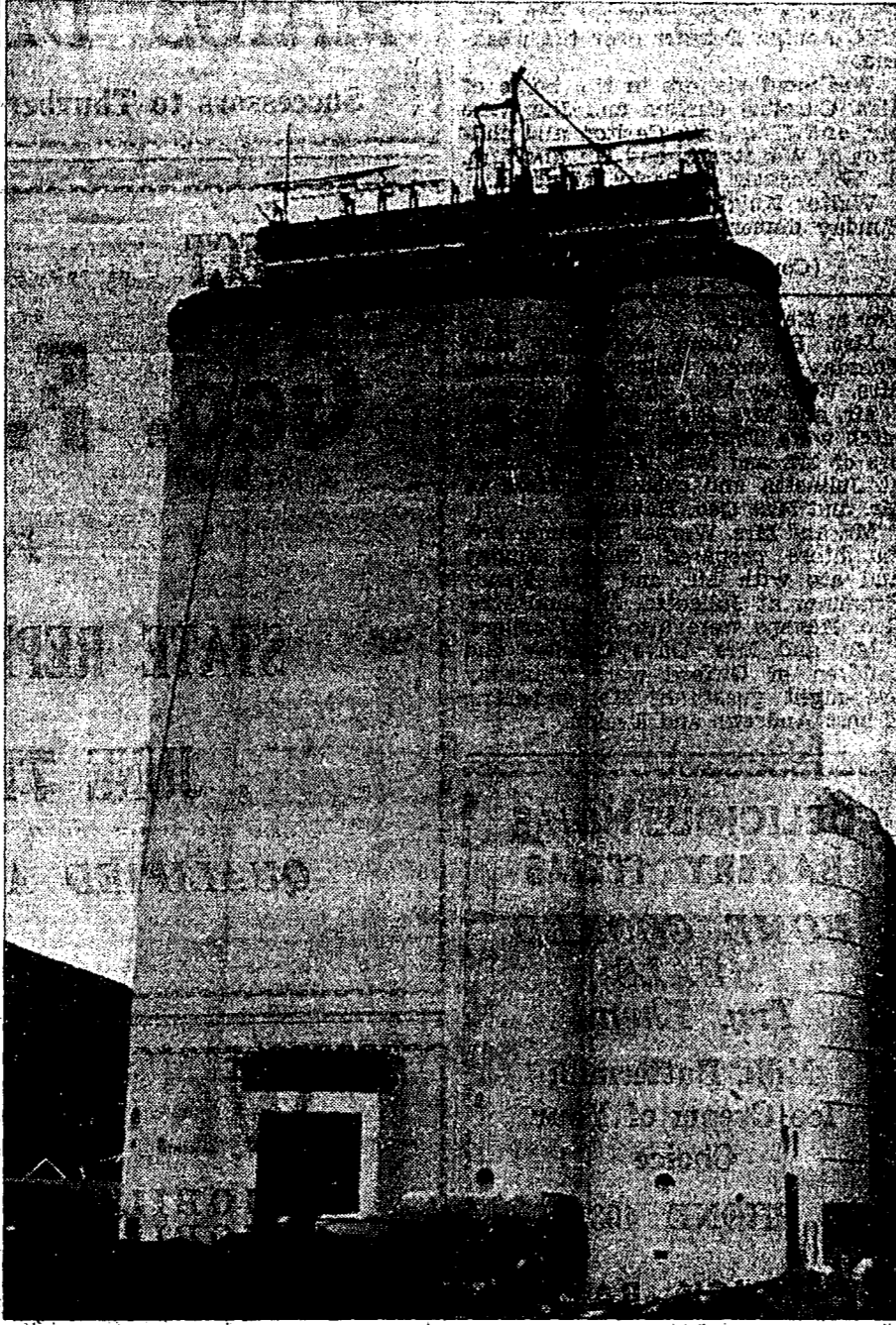

Truly it was a very enjoyable day of reminiscing over "yester years" and the present as well as speculating on the weather proved most cooperative for it was an ideal day.

