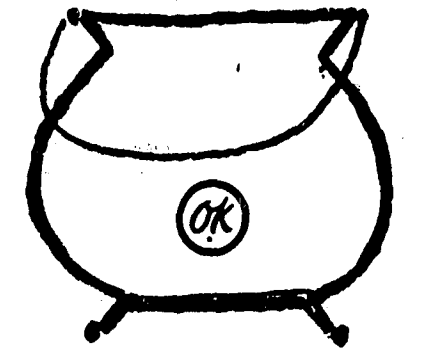

LATAH CATTLEMEN TOUR PUREBRED BEEF HERDS

Thirty five cattlemen visited the University of Idaho beef herds to start the tour. Purebred Herefords, Shorthorns and Angus cattle were reviewed by the cattlemen with Dr. Worth Hodgson explaining the various breeding programs conducted by the University of Idaho.

Production testing of potential herd sires in the Polled Hereford breed highlighted the stop at Gerry Hagedorn's ranch. J.O. Broyles feed lot was looked over by the group too.

The use of concrete to protect stock from mud was featured at the Gerald Comstock ranch. Concrete mixed in place by use of a garden tractor was described by Comstock. Herefords are used in commercial beef production as well as grade A dairying by Comstock.

Angus cattle were featured at both the F. H. Brincken and Ed Bysegger ranches. Both farms feature registered Angus cattle of high quality.

Smith's Hereford ranch, has produced many fine breeding animals. This was the last stop of the day and the cattlemen were shown some of the best beef breeds in Latah County.

OPTIMISM HIGH ON STRIPE RUST WHEAT

Examination of wheat fields affected by stripe rust in early areas along the Clearwater River raises optimism for our Latah County wheat crop.

Numerous wheat fields in Nezperce and Latah counties were surveyed by Dr. Arthur Finley, head of the plant pathology department; Dr. Harry Fenwick, Extension Plant Pathologist and Homer Futter, Latah County agent.

Although the fields hit early by stripe rust have nearly all the leaves gone, the heads are filling with grain. The grain will, undoubtedly, be light weight due to lack of leaf surfacing to feed the plant.

Losses of 10% to 20% in yield with some undetermined loss in quality is estimated at this time. Due to lack of experience with stripe rust infestation and loss, any prediction must be considered only an estimate with many factors affecting the final outcome.

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DRIVING HABITS OF OTHERS MAY BE OF AID ON HIGHWAY
 It's easy to make your own survey about the driving habits of motorists and your conclusions might make you somewhat more tolerant of other drivers, thereby making it more pleasant to drive your car.
 According to professionals who reportedly make constant scientific studies of all phases of traffic, only 15 per cent of the nation's drivers are repeater violators and only a third of that group are willful violators or are unable to improve their habits because of their mental or physical conditions.
 Most of these national "findings" can be verified to a certain extent if you study the flow of traffic in a

city or on a crowded highway.
 Motorists travel approximately 8 million miles a day on Idaho's streets and highways. Watch a busy intersection and out of hundreds of cars crossing and turning at the command of signal lights, only a small minority will jump the light, swerve into the path of another vehicle or deliberately ignore all rules of the road.
 The same can be said for the thousands of motorists on a highway.
 We recently observed two different Sunday traffic jams where 40 or 50 cars were slowed down by 25-mile-an-hour sightseers. Both areas had long stretches of no-passing zones and only a few safe-passing areas. In spite of this, the motorists demonstrated their patience even to the point of making room for one car that five per cent—to ram-rod his way around four other vehicles to get ahead.
 The point is, "problem drivers"

are in a minority and their escapades sooner or later receive publicity through their winks or court appearances. The so-called 85 per cent who are good drivers are not publicized any more than are the people who do not rob banks, who fail to shoot their wives and who abstain from stealing atomic secrets.
 The good, safe drivers go unheralded and that's probably the way they want it. They drive their cars properly because they want to and not for the glory of recognition.
 Law enforcement's objective is to increase that majority to 95 per cent, thereby reducing accidents, deaths, injuries, citations and court sentences.

'QUAKE AREA ROAD OPEN TO TRAVEL
 Motorists can now drive to the top of the huge slide which crashed down into the madison River Canyon of the Gallatin National Forest in southwestern Montana during the severe earthquake last August, according to an announcement made today by the U. S. Forest Service.
 The new two-way road gives visitors a chance to see Earthquake the nation's newest lake and view the tremendous slide scar from parking areas on top of the slide, a Forest Service spokesman said.
 The newly completed road leads for about two miles from former Highway 287 south of Ennis to the Forest Service said there are three parking areas on the slide and one near the western boundary of the Madison River Canyon Earthquake Area.
 Some work still remains in progress, but does not interfere with motorists who drive to the slide, the spokesman said. Other road work on the eastern portion of the special earthquake area began Monday. Three temporary roads around the damaged parts of the old highway are being rebuilt by the Montana State Highway Department.
 "Motorists driving into the Madison River Earthquake Area from West Yellowstone should plan their trip for the afternoons for the next couple of weeks," the Forest Service man said.
 "The contractor is working from four o'clock in the morning until noon each day. At noon, the roads are smoothed out to permit traffic," he said. Work began on a by-pass road near Hebgen Dam and will move east to the next two by-pass roads as the others are completed. The state is lowering the grade, widening the roads and putting on a dust coat of oil.
 "Access roads and other facilities such as signs and comfort stations are being built as fast as conditions permit," the spokesman said. We hope to have things in fair shape before the long Fourth of July week-end," he said.
 Motorists will not be able to drive completely through the Earthquake area until a new highway is built through the canyon beginning in 1961.
