500 Attend Dedication Ceremonies

Some 500 persons were on hand Sunday afternoon to hear D. F. Engleking, state superintendent of public instruction, say that a good curriculum and good teachers must accompany a new school building if education is to fulfill its roll in the community and nation.

Engleking gave the dedicatory address at the site of the new \$316,826 combined Junior-Senior High school of Joint District No. 283.

Engleking said: "Curricula in our American schools often suffer from weakness in mathematics and allied sciences." But he added: "Americans are coming to recognize this weakness and are taking steps to correct it."

Engleking's address followed formal presentation of the school by Anton C. Dropping of Boise a partner in the architectural firm of Dropping, Kelley & Finch, which designed the building and gymnasium. Gerald Ingle, chairman of the board of Joint School District No. 283, accepted the structure on behalf of the school district.

Earlier, Herbert Millard, commander of Baker-Ling Post No. 3913, V. F. W., at Kendrick, formally presented an American flag to the School's Student Body secretary, Dee Magnuson. The Post also erected and presented to the district a flag pole in front of the school.

The Rev. Ernest Gates, pastor of the Kendrick Community Church delivered the invocation. The benediction was given by the Rev. W. Gene Hansen, pastor of the Juliaetta Church of the Nazarene.

A tour of the new plant was conducted by Robert Meserve, Kendrick superintendent of schools. David Peterson of Lewiston, Past President of the Idaho School Trustees Association was master of ceremonies.

In attendance at the dedication was Dr. J. Fredrick Weltzin, Moscow, Dean of the College of Education at the University of Idaho.

Also present were two former district school superintendents: Mr. and Mrs. Burnice B. Brigham and family of Moscow, and Mr. and Mrs. Jasper L. Nutting and family of Lind, Wn.

School Starts Tuesday

The doors of the new school will swing open to about 150 Junior-Senior High school students on Tuesday, Sept. 6th. Classes are to begin at 9:00 a. m., as are all other schools and classes in the district.

