## New Well in Operation; Some Water Restrictions to Remain

Amid the groans and complaints attending the present heat wave, one bright spot stands out for residents of the Village of Kendrick — the 2-hour watering period has been done away with — although the every-other-day program, which went into effect some weeks ago, is continued — on even numbered days residents south and east of Main Street and the schoolhouse hill may water; on the odd numbered days residents north and west of Main Street and the schoolhouse hill may water.

First water from the new well and new pump went into the village water mains on Sunday afternoon about 8:30 o'clock, after members of the local trustees, citizens, and a wiring crew had labored most of Saturday and Sunday to bring this to fruition. However, the transformer installed proved inadequate for the job and another had to put

in place Monday, which gave the necessary impetus to the entire system.

In speaking of the well, Frank Abrams, mayor, and Dave Clayton said: We are most pleased with the output of the new well, and only hope that it will continue.

Here are figures regarding it which we believe will be of real interest to everyone:

The 4-inch hole has been drilled to a depth of 255 feet.

The 12-inch hole has been "reamed" to a depth of 186 feet, and at the bottom of this 186-foot hole the drilling company has a stuck "bailing bucket." This bucket is 10 feet in length, leaving a water depth (in the clear) of 176 feet.

The new motor and pump, of "submersible type" has been installed at a depth of 160 feet.

At this 160 foot depth, continuous pumping has lowered the water to 40 feet (from top of ground) and it is holding steady there.

No accurate figure is available, as no water meter was installed in the temporary hook-up, but all those having anything to do with the well believe that the flow (now being pumped) is 150 gallons per minute! Which is indeed quite satisfactory. However, due to the fact that it is pumping into a three-inch main, the water pressure there and at adjoining homes is 175 pounds per square inch — which is pretty high.

Mr. Abrams said that there is an immediate need to extend the six-inch main, which now ends at the Sperry bridge, to the new well, and if and when this is done, undoubtedly a better flow with far less pressure can be obtained.

Anyhow — it looks as if Kendrick has its water problem "licked." It will, however, take time for the new well and pump to prove themselves, and should the need arise, rationing (two-hour basis) can and will be reinstated.

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## JULIAETTA WELL GOES ARTESIAN AT 455-FOOT MARK

Monday afternoon, at a depth of 455 feet, drillers of the Oliver Zinkgraf & Sons drilling firm brought the good word that they had hit water — artesian water — that was boiling out of the hole at a rate estimated to exceed 50 gallons per minute.

The water, more valuable than oil to the Juliaetta residents, came at a time when they were about to suspend drilling operations at that site. Drilling has been going on there for the past four or five weeks.

The drillers plan to go down another 30 feet, at which time they expect to be through with the job. They have now just broken through the rock, and have seven feet of water (reservoir) at the 455-foot mark.

Juliaetta residents are more than pleased, not to speak of the excitement of the members of the village council (they having been "under the gun" for some time).

## 3 UNCONTROLLED TIMBER FIRES IN KENDRICK DISTRICT

Wednesday morning at 9:30 o'clock Norman Lewis, Kendrick District deputy state fire warden, told the Gazette that the lightning storm of Tuesday night and accompanying wind had left the district with three uncontrolled timber and brush fires — two above Ahshahka, and one on Moscow Mountain. He added, "Goodness knows how many more there may be that will spring into life, but that is all that we know of at this time."

He added that there was an uncontrolled grass fire on the lower end of Potlatch ridge, approximately a mile and a half straight west of the Cletis Hoisington ranch. He said that he believed co-ordinated efforts of farmers in the area, however, would soon get this under control.

Mr. Lewis said that the Kendrick crew was assisting in the fighting of the big grass and wheat-land fire at Lapwai and Spalding, when reports were received of the three timber fires in the district, and "we had to pull out and go for these."

He added: "We're spread far too thin, but hope for control before the evening winds begin. Only time can tell."

