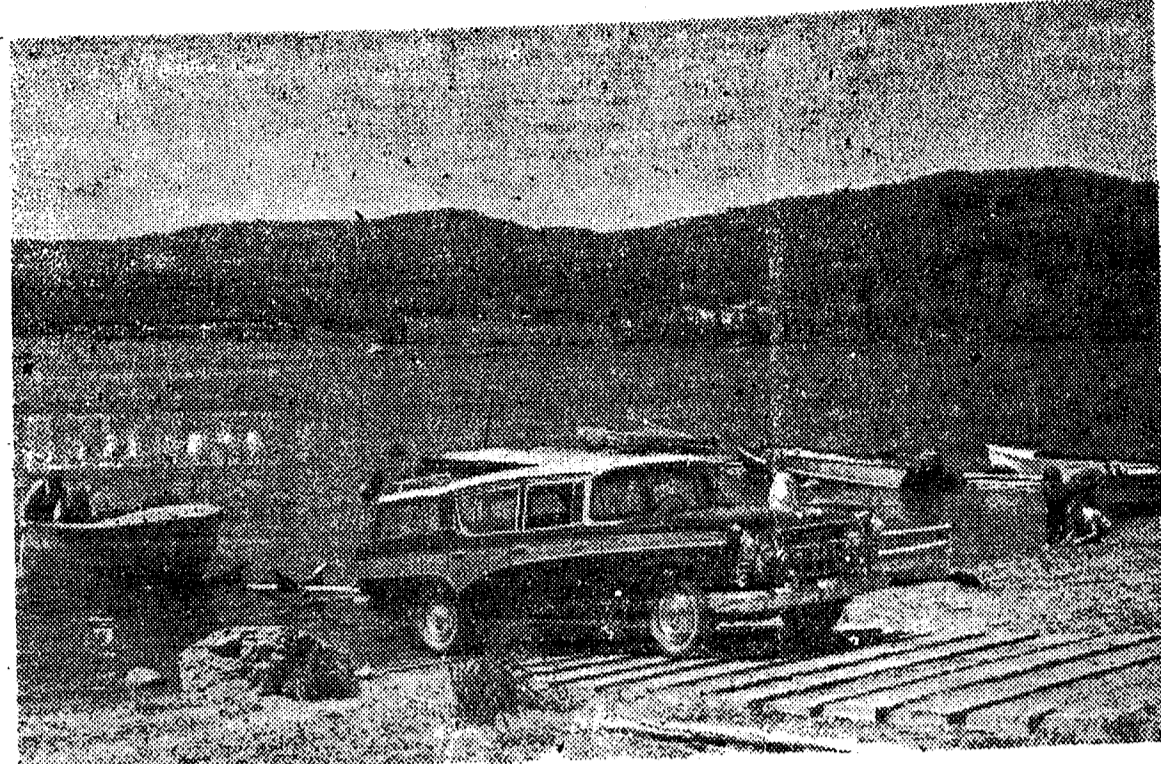

**EGG PRICES SLATED FOR UP TREND**

Predicted egg prices for next fall are putting smiles on the faces of Idaho poultrymen. Indications are for higher returns from the busy flocks. Reason for the expected price raise,

Small producers find it hard to make a profit because of the high investment necessary."  
 The upward trend will continue into the winter and the spring of 1961, Petesen says. More pullets will appear in laying houses this fall to level of the expected short egg supply when they reach full production. When this occurs, the price will probably begin a gradual dip, says Charlie Petersen, poultry husbandman for the University of Idaho, is the 20 to 25 percent drop in pullet replacements since the first of the year.  
 "Low prices of 1959 drove some poultrymen into other businesses and brought about the short pullet replacements this spring," Petersen explains. "Some of them will come back when prices rise, but how many of those who went out of the poultry business will return to it. Egg production is not easy to get in and out of now that it has become a specialized, almost a technical, field."

**GUIDANCE PROGRAM PRAISED BY PREXY**

"If you are going to guide people, you must know what you are talking about — just as you must know how to milk a cow before you can tell someone else how," President D. R. Theophilus of the University of Idaho said in addressing the opening session of the summer guidance institute which will continue through August 5.  
 The institute, sponsored by the National Defense Education Act, provides 20 scholarships for teachers doing guidance work. It is directed by Dr. Eugene Giles of the university's college of education.

"This is a wonderful advance, and I am certain that within a relatively short period of time the benefits will be obvious to the individuals concerned and to the state," said Dr. Theophilus. "This is an area about which too many persons know too little. In the past, some counselors have not known much more about the problems discussed than the young persons they were advising."

"It is particularly important that our youths be given sound guidance in their educational programs in the secondary schools. It is almost too late when they come to the University."

**TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS UP DURING MAY**

More motorists were involved in more accidents during May than there were in April and a larger number of people were injured on Idaho highways and streets, but all three tabulations showed a decline from May, 1959, according to the traffic safety division.  
 Last month, 2,202 drivers were involved in 1,319 accidents which injured 462 people. In April there were 1,959 accident-involved drivers, 1,186 reported accidents and 329 personal injuries. A year ago the May report showed 2,544 drivers, 1,367 wrecks and 465 injured persons. There were 22 fatalities in May, 1960, and 10 during the same month last year.  
 Failing to have the right of way was the most frequent violation attributed to 245 drivers at fault for their accidents, while 171 drove off the roadway and 150 of the road mishaps were caused by inattention.

Investigating officers reported a total of 1,846 indicated violations, more than double the number reported last month.

Four of the drivers were operating their vehicles while their licenses were revoked, 18 had expired driver's licenses and 24 had no license.

Percentage of accident-involved drivers under 25 years of age rose from 30 per cent in April to 36 per cent in May.

All figures are compiled from accident reports filed with the Department of Law Enforcement by individuals and law enforcement officers throughout Idaho.

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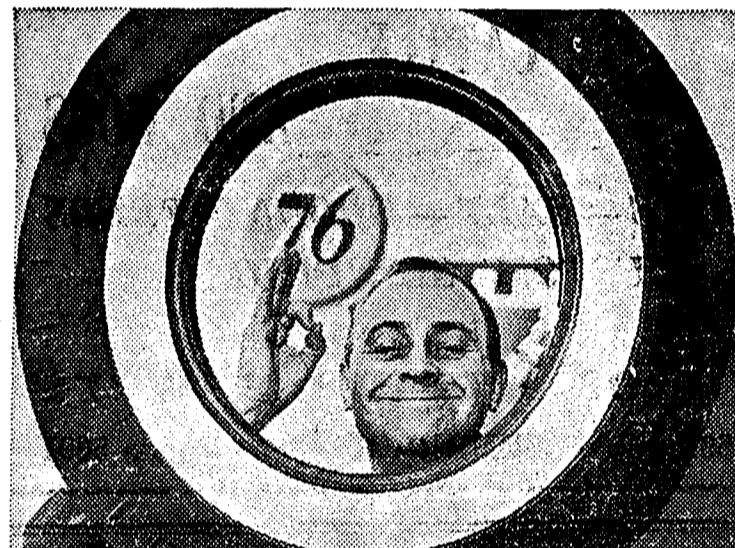

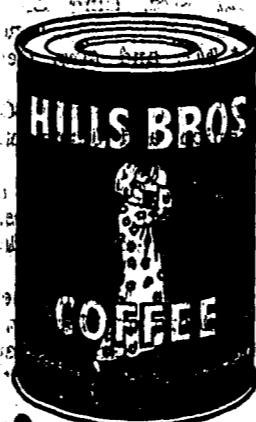