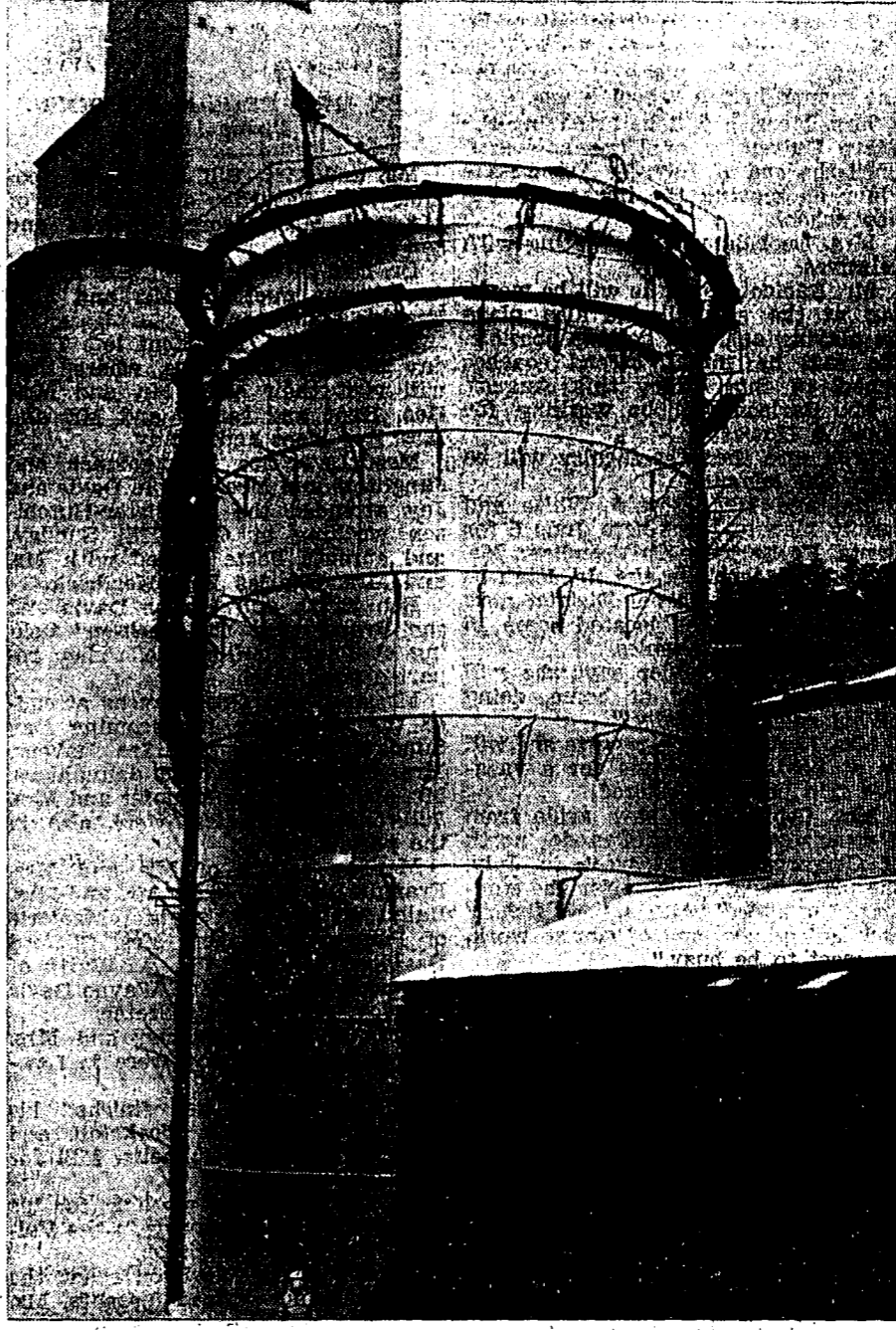
"Southwick Day" is sponsored by the members of the Southwick Homemakers Club.

NANCY CLEAR DIES IN ACCIDENT NEAR JULIAETTA

Nancy Clear, eight-year-old Clarkston girl, was fatally injured Tuesday morning at 9:15 near Juliaetta, when she fell from a tractor and was crushed beneath its right wheel and those of a four-wheel hay trailer behind it. The accident occurred one mile southwest of Juliaetta on State Highway 42.

