RECEIVES U. OF I. SCHOLARSHIP

Gerald White, former principal of the Juliaetta Elementary School, received word Monday morning that he had been accepted for a scholarship to the Summer Guidance Institute at the University of Idaho. The program is under the National Defense Education Act of 1958.

Gerald will enroll at the University Summer School program where he will take three regular summer school guidance courses and some clinical work. His school will run from June 13 to August 5.

He was among 18 chosen for the school at the University of Idaho, who were in turn chosen from a large number of applicants.

Following his schooling at Idaho he will leave for California where he will be employed in an elementary school system as math and guidance instructor.

VOTE AGAIN SLATED ON SCHOOL ADD.

District 283 directors announced last week that they had received enough petitions to warrant another special levy election to provide funds to build an addition to the Juliaetta Elementary School.

The first vote, held last month, was defeated in Kendrick and Southwick, but passed in Juliaetta.

This second election will be held on Friday, June 24. The levy sought would be three additional mills added to the present two mills now in effect, and would run for two years, at which time it would revert to the original two mills.

Directors feel that the new addition is a necessity at Juliaetta, as they are faced with the problem of what to do with 40-plus first graders this fall. At the present time the class rooms are full, and it is not known where the over-flow will be housed should the new room not be added at Juliaetta.

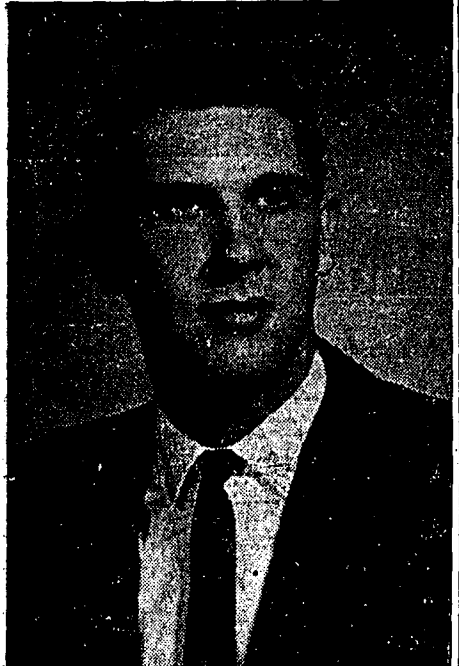
He leaves to mourn their loss his wife, at the family home in Spokane; ten children and numerous grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

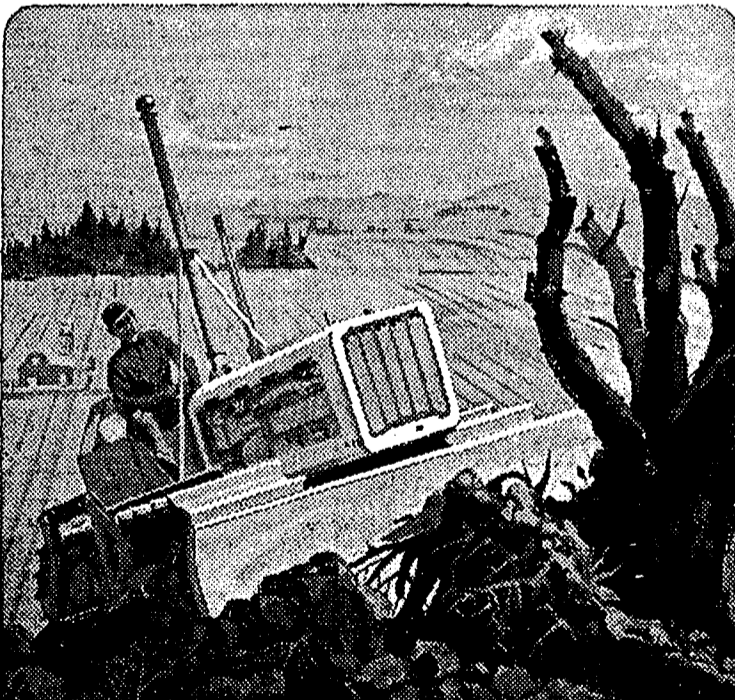

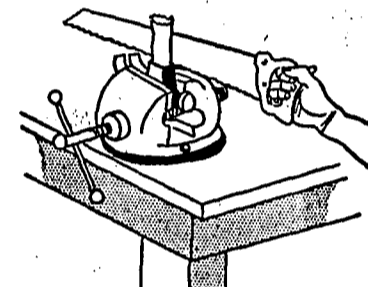

A good hammer that "feels right" in your hand has a way of becoming almost a friend because of the long and worthy service it gives. More than one handyman has felt something akin to personal hurt when the handle on a trusted hammer broke.

