Voters in Joint School District No. 283 will again go to the polls this week - Friday, June 24, in a special Please remember to come out and levy election to raise funds to build

The proposal is to raise the necessary funds through the addition of Several mothers used their time to three mills to the present two-mill

Through the extra three mills, directors expect to pay for the \$10,000 to \$14,000 one-room addition within the prescribed three-year time limit. At the end of three years, the fivemill levy would revert to the present two-mill operation fund level.

The new (proposed) room is to house the overflow of first graders expected to be in school at Juliaetta this fall. Thirty-eight first graders are expected at this time, and it is proposed to split the grade into two classes. With the split of classes, the district is short one classroom at the elementary school.

A previous vote within the district was defeated last month. Juliaetta approved the structure, but Kenrick and Southwick turned it down. The

Wesley, who is employed by Gordon Peters, was on his way home, and struck loose gravel on the corner. He was uninjured, but the car was extensively damaged.







> More motorists were involved in more accidents during May than there were in April and a larger number of people were injured on Idaho highways and streets, but all three tabulations showed a decline from May, 1959, according to the traffic safety division.

Last month, 2,202 drivers were injured 462 people. In April there were 1.959 accident-involved drivers, 1,186 reported accidents and 329 personal injuries. A year ago the May report showed 2,544 drivers, 1,367 wrecks and 465 injured persons. There were 22 fatalities in May, 1960, and 10 during the same month last year.
