Decision was made and approved by the members to recess until August 23, which will be the Fourth Tuesday.

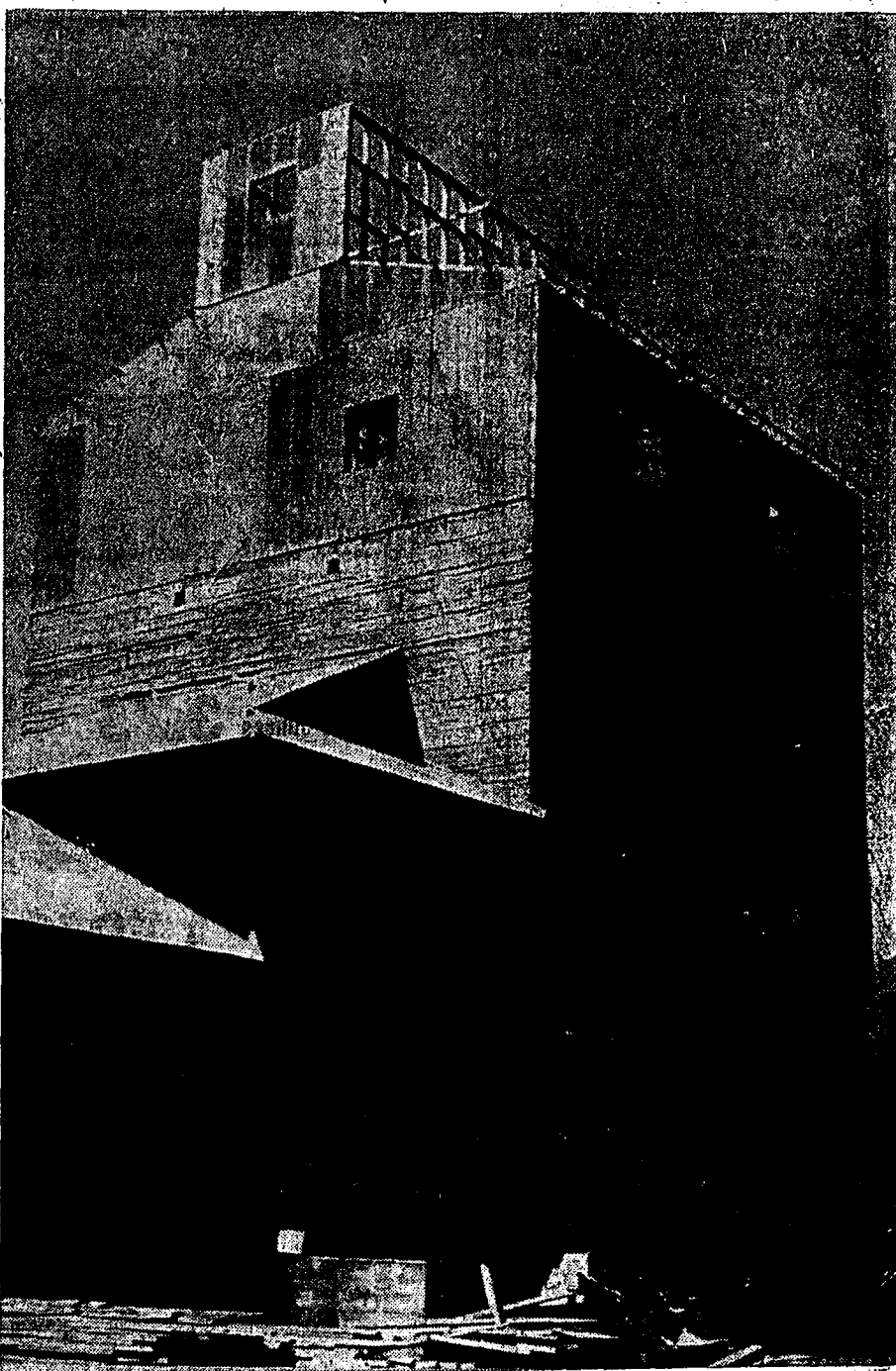

NEW BROCKE & SONS, INC. WAREHOUSE NEARS COMPLETION — Pictured above is the new bulk seed warehouse being constructed by Brocke and Sons, Inc. of Kendrick. The new structure, of "Crib" type construction, is to be used for the storage of bulk lentils, beans, etc. The warehouse has a capacity of 50,000 bushels, and is expected to be in operation by harvest time this fall. The building has been erected at the west end of the present seed warehouse.

HEART SURGERY SET FOR AUG. 25 FOR DONALD WRIGHT

Don Wright, Genesee, son of Louis Wright of Kendrick is scheduled for open heart surgery in Spokane on August 25.

Wright, 34, is a former resident of Troy, and is known to many in this area.

The surgery, slated to cost in the neighborhood of \$3,500 is a matter which at the present time is the most serious outlook for the Wright family. A total of \$1,850 must be on deposit at the hospital prior to the admittance of the patient.

Blood has been offered by the carpenter's union of which he is a member, and they will assume the responsibility of having the 27 pints available. This is the amount needed for the operation.

The heart fund, of which persons thought would aid in defraying of part of the expense of the operation, is used in the experiments and for control of rheumatic fever in children, a preventative of heart disease, and will not help with the expense of this surgery.