You can fashion a new handle, but it's easier and perhaps better to buy one that suits your grip and fits the hammer head. Before you can put the new handle in, however, you must remove the remaining part of the old one from the "eye" or socket of the hammer.



Fashion a new handle for your old hammer head.

An easy way to do this is to mount the tool in a vise, saw the handle off close to the head and use an electric hand drill with a metal twist bit to rout the wood out of the eye. This will remove most of the wood; the rest can be punched out.

Shape the new handle with a rasp and drive it into place in the socket by striking the butt end on a solid surface. Drive in metal wedges to tighten.

Q—"How can I fill small scratches in unfinished trim and paneling so they won't show?"

A.—Fill the scratches with glue. Sand over them while the glue is still wet. The dust will settle in the scratches and stick to the glue. Because this sand dust is the same material as the surface around the damaged spot, the scratch should be practically invisible.

Q—"The hinges on my storm doors have pulled out a couple of times. I've put them back by using larger, longer screws. Now they've come out again. Should I use a wood filler and new screws?"

A.—At this point you'd do better to drill holes larger than those that now exist. Glue in tightly fitting dowel rods. Drill new holes in these for your hinge screws.

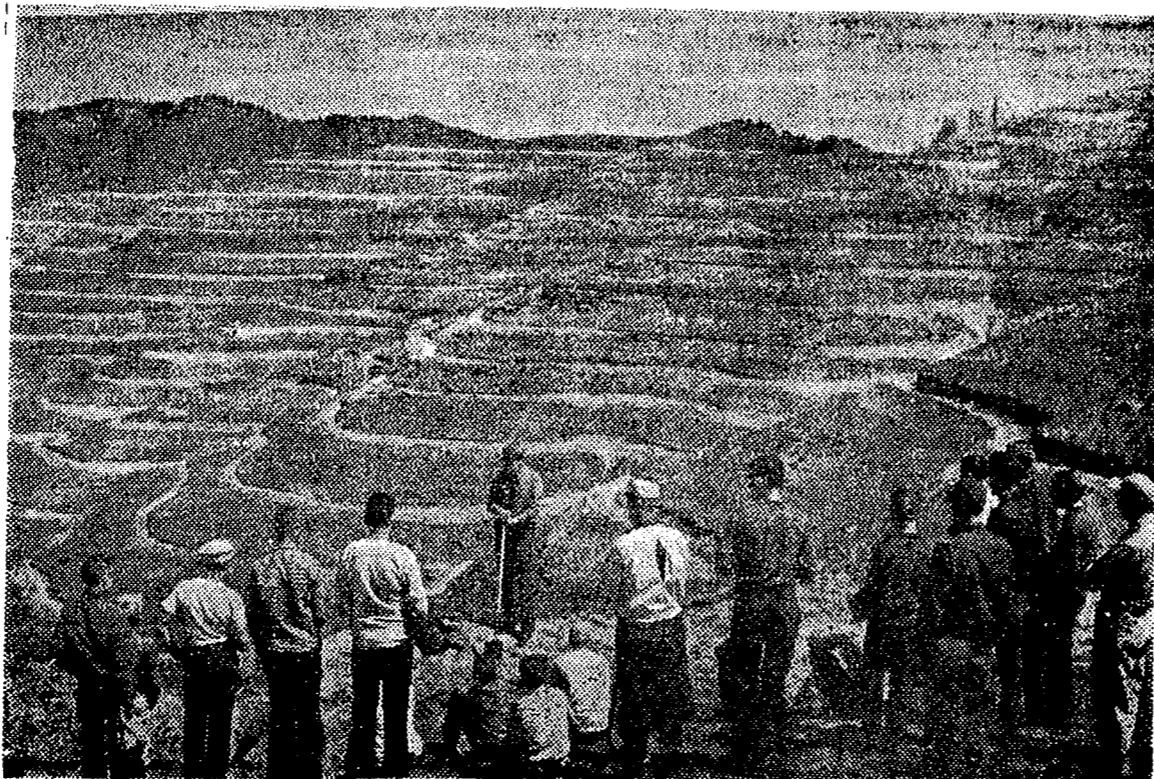

Following the disastrous range-land fire and subsequent devastating inundation of water, mud and rock upon Boise late last summer, long-range plans to revegetate the 10,000 acres and prevent a recurrence were developed. The planting of 1,800 ponderosa pine trees last month by about 50 persons is a part of the project.

Visible in background are contour trenches, partitioned by check dams at intervals of 20 to 30 feet, which are expected to control water runoff on Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management properties. The Department of Fish and Game provided several hundred pounds of bitertubush seed to both agencies, and this has been planted along with perennial grasses.

