REV. G. W. BENJAMIN PIONEER PASTOR, DIES SUNDAY

The Rev. G. W. Benjamin, 84, pioneer minister of this area, who was serving churches when it took two days to go from Kamiah to Juliaetta, died Sunday at 8:45 a. m. at the home of his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. D. E. Clear, 1237 13th Street, Clarkston.

He had had a heart ailment for many years, and was seriously ill the last four months.

Of the United Brethren faith, Rev. Benjamin was actively engaged in the ministry from 1910 until 1942. He had conducted evangelistic meetings in all west coast states and had served as district superintendent of the church for Idaho, Washington and Oregon.

He was born Sept. 29, 1876, at New Market, Iowa. He was married there Feb. 15, 1898, to Jessie M. Pressnall. Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin and their eldest son, Murray, now of Princeton, arrived at Lewiston by train, Sept. 27, 1901. They took lodging across the Snake river at Vineland, now Clarkston. Clarkston then was mostly a few poorly built frame houses, sand and sagebrush.

Within a month they homesteaded at Harrisburg, Idaho. In coming years Mr. Benjamin moved out to preaching missions after crops were harvested in the fall, then returned to the homestead in the spring.

The Benjamins lived at Harrisburg from 1901 to 1915; at Juliaetta from 1915 to 1922; at Pottlatch from 1922 to 1924; at Palouse from 1924 to 1934, and at Southwick from 1934 to 1935.

In the latter year they moved to Clarkston. Mrs. Benjamin died there in 1942, and he retired shortly after from the ministry.

In December of 1946, Mr. Benjamin married his childhood sweetheart, Mrs. Lotta Holland, at Denver. The present Mrs. Benjamin, who is ill, is being cared for by a daughter, Mrs. Vera Page, at Colorado Springs, Colo.

Also surviving are two other sons, Milton of Southwick and Richard of Kendrick; another daughter, Mrs. Erma Jean Jones, Clarkston; eight grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 11 in the Brower-Wann Chapel, Lewiston, with the Rev. Archie Whybark of the United Brethren Church of Clarkston officiating. Interment was in Vineland Cemetery, Clarkston.

WHEAT GROWERS SCHEDULE MEETING

Moscow — County wheat growers have a meeting scheduled for 1:30 p. m., Wednesday, December 14th, at Moscow.

A. E. Koster, Moscow, president, reports that a program is scheduled to inform wheat growers of the progress made in wheat promotion, research, and new wheat programs.

Dr. Boyd Martin, University of Idaho, will tell the wheat growers of his recent European trip. Martin traveled through most of Europe, and into Russia, and will compare farming conditions found in those countries.

Dr. William Polz, University of Idaho Agricultural Economics department, will explain the new proposed two-price system for wheat. This proposed program is set up on a bushel allotment and will create some changes in farming practices if it is adopted by the government.

The happenings in the recent state convention will be related by Koster, Jesse Johnson, Genesee, and Homer Futtler, Latah County agent.

Present directors of the Latah County Wheat Growers Association are: A. E. Koster, Moscow; Lester Clemm, Troy; Nora Callison, Kendrick; Alvin Sundstrom, Deary; Alvon Hampton, Genesee; Don Comstock, Pottlatch, and Wilbur Westberg, Moscow.

Two new directors are to be elected to replace Comstock and Westberg, whose terms expire.

The meeting will be held at the Latah County Grain Growers meeting hall on West Sixth Street, Moscow.

CRUSHER LEAVING

The operators of the rock crusher which has been operating across the Pottlatch river from the Werner Brammer home between Kendrick and Juliaetta, have been busy the past few days dismantling it and moving out — high water being given as the cause.

The crusher had been supply rock to the Kendrick Highway District, the Village of Kendrick, and private individuals for some month or six weeks, but the rising river made it impractical to cross to the equipment to obtain rock, and it was decided to dismantle and remove it.

VILLAGE FATHERS WRESTLE WITH PARKING PROBLEM

Beyond a doubt it's just a sign of our times, but every city and village seems to be wrestling with the parking problem — and Kendrick is no exception.

At their meeting Tuesday evening of this week a committee from the Kendrick Community Church consisting of Howard Hoffman, Bob Magnuson and Bill McCreary met with the Kendrick Trustees in an attempt to solve the "use of the church problem" created by Ordinance No. 500, which forbids parking in front of the church, or on the north side of that section of Main Street for a distance of more than two blocks, and thereby created a tough problem for its use at weddings, funerals, etc.

The Village Fathers agreed that the problem was a knotty one, but pointed out that the Ordinance was passed at the request of the State Highway Department. As a result they promised an immediate investigation and recommendations to the state as follows:

1. A request that school bus loading zone signs be placed as soon as possible for the church — as it is a school bus stop and loading point.
2. They will ask the state for removable signs which can be put up for traffic control during use of the church for funerals and weddings, etc.
3. Investigation of the use of the lots adjoining the school bus garage (which belong to the village) for parking while the church is in use.
4. Investigation for blocking off the side street adjoining the Deobald Garage and the home of Mrs. Francis Trout for a parking area during such church use.
5. Investigation of the cost of installation of an illuminated "Cross Walk" sign and painting of safety lines from the Deobald Garage across the street to the church.