To aid in defraying the cost of the operation, which is a must if Wright is to have a future, The First Bank of Troy has started a fund, and deposited the first \$25 to the surgery account. Wright has absolutely no future to look forward to without the surgery, and about a 50 - 50 chance of recovering — a bleak outlook for a family man with three young children.

FOREST SERVICE TO CONSTRUCT BRIDGES

Construction will start soon after the first of July on a timber access bridge and a suspension pack bridge across Idaho streams, according to the office of the Regional Forester in Missoula, Montana.

U. S. MUST DOUBLE TIMBER GROWTH

The nation's growth of sawtimber will have to more than double to meet needs in the near future, according to a booklet just released by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The booklet, "Look to Your Timber, America" describes means by which landowners can increase tree growth. It points out that there will be 215 million people in the United States by 1975; by the year 2000 there will be between 275 and 300 million. To meet the resulting needs, growth of sawtimber will have to be increased from the present 47 billion board feet to 105 billion board feet.

The survey on which the pamphlet is based shows that sawtimber growth nationwide is 9 percent more than it was in 1944, but that the best trees are most heavily harvested while less useful, smaller trees are being left unharvested.

Interested landowners can get copies of the booklet by writing to the Regional Forester, U. S. Forest Service, Missoula, Montana, asking for "Look to Your Timber, America."



30 THOUSAND VISIT EARTHQUAKE SLIDE

An estimated 30 thousand persons have visited the huge earthquake slide in Madison River Canyon Earthquake Area so far this year, according to a report from the U. S. Forest Service.
About one-half of the visits have been made since June 22 when a new access road to the top of the slide was opened to public travel, a Forest Service spokesman said. He added that this figure does not include visits to the equally interesting eastern portion of the area. During the past few days, visits to the eastern part of the area have been about one-third as great as the number of visits to the slide itself he said.

CROWN ROT SHOWS UP IN IDAHO LAWNS

U. of I., Moscow — Although "brown spot" in lawns is not usually brown spot at all, it is one of the most serious diseases affecting Idaho's blue grass plantings, declares Harry S. Fenwick, plant pathologist at the University.
"The so-called brown-spot disease we see usually turns out to be a leaf spot or crown rot in most Idaho lawns," Fenwick explains. "Close inspection of the grass blades shows purplish splotches with an oval shape and a white center, the characteristics of grass leaf spot. Call it what you will, it's rough on grass and may go down to the roots of the plant and kill it entirely. We have lost lots of it."
Fenwick emphasizes that the way the lawn is handled or managed has a great deal to do with its appearance and vigor. Shallow and frequent watering late in the day or evening leaves the grass cool and wet through the night, perfect environment for most diseases that damage lawns. Low mowing and the following reduction of plant vigor further sets the stage for serious diseases.
"Water in the morning if you are watering by sprinkler," the pathologist advises. "Soak the soil to a depth of four to six inches and then water no more until the grass shows signs of needing moisture. Morning water gives the foliage a chance to dry out before night comes. Give your grass a good application of commercial fertilizer now and then to keep growth good and its color dark and alive. Mow it not lower than one-and-a-half inches."
Fenwick recommends heavy applications of Captan — up to four ounces per thousand square feet of lawn every ten days throughout the summer if chemical control for the disease must be resorted to.

IDAHO CATTLEMEN TO FATTEN BEEF ON ALL-BARLEY DIET

An all-barley ration for fattening Idaho beef cattle is being tried out at the University's Caldwell branch experiment station as a result of an agreement signed in early June between University regents and the Idaho Cattle Feeders' Association.
Animal husbandman at the University says the agreement sets a precedent in cooperative livestock research in the state.
Under terms of the agreement, the Association has purchased 60 head of feeder steers and placed them in the Caldwell station's feed lots. Feed and labor are furnished by the cattlemen; the university furnishes technical assistance throughout the experiment. The cattle will remain on the all-barley ration for about 120 days, marketed, and their carcasses compared for weight gain and quality with those of slaughtered animals produced by other feeds.
"Cattle feeding is a fast-growing industry," the university's animal husbandman emphasizes. "We and Idaho's cattlemen want more facts about the type of feeding we are trying out at Caldwell. Idaho is a barley producing state, and we need more information concerning the best use of this feed in out cattle fattening feedlots."
Experiments to determine the best amounts of dried beet pulp in fattening rations will be conducted at the same time, the animal husbandman report.

BASIC SURVIVAL GIVEN BIG TEST

The laws of basic survival have been given close study by professor George M. Bell of the University of Idaho's college of law.
The June issue of American Foresters magazine features an article by Bell telling of his trip on foot with four companions through the state's primitive area. The hikers took nine days to cover 60 miles. "In addition, we went about 60 miles up and down," says Bell.
The hikers left road's end in the Salmon area and traveled west to Big creek.
"The country through which we walked and climbed remains unchanged since the last band of Indian braves surrendered to the U. S. Army in 1879," the law professor reports. "This was the old home territory of the Sheepeater Indians. There are no roads, only animal trails and a few unmarked forest trails. We saw a near-delirium of staggering mountains, canyons with precipitous walls and unending summits."
"In some of the higher areas, we had to stop talking so that we could gulp down the needed oxygen. When we stopped one night on the Middle Fork, the Canyon walls were so steep that we could not find room to roll out five sleeping bags. We had to walk another half-mile down stream before we found a comparatively flat area."
Game? The hikers encountered deer and bear and many small animals. Rattlesnakes were a continuing hazard.
"The lead man," says Bell, "was known as the 'snake herder.'"