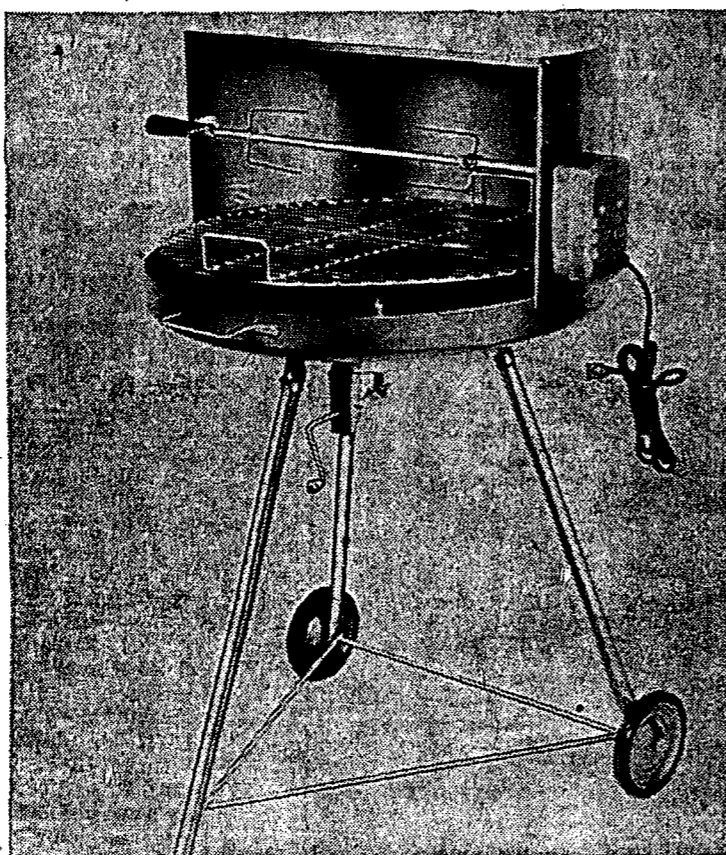

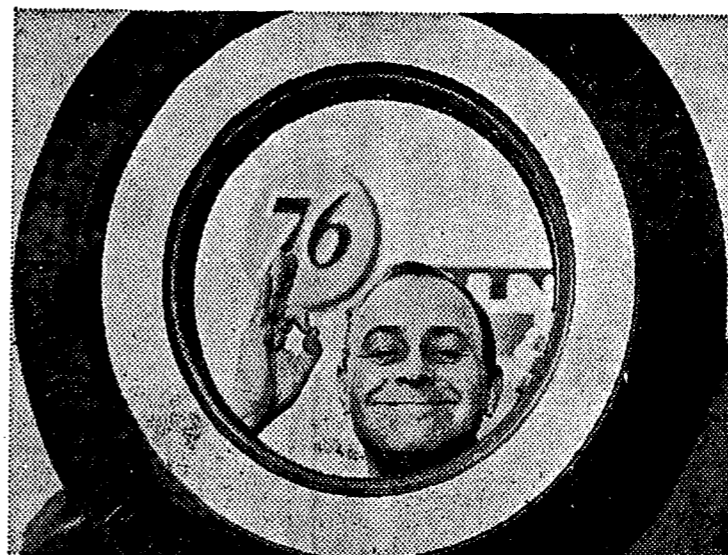

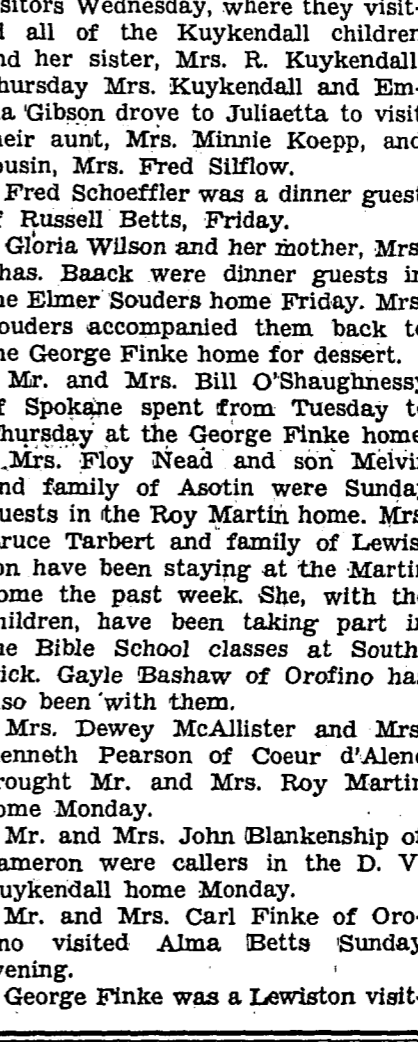

The best way to get rid of dandelions in a lawn is to spray them with 2-4-D. No chemical that has come along in recent years is more effective or practical than the old material, according to Homer Futter, county agricultural agent.
Spray on a warm, still day, he suggests. Results are most complete if temperature is 70 to 80 degrees. On warmer days the chemical moves rapidly down to the roots and kills the weed. It takes about two weeks to destroy the plant.