State Police Sgt. Kenneth DeYoung said the girl's uncle, Leland Marvin, Juliaetta dairyman, was driving the tractor and hay trailer to a nearby field to chop hay.

Marvin's two children also were riding on the tractor when the accident occurred. Marvin, suffering from shock, was placed under sedation at the St. Joseph's Hospital.

Nancy, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Garold Clear, Clarkston, was pronounced dead when she arrived at the hospital at 10:10 a. m. A Lewiston ambulance met Marvin and the girl, traveling by car, at Hatwai, and brought them the rest of the way to Lewiston.

Relatives said the girl had been visiting in the Marvin home for the past few days.

In addition to her parents, she is survived by two brothers, Steven, 4, and Byron, 3, and a sister, Jane, 15 months, at the family home; her paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Delbert Clear; maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Marvin, and a paternal great-grandfather, the Rev. George Benjamin, a retired minister, at Clarkston. — Lewiston Tribune.

A 9-year-old Juliaetta boy was in serious condition Friday night at a Spokane hospital after suffering a heart malfunction at St. Joseph's Hospital, Lewiston.

The youth, Ricky Shepherd, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harvie Shepherd, was taken by ambulance Thursday morning to Deaconess Hospital. The boy made the trip in the oxygen tent he had been in at the hospital. Accompanying him in the ambulance were his father and Mrs. Matt Kovanen, a registered nurse at St. Joseph's. She returned with the ambulance.

His mother was driven to Spokane by her brother-in-law, Wayne Shepherd, 1126 Cedar Ave., after the ambulance left. Shepherd, who returned to Lewiston that night, said there appeared to be no change in the boy's condition.

A machine that will send electric impulses to the heart if it stops beating was connected to Ricky's heart, his uncle said. The specialist treating the boy said he was the youngest patient of this type of condition he had heard of, Shepherd said. The youngster, who has a chronic heart ailment, entered St. Joseph's Thursday after an attack.

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THREE WAREHOUSES BEING ERRECTED, TWO NEAR FINISH

Kendrick's grain and seed storage will be increased by nearly 800,000 bushels by the time harvest rolls around this fall.

The Lewiston Grain Growers, Inc., is erecting a new 500,000 bushel concrete warehouse just to the west of the old main warehouse building. The new structure is expected to be completed by the 15th of July. It towers above all other structures in town at a height of 135 feet.

The second warehouse to be started in town is a new 43,800 bushel steel storage bin, being built by the Kendrick Rochdale Co., Inc. Erection began on this the first part of May, and is expected to be completed by the end of this week.

Another warehouse, to be used for the storage of seed and lentils, is being built by George F. Brooks & Sons, Inc. It is a "crib" structure and will have a capacity of 50,000 bushels when completed. A picture of this new structure will appear in next week's issue.

TRANQUILIZERS NO AID IN BEEF SHIPPING

Experiments with tranquilizers on steers shipped to market indicate they do not reduce the loss of weight. Wade Wells and Morris Hemstrom, livestock specialists of the University of Idaho extension service, said the conclusion is based on tests in several states.

In one trial designated to check on shipping shrinkage, they said,

168 yearlings were used. Tranquilizers were injected at different rates about 20 hours before loading. Weight gains 14 days after shipping were not much different than they were for the un-tranquilized steers. One lot of untreated steers averaged 6 pounds heavier than the tranquilized animals.

Other conditions could have influenced the results, the specialists said. Previous treatment of cattle, environment, and even breed — Angus compared with Hereford — could have shown different results.

"Tranquilizers have their greatest potential value," the livestock men said, "as a therapeutic agent to reduce stress. Some diseases, like shipping fever, are aggravated by undue stress. At weaning time, calves are under shock and are often subjected to other extreme stresses such as dehorning. The possibilities of using tranquilizers under these conditions should be explored in co-operative experiments under practical ranch conditions."

CROP ROTATION BEST CURE OF CROWN ROT

Crop rotation helps whip crown rot of legumes, according to Harry Fenwick, plant pathologist of the University of Idaho extension service. Several instances of sclerotinia disease, particularly in northern Idaho, have been reported this spring.