The matter of routing traffic on a "one-way" basis from the street at the Jack Travis home, along the railroad track to the W. W. P. Co. office and thence back to Main Street at Bob's Garage was also mentioned, but no action taken on this, as it was believed the requests to the state would care for the matter.

WEATHER NIPPY

Local weather, at present at least, can be described accurately in just one word — "nippy."

Following a rather chill and damp week-end, the clouds cleared away on Sunday morning, and it was indeed a beautiful day, although during the late afternoon the thermometer began to drop, and by nightfall there was a real "bite" to the air.

Monday morning canyon residents awoke to a thermometer reading of 20 degrees, and on top the hills we are told readings were as low as 10 above, L. L. Yenni reporting that from his home near Teakean, that the sun shone brightly all day, but the frost did not leave where the sun failed to strike.

Monday night the temperature dropped even lower, readings of 15 to 18 being common in the valley.

Fuel oil dealers and garagemen smiled approval — for it boomed the sale of stove oil and anti-freeze — not to mention winter motor oils.

The entire community was shocked and saddened Wednesday morning to learn of the passing of Mrs. J. G. Travis, a pioneer resident, at the Gritman Memorial Hospital in Moscow, Tuesday evening, about 5:00 o'clock.

Mrs. Travis had entered the hospital a few days ago to undergo surgery and repair of broken bones in her right hip. She was taken into the surgery Tuesday afternoon for the operation. However, it was decided to place the limb in traction rather than use surgery. She had been returned to her room at the hospital, but failed to rally and she end came about 5:00 p. m.

Mrs. Travis was 73 years of age, and would have been 74 on her next birthday, in April.

MEAD & HOWARD BUY 2 MILLION FT. OF STATE TIMBER

The Mead & Howard Lumber Co., Inc., Kendrick, was the only bidder on 2,100,000 board feet of mixed timber, on state land, that went up for sale at Moscow, last week.

The sale, made on November 29, brought the appraised price of the timber, which is located about half way between Bovill and Elk River, south of the highway.

Jack Mead said the timber will be divided between the company's two mills — at Kendrick and near Bovill. He also added that there are no immediate plans to begin sawing the timber.

The Mead & Howard Mills and their planer operations at Juliaetta have operated continuously for the past many months, being one of the few operations in northern Idaho to continue to do so, in the face of the depressed lumber market.

SAFETY AWARD

Moscow — Manning Onstott, Soil Conservation Service technician located at Kendrick, was among those who received special recognition by the State Soil Conservationist Lee Morgan at a conference held last Thursday at Moscow. Onstott's award was for his completion of 15 years of driving a government vehicle without an accident. Mr. Morgan noted that this was all the more exceptional in Onstott's case because of the mountainous roads and winter driving conditions involved.

The U. S. Dept. of Agriculture continually emphasizes safe driving for its employees, both from the standpoint of efficiency and economy.

Mr. Onstott serves in both the Latah and Nez Perce Soil Conservation districts and has done a fine job of giving assistance to farmers and ranchers on their soil conservation work, the SCS official explained.

BE CAREFUL WHERE YOU CUT TREES

Boise — State Forester Roger Guernsey, reminded those Idaho citizens who want to cut their own Christmas trees, that they should always get the land owners permission first. He said there is no open forest — it is either owned by a private or industrial tree farmer, or a government agency. It is against the law to trespass on the property of another to cut Christmas trees, and the act is punishable as a misdemeanor.

The State Forester said that such as the state officials would like to accommodate persons desiring to cut their own trees, they are limited in this regard. Little state land growing good Christmas trees is accessible to major population centers at this time of year. Then, too, state laws do not provide for giving away state trees.

Mr. Guernsey said: "The cutting of Christmas trees indiscriminately from forest lands adds up to a serious offense. It is important that our forest lands be fully stocked with trees if they are to provide maximum benefits. Forest owners are paying as much as \$100.00 an acre to re-forest their lands, and we can not expect these owners to regard lightly the trespass cutting of the trees."

H. S. EDUCATION BY CORRESPONDENCE

U. of I., Mscow — A high school education is becoming a reality for 16 Elk City students through correspondence courses offered by the University of Idaho.

Located in the heart of the Nez-perce National Forest, and 32 miles (as the deer trots) from the nearest school at Grangeville, the Elk City students found themselves in a position where a high school education meant a long and expensive trip by bus or no school at all.

The Gragnville public school department came up with a plan that was approved by the Idaho State Board of Education, and now the 16 students are receiving two years of high school courses right in their homes.

"This is one case in many where the university division of adult education and extension services has made an education available where the need exists," said Thomas Dahle, director.

During the course of a year, nearly 4,000 persons take advantage of non-resident instruction from the university. Of this number, 240 people in Boise and Mt. Home study at the two adult education centers; about 700 people are enrolled in 38 extension classes at 14 centers ranging from Priest River in the north to Jerome in the south. Attending conferences on the campus of the university, sponsored by the adult education division, are about 1000 people annually.