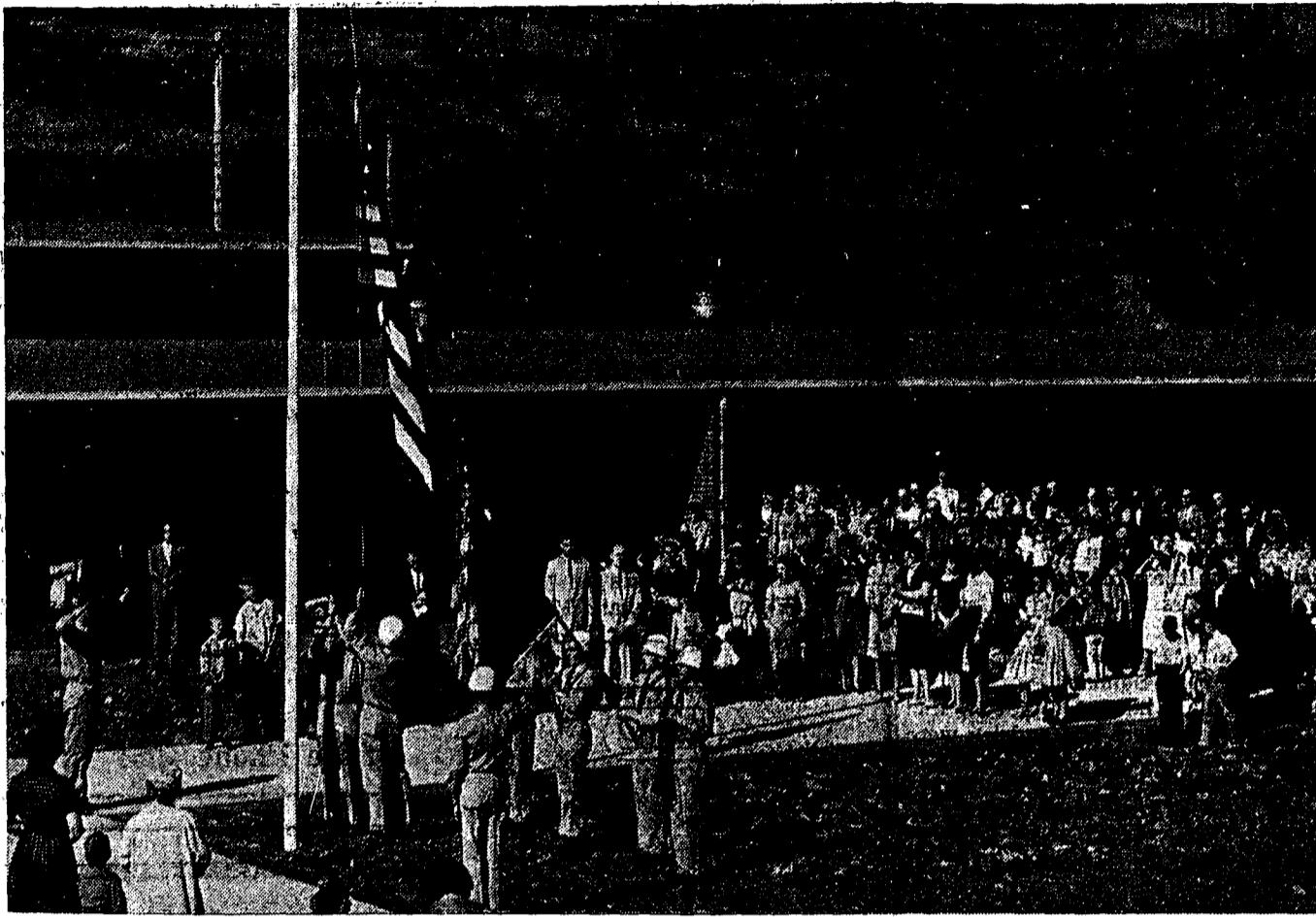

ISLAND SHEEP ARE MOVED

Mrs. Cletis Hoisington, Juliaetta, is in receipt of the following letter from H. J. Woodworth, Spenard, Alaska, under date of Aug. 27, as follows:

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Hoisington: It is with a great deal of pleasure that I write this letter about your son, Neale. He has been promoted to Captain of the vessel and has done an outstanding job.

When we went to Chirikof Island he came back on his duty shift at the wheel and told us which way to steer to find Chirikof, after we had wandered off course during the night. This took a knowledge of navigation that he has taken time to learn. It surely came in handy that morning after wandering around in the great Pacific with nothing in sight but water as far as the eye could see in all directions.

I will enclose a clipping that shows he has been the first one able to take live animals off of Chirikof Island during the 80 odd years livestock have been there. Two horses were also taken off in addition to the animals mentioned in the news item.

Anchorage, June 30 — The first live animals to be taken off Chirikof Island, 50 miles southwest of Kodiak Island, have been transferred by ship to another island.

Taken to Simeonof Island, 150 miles southwest of Chirikof, were 95 sheep. They were aboard the Western I, a power scow commanded by Capt. Neale Hoisington. At Simeonof Island they were handed over to Walter Riley. The sheep left Chirikof on June 18.

Pat, Capt. Hoisington's dog, rounded up the sheep and kept them under control until they could be loaded on the scow. Loading operations were a difficult job because there is no

harbor on Chirikof. For more than 80 years nearly a thousand head of cattle have roamed wild on the 33,000-acre island. In recent years they have been mixed with Hereford and whiteface cattle.

The island is now managed by Don Wright, major stockholder in the Chirikof Island Cattle Co.

Mrs. Hoisington tells the Gazette that the dog, "Pat" that Capt. Hoisington used was one that had been given to him by "Buck" Holt, Kendrick, when a puppy, and Neale trained it himself — and apparently very successfully.

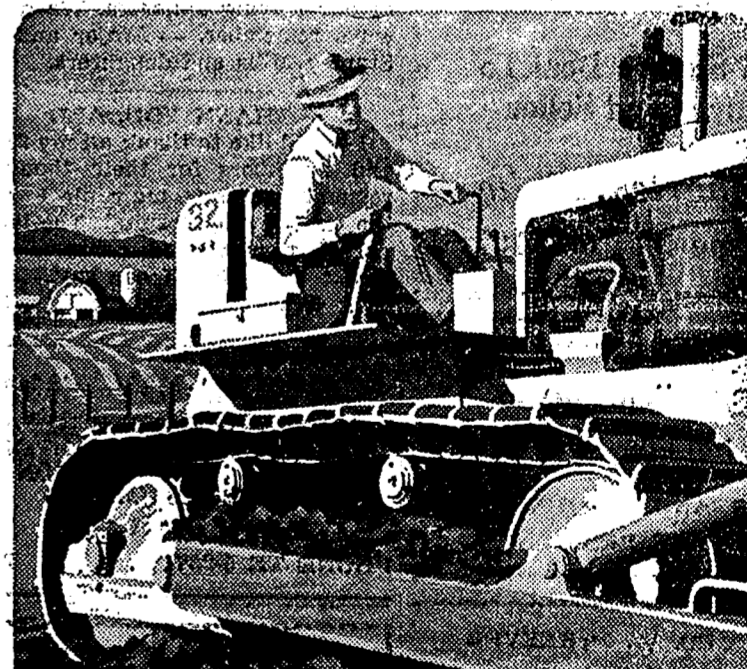