Symptoms are a soft, slimy rot of the crown and base of the stems, and wilting of the plant. Examination often reveals a white, cottony growth. During spells of wet weather the fungus spreads to healthy plants. These compact masses of fungus threads are called "sclerotia." They keep the fungus alive, but dormant in the soil through the summer.

Control is difficult, Fenwick said. However, he recommended measure to reduce the infestation. Practice crop rotation, he suggested that crop rotation, and keep legumes from following in succession.

That is, do not follow peas or lentils with clover because the fungus survives as well on dead plants as living legumes.

Deep plow badly infested fields. Reduce applications of nitrogen, particularly early in the spring.

In grass-clover pasture mixtures, a late fall or winter application of PCNB at the rate of 12 to 15 pounds of active chemical gives satisfactory control. The crown rot has been observed in Idaho on most varieties of clover and some alfalfa. White Dutch clover seems to be most susceptible.

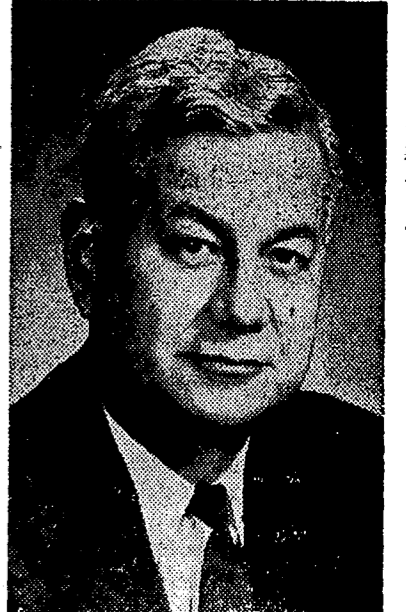

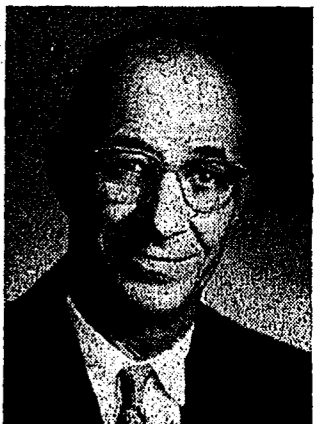



4TH GRADE WINS TOP HONORS IN TRACK MEET

The fourth grade students collected a total of 614 points to win the first handicap track meet held in this area. The sixth grade was close behind with a grand total of 594 points. Third in line was the third grade with 318 points. The fifth grade was next in line with 314 points followed by the second grade which had 289 points, and the first grade scored a handsome 202 points. The meet was held at the Juliaetta Elementary School on Friday morning, May 20, and Monday afternoon, May 23. The rainy weather prevented the completion on Friday. In preparing the standards for determining the handicap, each student was given a chance to participate in each event prior to the day of the meet. The scores were then added for each room and divided by the number of entries in each event for each room, thus finding an average distance or time for the separate events. On the day of the meet anyone who felt he could surpass the class average for any given event was allowed to enter that event. The sixth graders were divided into two groups, one being the 4th, 5th and 6th grade students, while the junior division was made up of the 1st, 2nd and 3rd grades. Points were scored on the following basis: High Jump - 1 point for each 1/2 inch above the class average. Standing and running broad jump - 1 point for each inch above the class average. Ball throw - 1 point for each foot or major part thereof above the class average. Chinning - 3 points for each time above the class average. Races (3 legged - 50 yd. dash, sack race) - 10 points for 1st place, 8 pts for 2nd place, 7 pts for 3rd and 4 points for fourth. Relay Races (boys vs. girls - all school) - 15 points to each member of the winning team and 7 points to each member of the losing team. The officials were our teachers. We sincerely appreciate the presence of the parents who weathered the rainy day Friday to cheer their children to victory. It is felt by the faculty of the Juliaetta Elementary School that our track meet was a great success in that all students participated, all displayed outstanding sportsmanship, and each student cooperated to the fullest to make this meet possible. 
