## CAR PLUNGES OFF BRADY GULCH ROAD MONDAY, ONE DIES

Three teen-age boys were injured, one of them later dying, when their car plunged over a steep 150-foot embankment on the American ridge grade about 6:00 p. m. Monday. The accident occurred on a district road between Kendrick and Troy, about a mile and a half north of Kendrick, and perhaps a quarter mile above the entrance to the Marion Rowden ranch.

Edward Jones, Kendrick, son of Mrs. Alie Jones and Monte Lohman, Southwick, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Lohman both 16, were passengers in a 1951 Chevrolet hardtop coupe driven by Douglas Shepherd, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harvie Shepherd of Juliaetta.

Passers-by, whose names were not learned, came to the rescue of the boys, and called Dr. D. A. Christensen, who administered first aid. An ambulance was called and Edward Jones and Monte Lohman were taken to the St. Joseph's Hospital at Lewiston. Here it was discovered that Edward Jones had a compound depressed fracture of the skull with considerable brain damage. He was in surgery five hours Monday night. He failed to respond and passed away Wednesday morning.

Monte Lohman suffered compression fractures of four thoracic vertebrae (which means his spine was compressed) a sprained knee, scratches and abrasions. While he is quite miserable Dr. Christensen says he is in no grave danger, but bed rest is needed.

Douglas Shepherd, driver of the car, was taken home following treatment at Dr. Christensen's office. He suffered multiple bruises and deep lacerations and abrasions.

State Police Sgt. Kenneth DeYoung said the car went out of control as it traveled down the grade. It struck a bank warning sign on the right hand side, jumped an indentation in the road and followed along the right hand bank before going off the grade. It smashed into a pine tree, which stopped it from traveling another 30 or 40 feet to the bottom. The car was wrecked beyond practical repair, said DeYoung.

Funeral services for Edward Jones are scheduled for Saturday morning at 10:00 o'clock in the Assembly of God Church, Kendrick.

## PETTY LARCENY CHARGED AGAINST LOCAL YOUTHS

Three local teen-agers, two of Kendrick and a third from Juliaetta were charged with petty larceny Wednesday morning for the theft of produce from two local growers.

The youths were charged by Bob Young, Latah county deputy sheriff, after complaints were signed following the theft of watermelons from the patches of Dallas Groseclose and Phil Johns, near Juliaetta, over the week-end.

Accompanying the theft was vast destruction to the produce patches, melons being smashed and vines ripped up, the growers reported.

Johns told the Gazette that the intruders drove through his patch, destroying vines and melons, and hauled off a truck load of watermelons and canteloupes.

The streets of Kendrick were littered with melons on Sunday morning, and it was reported that the vandals were to clean the streets this week.

The arraignment of the youths, two of whom are juveniles, is expected to take place within the next week or so.

The names of the juveniles were not released by the Sheriff's office.

Lewiston — R. Ralph Wright, a retired farmer, died of a heart attack at his home at 222 6th Ave., at 9:30 a. m., August 26th. He was 75 years of age.

Mr. Wright had suffered from a heart ailment for 20 years, and had been in failing health for two weeks. He was sitting in a chair when the final attack came.

He was born April 24 1885, at Belington, West Virginia. He moved with his parents to Southwick, Idaho, in 1893.

Mr. Wright farmed in the Southwick area until 1924, and at Potlatch until 1925. He moved to Lewiston in that year and worked for the Clearwater Timber Co., later Potlatch Forests, Inc., until his retirement 20 years ago.

He married Bertha Baker at Southwick, Oct. 30, 1904. He was a member of the United Brethren Church.

Survivors include his wife, at the family home; two daughters, Mrs. Zelma (Clarence) Henderson, and Mrs. Lottie (Clarence) Whiting, both of Lewiston; a son, Marion Wright, John Day Oregon; a brother, Clinton Wright, Longview, Wash.; a sister, Mrs. George Christensen of Lewiston; and two grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at 11 a. m. Monday at the Brower-Wann Chapel, Lewiston, with the Rev. Arlie Whybark, pastor of the Clarkston United Brethren Church officiating. Interment was in Normal Hill Cemetery, Lewiston.

## PLEASED WITH IDAHO TRAVELS

Idaho's magnificent scenery and friendly people make the biggest impression on out-of-state visitors, according to preliminary results of a tourist survey being conducted by the Department of Commerce and Development.

Fish and game department conservation officer Walt Berry, Coeur d'Alene, ear-tags black bear for future identification. As a result of this program, five Idaho bears no sport ear rings, tattoos, and other "ID" that in time will give researchers ideas about how large a roaming area bears require, and information about breeding age, frequency, litter size, infant mortality, and other vital statistics.

Department Director Ross Leonard says that a similar program is underway in Montana to help keep tabs on the large, more ferocious grizzly bear species, now almost extinct in most states, except Alaska, and parts of Canada. Note hypodermic needle on bear's left shoulder. This injected a muscle relaxant drug that prevented it from moving while identification was being attached.

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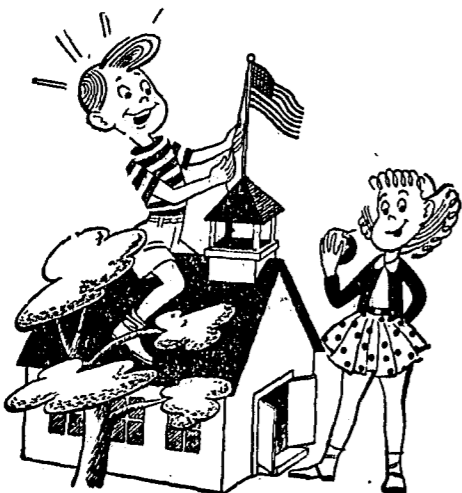

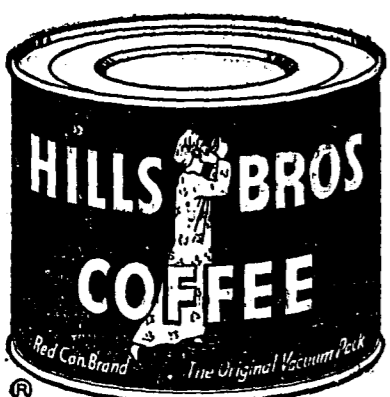