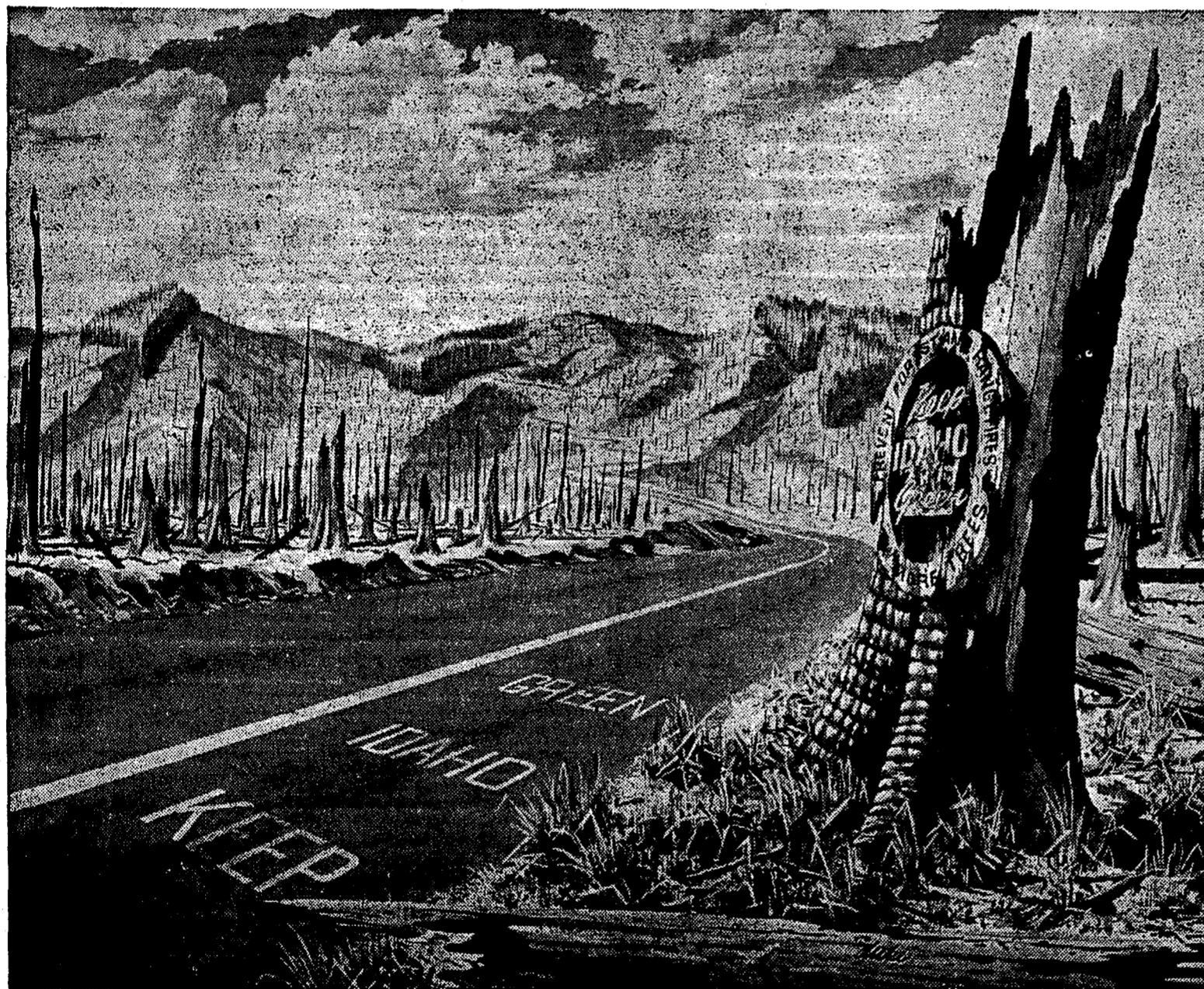

**RESERVOIR LAND IS PURCHASED**

Boise — July 14 — About 295 acres have been purchased in Latah county by the Idaho Fish and Game department as the site of Little Bear Creek Reservoir, approximately four miles north of Troy, it was announced today.

The reservoir is expected to contain between 80 and 90 surface acres of water for the purpose of providing trout fishing and recreation, with some additional benefits to migratory waterfowl.

The Fish and Game Commission last week authorized the department to purchase 295 acres of land at a total cost of \$36,940.00.

Ross Leonard, department director, said that deeds to the land have been delivered, and that his engineering staff will start drafting suitable engineering plans.