The advice the county agent has from Robert Higgins, University of Idaho extension agronomist, recommends the amine form of 2-4-D at the rate of two tablespoons in a gallon of water for 1,000 square feet of lawn. Small doses of the chemical will not injure the grass, but may do damage to ornamentals. If spray drifts, it can be troublesome. That's the reason for using it on a quiet day.
Put on enough spray to wet the dandelion leaves. Addition of a stickerspread makes the spray more uniform and effective.

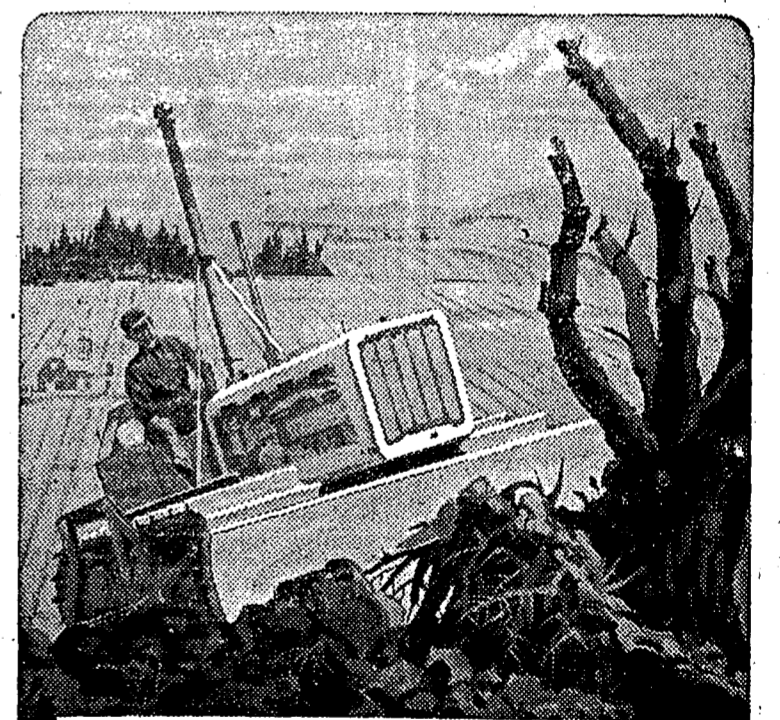