Courses offered at the extension centers range from business administration, foreign language and physical education, to real estate management and leadership training for women's clubs.

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

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PIG RAISERS SHOULD BUY WITH CARE

It pays to be careful in buying

gilts to produce the spring crop, says Wade Wells, livestock specialist of the University of Idaho extension service. Look at the health record of the herd before adding an-

imals. Even a pig that appears to be healthy may carry a disease. An outbreak in your herd could cause serious losses.

Four chronic diseases are at the head of the list. Brucellosis and leptospirosis are not commonly recognized until they cause abortions. The other two diseases to be on the lookout for are rhinitis and virus pneumonia. Neither is usually noticed until pigs are several weeks old.

Even if there is no evidence of disease in the herd, Wells said, it is wise to have gilts tested for leptospirosis and brucellosis. Hogs can carry either without showing symptoms and both diseases can be spread to humans.

Crooked snout, sneezing and stunted growth are indicators of atrophic rhinitis. A specific virus is the cause of much of the chronic pneumonia in swine. There is no reliable test or treatment. It is seldom fatal,

U. of I., Moscow — Beryllium prospectors are getting a helping hand from the Idaho Bureau of Mines and Geology in the form of an informative circular called "Prospecting for Beryllium in Idaho."

but it does cause loss of weight and makes the animals vulnerable to other lung infections.

Parasites also merit attention when pigs are purchased, the specialist said. Mange and worms can be troublesome to baby pigs even though they are not serious for the gilt. Repeated applications of medicines control round worms. Sprays of recommended chemicals are effective against lice and mange.

The new publication outlines the methods of prospecting for beryllium, describes the nature of the deposits that have been discovered in the state, and gives the best areas to seek new deposits. It was written by Dr. R. R. Reid, head of the geology and geography department at the school, and Raoul Choate of the bureau staff.

"Widespread interest in beryllium has led to much exploration for this strong, light-weight metal," said Dr. E. F. Cook, dean of the college of mines and director of the bureau.

"A cooperative project carried out by the U. S. Bureau of Mines and the Idaho bureau has already resulted in some promising discoveries in Idaho. This project will be continued next year. Engineers and geologists of both bureaus are hoping that use of the information contained in the new prospecting guide may

result in further discoveries."

Beryllium finds were made this past summer in the high, rugged Sawtooth range east of Sun Valley. The metal is valued for its use in space-age vehicles.

WHERE IS THE LADYBUG'S HOME?

U. of I. Moscow — "Ladybug, Ladybug — fly away home" begins an old childhood rhyme. But just where is the Ladybug's home?

Ronald W. Portman, entomologist with the University says that winter time Ladybugs hibernate in timberlands where they find shelter. Their houses really aren't on fire at all. You can find thousands of these beneficial insects massed in cracks and crevices of fallen logs, rotted tree stumps, and under rocks in out-of-the-way places.

Three generations of ladybugs are born during the summer, Portman explains. It is the adults of the last generation that hibernate through the winter and lay eggs in the spring. Temperatures and humidity effect the time when they will come out and begin their summer's work of eating aphids. Mid-May is their usual coming-out time.

Ladybugs feed principally on aphids, but also on soft-bodied insects and various beetle eggs. They sometimes fly miles to find their food, Portman says.

The "lady bird beetles," as they are sometimes called, are plentiful in Idaho. Timberlands provide their winter quarters, and Idaho fields, trees and gardens offer the insects on which they feed during the summer months.

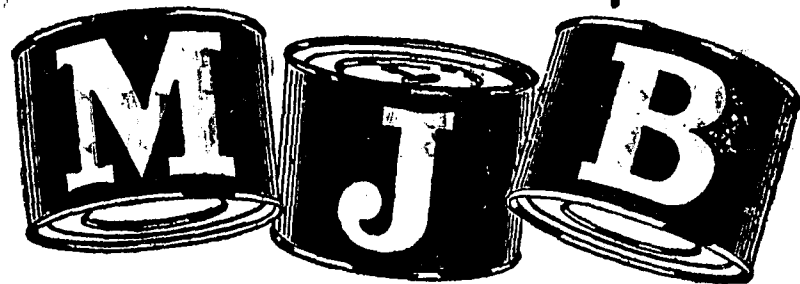

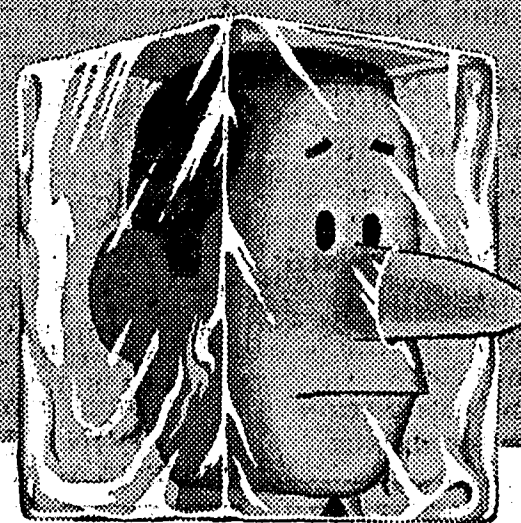
