Facing the extreme shortage, the councilmen decided to continue the "every other day" watering, but set "TABLE" BIDS FOR a time limit of two hours per household. They have also again cut the town in half to equalize the water

So, the town has now been divided at the Kendrick park. This means that persons having their day to water, north side of Main Street and west side of the schoolhouse hill on odd numbered days, and the other half on even numbered days, will continue to water on "their day" as be-

Note New Regulations: Watering will be from 8:00 a. m. until 10:00 a. m. below the village park, and from 6:00 until 8:00 in the evening above the village park.

These now restrictions are to become effective today — Wednesday, July 13, and will continue until such time as the new pump arrives and the new well is put into operation. Until that time water restrictions are to be enforced, and violators face a penalty by fine.

Monday night, District 283 school directors opened and took under advisement two sealed bids on the removal of the old Kendrick High School building.

Climbing far beyond the expecta-tions of the directors, the bids were taken under adivsement and will be re-called again later this year.

Superintendent of schools, Robert Meserve, said that the bids from Warner and Brown of Spokane, and Commercial Builders of Moscow would not be revealed at this time, but added that they were beyond the budget of the district, and that a re-call of the bids would have to be taken at a later date.

It was also revealed at the Monday meeting that next week bids will be called on gas and oil for the coming year.

Total consumer expenditures for drugs in 1958 amounted to \$3,261,000,000, or about \$19 per capita, as compared with \$10 per capita in 1948. It beats me! Here in the four states, Idaho, Oregon, Montana and Washington, with a total population of 5,940,000, the PUDs serve 254,787 customers, or 12.5% of the total. Yet because the PUDs shout so loudly, both congress and the nation generally have the idea that the entire Northwest is public power. Because the Northwest is private enterprise at heart, the question of "federalized power," or "po-litical power" and "socialized power," has practically no influence on candidates running for public office.

There shouldn't be much going to the tax collector in this family. Mrs. Marie Cyr of Fort Kent, Maine, married at 17 has produced a child every year for her first 27 married years, of whom 19 are living. Nothing phony about these exemptions.

Brush all the prejudices aside, and there are only two principal issues in the world today. One is internal and world-wide at the same time. It is whether big government will grow bigger and lead its citizens around by the nose, or whether individuals are strong enough and cooperative enough to do things for themselves. The second issue, of course is America's relationship to other nations. All else is trivial.
