## VILLAGE WATER SUPPLY NOW CRITICAL, NEW RESTRICTIONS EFFECTIVE TODAY

Kendrick village trustees met in special session Tuesday evening in an effort to find a feasible way to eliminate the critical water shortage now plaguing Kendrick.

Tuesday evening at 8:00 the water reservoir held only 26 inches. This supply would not last 30 minutes in case of fire, when an extra heavy draw would become necessary.

Facing the extreme shortage, the councilmen decided to continue the "every other day" watering, but set a time limit of two hours per household. They have also again cut the town in half to equalize the water draw.

So, the town has now been divided at the Kendrick park. This means that persons having their day to water, north side of Main Street and west side of the schoolhouse hill on odd numbered days, and the other half on even numbered days, will continue to water on "their day" as before.

Note New Regulations:  
Watering will be from 8:00 a. m. until 10:00 a. m. below the village park, and from 6:00 until 8:00 in the evening above the village park.

These new restrictions are to become effective today — Wednesday, July 13, and will continue until such time as the new pump arrives and the new well is put into operation. Until that time water restrictions are to be enforced, and violators face a penalty by fine.

## DISTRICT DIRECTORS "TABLE" BIDS FOR RAZING SCHOOL

Monday night, District 283 school directors opened and took under advisement two sealed bids on the removal of the old Kendrick High School building.

Climbing far beyond the expectations of the directors, the bids were taken under advisement and will be re-called again later this year.

Superintendent of schools, Robert Meserve, said that the bids from Warner and Brown of Spokane and Commercial Builders of Moscow would not be revealed at this time, but added that they were beyond the budget of the district, and that a recall of the bids would have to be taken at a later date.

It was also revealed at the Monday meeting that next week bids will be called on gas and oil for the coming year.

## Sheriff's Office "Numb"

Last week the Latah County Sheriff's office was informed that the new Kendrick High School had been broken into, windows broken and three electric drills stolen. To this date, so far as we have been able to learn, the district has received no action on the call, not even so much as an indication that they would investigate.

Three windows were broken, with rocks twice the size of a man's fist, causing enough impact to the floor to break the tile. Three one-quarter inch electric drills were also stolen during the past week.

It was also reported at the meeting that the new school is now 99 per cent complete. All that remains is the moving work, now underway by Art Foster.

He had formerly owned and operated the Zada's Cafe at Juliaetta for about three years. Previous to that he had farmed on Big Bear ridge.

Mr. Jones was born Nov. 21, 1917, at Kendrick, and had spent his entire life in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area until March of this year, when he went to work in the mines.

He was united in marriage to Zada Long at Lewiston, June 20, 1944, and from whom he was later divorced.

Survivors include three sons, Keith, Kenneth and David of Lewiston; three brothers, Bernard and Ray of Kendrick and John of Moscow; and five sisters, Mrs. Agnes Sherbon of Pullman; Mrs. Opal Redington of Salmon; Mrs. Elizabeth Maynard of Lewiston; Mrs. Erma Bennett of Spokane and Mrs. Pauline Shoemaker of Connell, Wash.

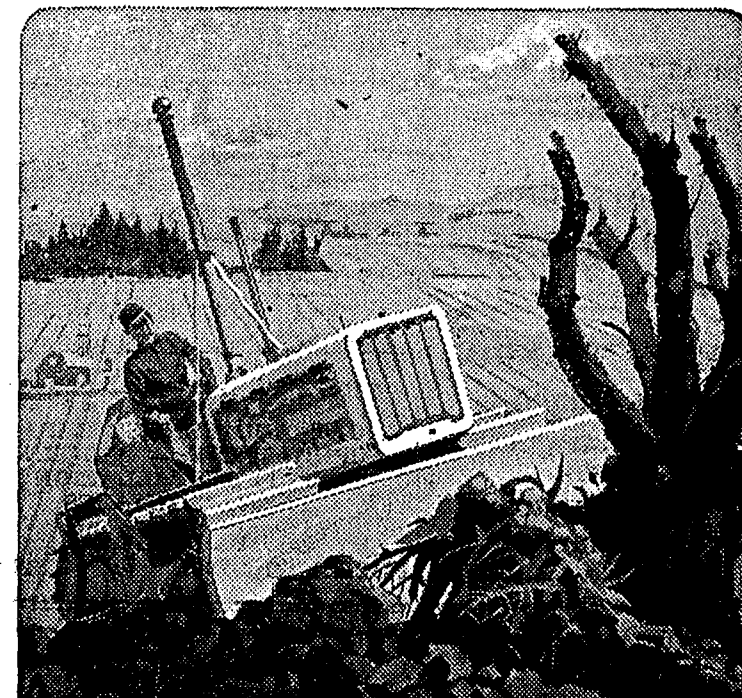