**SUGGESTIONS ON SAVING LENTILS**

U. of I. Moscow — Heat and dry weather has cut lentil prospects so farmers should make every effort to save the crop. Wrong harvesting methods can lose several hundred pounds of lentils per acre due to shattering. Care in mowing can mean big wages.

Leaving lentils to ripen standing has a big element of risk, as one wind can shatter many lentils and the first to be affected are the large, plump, valuable seeds.

Ordinary mowers will cut lentils if the sickle sections and ledger plates are sharp. Lentils should be cut clean as they tend to build up on the cutter bar, which can cause plugging.

Lifters are not needed to cut lentils, but several fingers to clear the tractor tracks are necessary. These fingers, or rollers, should be spaced closer together for lentils than when used for peas, and should be longer to roll the lentils gently. Mowing at a good speed helps to make the short plants clear the cutter bar.

Wash the cutter bar with water to prevent gumming, and be sure to clean the bar and sickle before leaving your equipment for any length of time, as the gum is difficult to remove after it dries.

Mowing during the cool part of the day and at night will save the lentils. They should be mowed a little on the green side, as it is better to sacrifice a few of the small, green lentils, and be sure of saving the large, ripe ones.

Check lentils daily, as they can surprise you by ripening quickly on hot days. Lentils should be mowed when the ones that are the greenest are firm. Test the greenest seed you can find by squeezing, and if it is mealy, start cutting. If the seed is juicy, then wait until it matures to the mealy stage. The lentil seed will finish hardening after mowing.

Cutting too green will result in shriveled seed. Lentil vines will still show some green color at mowing time, however.

About a week after mowing check to see that lentils are hard, and the straw dry and brittle — then start combining. Combine speed should be set the same as for peas, and be careful not to crack the seeds.

**MAY NOW USE 2,4-D IN WHEAT**

Moscow — Farmers are now permitted the use of 2,4-D in spraying weeds in wheat, reports John Graiser, Latah county weed supervisor. Several conflicting reports have been published by the Pure Food and Drug Administration regarding the use of 2,4-D in grain crops, but the latest word received in the Agent's office is that grain may be sprayed with 2,4-D.

Graiser warns farmers using Amino Triazole to kill Canada Thistle in peas and lentils to be extra careful not to harvest any of the treated area. If Amino Triazole is used, leave peas and lentils unharvested and be sure to cut far enough around the patches to allow for any drift of the spray.

Pea growers should check with their pea dealer before spraying the weeds in pea fields to protect germination.

Now is the time to hit Canada Thistle with 2,4-D. Graiser suggests using 4 pounds actual acid amine type 2,4-D in 50 gallons of water for straight Canada Thistle patches. The spraying of Canada Thistle in the early bud stages will give best results.

Morning glory is best sprayed at early bloom stage with the actual acid amine 2,4-D solution. Amino Triazole at 8 pounds per 50 gallons of water works well for Canada Thistle in non-crop land.

Care should be used in selective spraying of weeds out of spring barley and oats. Use 2,4-D amine at 1 to 1½ pounds actual acid in 20 gallons of water per acre after the barley or oats have stood and before the grain goes into the boot stage.

Graiser reports that farmers in general are doing a fine job in controlling weeds with an increase in the spot cultivation practice.

The county weed crews are busy spraying on roadways and are finding a reduction in weed infestations.

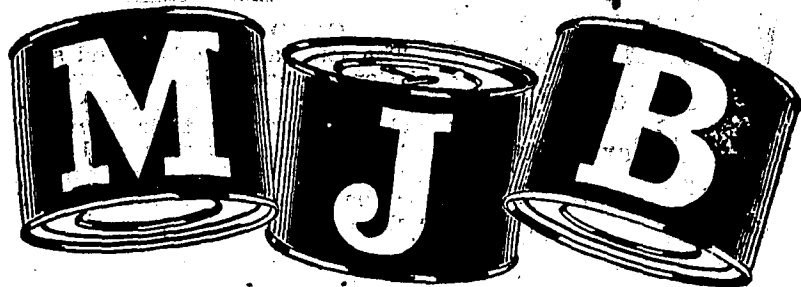
